PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that Public Works requests proposals for the On-Call Secondary School Environmental Education Program (BRC0000195) contract. This contract has been designed to have a potential maximum contract term of 4 years, consisting of an initial 1-year term and potential additional three 1-year option renewals. The total annual contract amount of this service is estimated to be \$670,000. Doing Business with Local Small Business Enterprise, Disabled Veteran Business Enterprise, and Social Enterprise

The County strongly encourages participation from firms, primes, and subcontractors, which are certified in the County's Local Small Business Enterprise (LSBE), Disabled Veteran Business Enterprise (DVBE), and Social Enterprise (SE) Preference Programs. The County's LSBE, DVBE, and SE Preference Programs require firms to complete a certification process to receive certain benefits allowed only for LSBE, DVBE, and SE, such as a 15 percent price preference, not to exceed \$150,000, when applicable, and LSBE Prompt Payment Program. 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

SECTION 1

INTRODUCTION

A. <u>Proposers' Conference</u>

Each Proposer or an authorized representative must attend a Proposers' Conference via Microsoft Teams Meeting Online Events to be held at the date and time announced in the Notice of Request for Proposals. ALL INTERESTED PROPOSERS OR THEIR AUTHORIZED REPRESENTATIVE MUST ATTEND THIS CONFERENCE. Proposals received from Proposers not signed in as attending this conference will be rejected as nonresponsive. Proposers are encouraged to be prepared to ask questions concerning the Request for Proposals (RFP), Contract requirements, specifications, terms, and conditions. For example, questions may address concerns, if any, that the application of minimum mandatory requirements, evaluation criteria, and/or business requirements would unfairly disadvantage Proposers or, due to unclear instructions, may result in the County not receiving the best possible responses from Proposers. Upon conclusion of the Proposers' Conference, Public Works will only provide further clarifications and/or answers concerning this solicitation through an addendum and/or informational update, to all who attended the conference.

B. <u>Minimum Mandatory Requirements</u>

Interested and qualified Proposers who can demonstrate their ability to successfully provide the required services outlined in Exhibit A, Scope of Work, of this RFP are invited to submit a Proposal, provided they meet the following requirements at the time of Proposal submission:

1. Proposer must have a minimum of 5 years of experience in planning and implementing public and/or private educational outreach events/programs. The proposal must include at least three examples of such programs that were implemented by the propser within the last 10 years. The proposal must include examples of educational campaign materials, such as flyers, brochures, posters, ads, presentation videos, and/or educational curriculum materials in print and/or video format to support this minimum mandatory requirement.

Important Note: This minimum requirement must be met by the Proposer and may not be met through a Subcontractor.

2. Proposer's key personnel assigned to oversee this program must be a direct employee of the proposer and must have a minimum of 2 years of experience in planning and implementing environmental-related public and/or private educational outreach events/programs. The proposal must include at least two examples of such programs that were planned and implemented by the identified staff within the last 10 years.

Important Note: This minimum requirement must be met by the Proposer's key personnel and may not be met through a Subcontractor.

3. Proposer's staff, or Subcontractor(s), if any, performing assessments and research evaluations must have a minimum of 3 years of experience conducting assessments and research evaluations.

Proposer may use Subcontractor(s) to meet this minimum mandatory requirement.

4. Proposer's staff, or Subcontractor(s), if any, conducting website enhancements for the Generation Earth website must have a minimum of 3 years of experience within the last 5 years creating, designing, and enhancing websites.

Proposer may use Subcontractor(s) to meet this minimum mandatory requirement.

5. Proposer's proposed annual amount for the contracts initial term and three potential renewal options must not exceed \$670,000.

C. <u>Contract Analyst</u>

Proposers are instructed not to contact any County personnel other than the Contract Analyst listed below regarding this solicitation. All contact regarding this RFP or any matter relating thereto must be in writing and may be mailed or e-mailed to:

If it is discovered that a Proposer contacted and received material information from any County personnel, other than the Contract Analysts named in the Notice of RFP

Education (BRC0000195)

and above, regarding this solicitation, the County, in its sole determination, may disqualify their Proposal from further consideration.

D. <u>Child Support Compliance Program</u>

Proposers shall: 1) fully comply with all applicable State and Federal reporting requirements relating to employment reporting for its employees; and 2) comply with all lawfully served Wage and Earnings Assignment Orders and Notices of Assignment, and continue to maintain compliance during the term of any Contract that may be awarded pursuant to this solicitation. Failure to comply may be cause for termination of a Contract and/or initiation of debarment proceedings against the noncompliant Contractor (County Code, Chapter 2.202).

E. <u>County Rights and Responsibilities</u>

The County has the right to amend this RFP by written addendum prior to the Proposal submission deadline. The County is responsible only for that which is expressly stated in this solicitation document and any authorized written addenda. Addendums shall be made available to each person or organization that attended the Proposers' Conference at the website listed above. Should an addendum(s) require additional information not previously requested, failure to address the requirements of such addendum may result in the Proposal not being considered, as determined in the sole discretion of the County. The County is not responsible for and shall not be bound by any representations otherwise made by any individual acting or purporting to act on its behalf.

F. Defaulted Property Tax and Reduction Program

- 1. The resultant Contract from this RFP will be subject to the requirements of the Countv's Defaulted Property Tax Reduction Program (Defaulted Tax Program) (County Code, Chapter 2.206). The successful Proposer should carefully read the Defaulted Tax Program Ordinance, Exhibit E. Proposers should carefully read the pertinent Defaulted Tax Program provisions in Part II, Exhibit B, Service Contract General Requirements, Section 11, Compliance with County's Defaulted Property Tax The Defaulted Tax Program applies to both Reduction Program. Contractors and their Subcontractors, if any.
- Proposers shall be required to certify that they are in full compliance with 2. the provisions of the Defaulted Tax Program and shall maintain compliance during the term of any Contract that may be awarded pursuant to this solicitation or shall certify that they are exempt from the Defaulted Tax Program by completing Certification of Compliance with The County's Defaulted Property Tax Reduction Program (Form PW-16). Failure to maintain compliance, or to timely cure defects, may be cause for termination of a Contract or initiation of debarment proceedings against the noncompliant Contractor (County Code, Proposals that fail to comply with the certification Chapter 2.202). requirements of the Defaulted Tax Program will be considered Secondary School Environmental

nonresponsive and excluded from further consideration.

G. GAIN and GROW Programs

As a threshold requirement for consideration for Contract award, Proposers shall demonstrate a proven record of hiring participants in the County's Department of Public Social Services Greater Avenues for Independence (GAIN) or General Relief Opportunity for Work (GROW) Programs or shall attest to a willingness to consider GAIN/GROW participants for any future employment openings if they meet the minimum qualifications for that opening. Proposers shall attest to a willingness to provide employed GAIN/GROW participants access to the Proposers' employee mentoring program, if available, to assist these individuals in obtaining permanent employment and/or promotional opportunities.

Proposers who are unable to meet this requirement shall not be considered for Contract award. Proposers shall certify compliance on Form PW-10, GAIN and GROW Employment Commitment.

H. Indemnification and Insurance

The successful Proposer will be required to comply with the indemnification provisions contained in Exhibit B, Section 5, Indemnification and Insurance Requirements. The Contractor will be required to procure, maintain, and provide the County proof of insurance coverage for all programs of insurance along with associated amounts specified throughout the entire term of the proposed Contract without interruption or break in coverage.

I. Injury and Illness Prevention Program

The successful Proposer will be required to comply with the State of California's Cal/OSHA's regulations. Section 3203 of Title 8 in the California Code of Regulations requires all California employers to have a written, effective Injury and Illness Prevention Program that addresses hazards pertaining to the particular workplace covered by the program.

J. Interpretation of Request for Proposals

The definitions and other rules of interpretation set forth in Part II, Sample Agreement and Exhibit B, Section 1, Interpretation of Contract, also apply to interpretation of this RFP.

K. Jury Service Program

1. The resultant Contract from this RFP will be subject to the requirements of the County's Contractor Employee Jury Service Ordinance (Jury Service Program, County Code, Chapter 2.203). Proposers should carefully read the pertinent jury service provisions in the Part II, Exhibit B, Service Contract General Requirements, Section 7, Compliance with County's Jury Service

Program. The Jury Service Program applies to both Contractors and their Subcontractors, if any. <u>Proposals that fail to comply with the requirements of the Jury Service Program will be considered nonresponsive and excluded from further consideration</u>.

- 2. The Jury Service Program requires Contractors and their Subcontractors, if any, to have and adhere to a written policy that provides that its employees shall receive from the Contractor, on an annual basis, no less than 5 days of regular pay for actual jury service. The policy may provide that employees deposit any fees received for such jury service with the Contractor or that the Contractor deduct from the employee's regular pay the fees received for jury service. For purposes of the Jury Service Program, "employee" means any California resident who is a full-time employee of a Contractor, and "full-time" means 40 hours or more worked per week or a lesser number of hours if: 1) the lesser number is a recognized industry standard as determined by the County; or 2) the Proposer has a long-standing practice that defines the lesser number of hours as full-time. Therefore, the Jury Service Program applies to all of a Contractor's full-time California employees, even those not working specifically on the County project. Full-time employees providing short-term, temporary services of 90 days or less within a 12-month period are not considered full-time for purposes of the Jury Service Program.
- 3. There are two ways in which a Contractor might not be subject to the Jury Service Program. The first is if the Contractor does not fall within the Jury Service Program's definition of "Contractor." The Jury Service Program defines "Contractor" to mean a person, partnership, corporation, or other entity which has a Contract with the County or a Subcontract with a County Contractor and has received or will receive an aggregate sum of \$50,000 or more in any 12-month period under one or more County Contracts or The second is if the Contractor meets one of the two Subcontracts. exceptions to the Jury Service Program. The first exception concerns small businesses and applies to Contractors that have: 1) ten or fewer employees; and 2) annual gross revenues in the preceding 12 months which, if added to the annual amount of this proposed Contract is less than \$500,000; and 3) is not an "affiliate or subsidiary of a business dominant in its field of operation." The second exception applies to Contractors that possess a collective bargaining agreement that expressly supersedes the provisions of the Jury Service Program. The Contractor is subject to any provision of the Jury Service Program not expressly superseded by the collective bargaining agreement.
- 4. If a Contractor does not fall within the Jury Service Program's definition of "Contractor" or if it meets any of the exceptions to the Jury Service Program, then the Contractor must so indicate in the Contractor Employee Jury Service Program Application for Exception and Certification Form (Form PW-3) and include with its submission all necessary documentation to support the claim, such as tax returns or a collective bargaining agreement, if applicable. Upon reviewing the Contractor's application, the County will determine, in its sole

discretion, whether the Contractor falls within the definition of "Contractor" or meets any of the exceptions to the Jury Service Program. The County's decision will be final.

L. <u>County's Preference Programs</u>

The Countv of Los Angeles has three preference programs. The Local Small Business Enterprise (LSBE), **Disabled Veteran Business** Enterprise (DVBE), and Social Enterprise (SE). The Board of Supervisors encourages business participation in the County's contracting process by continually streamlining and simplifying our selection process and expanding opportunities for these businesses to compete for County opportunities. The Preference Programs (LSBE, DVBE, and SE) requires that a business must complete certification prior to requesting a preference in a solicitation. In no case shall the Preference Programs (LSBE, DVBE, and SE) price or scoring preference be combined with any other county preference programs to exceed 15 percent or \$150,000 in response to any County solicitation. Sanctions and financial penalties may apply to a business that knowingly, and with intent to defraud, seeks to obtain or maintain certification as a certified LSBE, DVBE, or SE when not gualified.

- 1. Local Small Business Enterprise Preference Program
 - To the extent permitted by State and Federal law and when the price a. category is scored, the County will give Local SBE preference during the solicitation process to businesses that meet the definition of an LSBE, consistent with Chapter 2.204.030C.1 of the Los Angeles County Code. An LSBE is defined as a business: 1) certified by the State of California as a small business and has had its principal place of business located in Los Angeles County for at least 1 year; or 2) certified as a small business enterprise with other certifying agencies pursuant to the Department of Consumer and Business Affair's (DCBA) inclusion policy that: a) has its principal place of business located in Los Angeles County, and b) has revenues and employee sizes that meet the State's Department of General Services requirements. The business must be certified by the DCBA as meeting the requirements set forth above prior to requesting the LSBE Preference in a solicitation.
 - b. To apply for certification as an LSBE, businesses should contact the DCBA at <u>http://dcba.lacounty.gov</u>.
 - c. Certified LSBEs may only request the preference if the certification process has been completed and certification is affirmed. Businesses must complete and submit Form PW-9, Request for County's Preference Program Consideration and CBE Firm/Organization Information Form and submit a letter of certification from the DCBA with their Proposal.
 - d. Information about the State's small business enterprise certification

regulations is in the California Code of Regulations, Title 2, Subchapter 8, Section 1896 et seq., and is also available on the California Department of General Services Office of Small Business Certification and Resources website at <u>http://www.pd.dgs.ca.gov/smbus/default</u>.

- 2. Social Enterprise Preference Program
 - a. The County will give preference during the solicitation process to businesses that meet the definition of an SE, consistent with Chapter 2.205 of the Los Angeles County Code. An SE is defined as:
 - i. A business that qualifies as an SE and has been in operation for at least 1 year providing transitional or permanent employment to a Transitional Workforce or providing social, environmental and/or human justice services; and
 - ii. A business certified by the DCBA as an SE.
 - b. Certified SE may only request the preference if the certification has been completed and certification is affirmed. Businesses must complete and submit Form PW-9, Request for County's Preference Program Consideration and CBE Firm/Organization Information Form and submit a letter of certification from the DCBA with their Proposal.
 - c. Further information on SE also available on the DCBA's website at: <u>http://dcba.lacounty.gov</u>
- 3. Disabled Veteran Business Enterprise Preference Program
 - a. The County will give preference during the solicitation process to businesses that meet the definition of a DVBE, consistent with Chapter 2.211 of the Los Angeles County Code. A DVBE vendor is defined as:
 - i. A business which is certified by the State of California as a DVBE; or
 - ii. A business which is verified as a Service-Disabled Veteran-Owned Small Business (SDVOSB) by the Veterans Administration.
 - iii. A business certified as DVBE with other certifying agencies pursuant to the DCBA inclusion policy that meets the criteria set forth by the agencies in 1 and 2 above.
 - b. The DCBA shall certify that a DVBE is currently certified by the State of California, by the U.S. Department of Veteran Affairs, or is determined by the DCBA inclusion policy that meets the criteria set forth by the agencies above.

- c. Certified DVBE may only request the preference if the certification process has been completed and certification is affirmed. Businesses must complete and submit Form PW-9, Request for County's Preference Program Consideration and CBE Firm/Organization Information Form and submit a letter of certification from the DCBA with their Proposal.
- d. Information about the State's DVBE certification regulations is found in the California Code of Regulations, Title 2, Subchapter 8, Section 1896 et seq., and is also available on the California Department of General Services Office of Disabled Veteran Business Certification and Resources Website at <u>http://www.dgs.ca.gov/pd/Home.aspx</u>.
- e. Information on the Department of Veteran Affairs SDVOSB certification regulations is found in the Code of Federal Regulations, 38CFR 74 and is also available on the Department of Veterans Affairs website at: <u>http://www.vetbiz.gov</u>.

M. <u>Notification to County of Pending Acquisitions/Mergers by Proposing/Bidding</u> <u>Company</u>

The Proposer shall notify the County of any pending acquisitions/mergers of their company. This information shall be provided by the Proposer on Form PW-1, Verification of Proposal. The proposed Contract will only be awarded to the entity that submitted the Proposal. Any acquisitions and merger will be handled pursuant to Exhibit B, Section 2.B, Assignment and Delegation, and evaluated in accordance with the Board's policy regarding Contractors engaged in mergers and acquisitions. Failure of the Proposer to provide this information may eliminate its Proposal/bid from any further consideration.

N. Prompt Payment Program

It is the intent of the County that Certified Local SBE receive prompt payment for services they provide to County departments. Prompt payment is defined as 15 calendar days after the receipt of an undisputed and approved invoice.

O. <u>Proposer's Charitable Contributions Compliance</u>

California's "Supervision of Trustees and Fundraisers for Charitable Purposes Act" regulates receiving and raising charitable contributions. Among other requirements, those subject to the Charitable Purposes Act must register. The 2004 Nonprofit Integrity Act (SB 1262, Chapter 919) increases Charitable Purposes Act requirements. New rules cover California public benefit corporations, unincorporated associations, trustee entities, and may include similar foreign corporations doing business or holding property in California. Key Nonprofit Integrity Act requirements affect executive compensation, fundraising practices, and documentation. Charities with over \$2 million of

revenues (excluding funds that must be accounted for to a governmental entity) have new audit requirements.

All prospective Contractors must determine if they receive or raise charitable contributions, which subject them to the Charitable Purposes Act and complete the certification form attached as Form PW-12. A completed Form PW-12 is a required part of any agreement with the County.

In Form PW-12, prospective Contractors certify either that:

- 1. They have determined now that they do not receive or raise charitable contributions regulated under the California Charitable Purposes Act (including the Nonprofit Integrity Act) but will comply if they become subject to coverage of those laws during the term of a County Contract; or
- 2. They are currently complying with their obligations under the Charitable Purposes Act, attaching a copy of their most recent filing with the Registry of Charitable Trusts.

Prospective County Contractors that do not complete Form PW-12 as part of the solicitation process may, in the County's sole discretion, be disqualified for Contract award. A County Contractor that fails to comply with its obligations under the Charitable Purposes Act is subject to either Contract termination or debarment proceedings or both (County Code, Chapter 2.202).

- P. Proposal Requirements and Contract Specifications
 - 1. Persons who wish to Contract with the County may respond to this RFP by submitting a Proposal in the form described in the following Sections and Attachments. Proposers are instructed to carefully read these Terms, Requirements, Specifications, Conditions, Attachments, and Exhibits.
 - 2. Requirements for Proposals are explained in Part I of this RFP.
 - 3. The proposed Contract's specifications and requirements are fully described in Part II, Sample Agreement; any Exhibits; and Attachments. Proposers are also requested to review Attachment 1, Policy on Doing Business with Small Business; Attachment 2, Listing of Contractors Debarred in Los Angeles County; and Attachment 3, County of Los Angeles Lobbyist Ordinance.
 - 4. Dates and times of the Proposers' Conference and for the submission of Proposals are set forth in the Notice of Request for Proposals.

Q. <u>Security and Background Investigations</u>

Background and security investigations of Contractor's staff may be required at the discretion of the County as a condition of beginning and continuing work under any

resulting Contract. The cost of background checks is the responsibility of the Contractor.

R. <u>Vendor Registration</u>

Proposers must register online with the County's web-based vendor registration system to facilitate the Contract award process. Registration can be accomplished online via the Internet by accessing the County's home page at <u>https://camisvr.co.la.ca.us/webven/default.asp</u> and click on "New Registration". Being registered will assist the Proposer in receiving notifications of the release of County solicitations that may be of interest to the Proposer.

S. <u>Time Off for Voting</u>

The Contractor shall notify its employees, and shall require each Subcontractor to notify and provide to its employees, information regarding the time off for voting law (Elections Code, Section 14000). Not less than 10 days before every Statewide election, every Contractor and Subcontractors shall keep posted conspicuously at the place of work, if practicable, or elsewhere where it can be seen as employees come or go to their place of work, a notice setting forth the provisions of Section 14000.

T. <u>Local Small Business Enterprise/Social Enterprise/Disabled Veteran Business</u> <u>Enterprise Utilization</u>

When requested by the County, the Contractor shall provide a copy of their invoice, which includes expenditure information for subcontractors utilized for Contract work which provides information requested by the County, including but not limited to: subcontractor name, business address, telephone number, email address, each subcontractor's Local Small Business Enterprise (SBE) status, Social Enterprise (SE) status, and/or Disabled Veterans Business Enterprise (DVBE) status, as applicable, and the actual monetary amount of the Contract work the subcontractor has performed.

This information shall be transmitted to the County via methods specified by the County, which may include electronic submission by one of the following methods: utilizing electronic live (or dynamic) data, utilizing a County-designated third party software system, utilizing a County approved website, or utilizing other means approved by the County. The County may request subcontractor confirmation of receipt of payment.

The parties agree that it will be impracticable or extremely difficult to fix the extent of actual damages resulting from the failure to the Contractor to comply with this Section. The parties agree that under the current circumstances a reasonable estimate of such damages is specified in Exhibit F, Performance Requirements Summary, and that the Contractor shall be liable to the County for said amount. If in the judgment of the Director of Public Works, or his designee, the Contractor is deemed to be in noncompliance with these terms and obligations, the Director or his designee, at his option, in addition to, or in lieu of, other remedies provided in the Contract, may deduct and withhold liquidated damages from County's payment to the Contractor.

U. <u>Proposer's Acknowledgement of County's Commitment to Zero Tolerance Human</u> <u>Trafficking</u>

On October 4, 2016, the County of Los Angeles Board of Supervisors approved a motion taking significant steps to protect victims of human trafficking by establishing a zero tolerance human trafficking policy. The policy prohibits contractors engaged in human trafficking from receiving Contract awards or performing services under a County Contract.

Contractors are required to complete Form PW-17, Zero Tolerance Human Trafficking Policy Certification, certifying that they are in full compliance with the County's Zero Tolerance Human Trafficking provision as defined in Exhibit B, Section 2.00, Compliance with County's Zero Tolerance Human Trafficking Policy. Further, contractors are required to comply with the requirements under said provision for the term of any Contract awarded pursuant to this solicitation.

V. <u>Method of Payment and Required Information</u>

The County may, at its sole discretion, determine the most appropriate, efficient, secure, and timely form of payment for any amounts due for goods and/or services provided under a Contract with the County. Proposers/Contractors further agree that the default form of payment shall be Electronic Funds Transfer (EFT) or direct deposit, unless an alternative method of payment is deemed appropriate by the Auditor-Controller (A-C).

Upon Contract award and at the request of the A-C and/or Public Works, the Contractor shall provide the A-C with electronic banking and related information for the Contractor and/or any other payee that the Contractor designates to receive payment pursuant to this Contract. Such electronic banking and related information includes, but is not limited to: bank account number and routing number, legal business name, valid taxpayer identification number, a working e-mail address capable of receiving remittance advices and other payment related correspondence, and any other information that the A-C determines is reasonably necessary to process the payment and comply with all accounting, record keeping, and tax reporting requirements.

Any provision of law, grant, or funding agreement requiring a specific form or method of payment other than EFT or direct deposit shall supersede this requirement with respect to those payments. Upon Contract award or at any time during the duration of the Contract, a contractor may submit a written request for an exemption to this requirement. Such request must be based on specific legal, business or operational needs and explain why the payment method designated by the A-C is not feasible and an alternative is necessary. The A-C, in consultation with Public Works, shall decide whether to approve exemption requests.

W. <u>Proposer's Acknowledgement of County's Commitment to Fair Chance Employment</u> <u>Hiring Practices</u>

On May 29, 2018, the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors approved a Fair Chance Employment Policy in an effort to remove job barriers for individuals with criminal records. The policy requires businesses that contract with the County to comply with fair chance employment hiring practices set forth in California Government Code Section 12952, Employment Discrimination: Conviction History Section 12952.

Contractors are required to complete Form PW-18, Compliance with Fair Chance Employment Hiring Practices Certification, certifying that they are in full compliance with Section 12952, as indicated in Section 2.RR, Compliance with Fair Chance Employment Practices, of Exhibit B. Further, contractors are required to comply with the requirements under Section 12952 for the term of any contract awarded pursuant to this solicitation.

X. <u>Community Business Enterprise Participation</u>

The County has adopted a CBE Program, which includes business enterprises owned by disabled veterans, disadvantaged business enterprises, and minority and women-owned business enterprises. The County has established an aspirational goal that 25 percent of all County contract dollars shall go to certified CBEs. All Proposers shall document good faith efforts it has taken to assure that CBEs are utilized when possible to provide supplies, equipment, technical services, and other services under this contract. The County will evaluate the Proposer's good faith efforts to meet the CBE participation goal by reviewing the Proposer's documentation. Suggested criteria include, but are not limited to, the following:

- 1. Proposer attended any preproposal meetings scheduled by the County to inform all Proposers of the CBE program requirements for the project.
- 2. Proposer identified and selected specific items of the project for which a subcontract could be awarded to be performed by CBEs to provide an opportunity for participation by those enterprises.
- 3. Proposer advertised, not less than ten calendar days before the date the proposals are due, in one or more daily or weekly newspapers, trade association publications, minority or trade oriented publications, trade journals, or other media specified by the County for CBEs that are interested in participating in the project. This paragraph applies only if the County gave public notice of the project not less than 15 calendar days prior to the date the proposals are due.

- 4. Proposer provided written notice of his or her interest in proposing on the project to certified CBEs not less than ten calendar days prior to the submittal of proposals.
- 5. Proposer followed up initial solicitations of interest by contacting the CBEs to determine with certainty whether the CBEs were interested in performing specific items of the project.
- 6. Proposer provided interested CBEs with information about the project and requirements for selected subconsultants.
- 7. Proposer requested assistance from minority and women community organizations; minority and women Contractor groups; local, state, or federal minority and women business assistance offices; or other organizations that provide assistance in the recruitment and placement of minority or women business enterprises, if any are available. Proposer used the services and assistance of the Small Business Administration and Minority Business Development Agency of the Department of Commerce, the County of Los Angeles Department of Consumer and Business Affairs (dcba.lacounty.gov or (323) 881-3964), and other outreach agencies.

To obtain a list of firms that are certified by the County in the CBE Program, send an e-mail request to the County of Los Angeles Department of Consumer and Business Affairs: <u>CBESBE@dcba.lacounty.gov</u>. For additional information, contact the County of Los Angeles Department of Consumer and Business Affairs (Small Business Services). The website is: dcba.lacounty.gov.

- 8. Proposer negotiated in good faith with the CBEs, and did not unjustifiably reject as unsatisfactory proposals prepared by any CBE.
- 9. Where applicable, the Proposer advised and made efforts to assist interested CBEs in obtaining bonds, lines of credit, or insurance required by these contract documents.
- 10. Proposer's efforts to obtain CBE participation could reasonably be expected by the County to produce a level of participation sufficient to meet the goals and requirements of the County.
- 11. Proposer commits to continue its good faith efforts to include in considering CBE participation throughout the term of the contract. County shall be notified of any future additions in CBE participation.
- 12. Proposer is a certified CBE.
- 13. The Proposer's CBE participation shall be reflected in the CBE Form.

14. Public Works will answer questions from Proposers regarding CBE participation.

The County strongly encourages participation by CBEs; however, the final selection will be made without regard to race, color, creed, or gender. The final selection will be based on the Proposer's ability to provide the best service and value to the County.

SECTION 2

PROPOSAL PREPARATION AND SUBMISSION

A. <u>Proposal Format and Content Requirements</u>

Proposals shall be bound and presented in the sequence, with the content tabbed and paginated in the format stated below. Failure to provide the required information or to strictly comply with these guidelines may be a basis for rejection of the Proposal as nonresponsive at the County's sole discretion:

1. Title page

The title page shall show the Proposer's name, title of the service requested, local address, telephone number, and date of submittal.

2. Table of Contents

A comprehensive Table of Contents shall list all materials included in the Proposal.

3. Letter of Transmittal

A person legally authorized to enter into Contracts for the Proposer shall sign the Letter of Transmittal. The letter must include a brief statement of the Proposer's understanding of the work to be accomplished and a list of names of individuals authorized to make representations for the Proposer, their titles, addresses, e-mail addresses, and telephone numbers.

- 4. Support Documents for Corporations and Limited Liability Companies
 - a. Corporations

Proposer must provide a copy of the corporation's "Certificate of Good Standing" with the State of California or state of incorporation and the most recent "Statement by Domestic (or Foreign) Stock Corporation" as filed with the California Secretary of State or state of incorporation. The "Statement of Information" must list the corporate officers. If Proposer's most recent Statement has only the "No change in information" box checked, the Proposer must also submit the most recent endorsed "Statement of Information," which includes a list of corporate officers.

b. Limited Liability Companies

Proposer must provide a copy of the most recent "Statement by Domestic (or Foreign) Stock Corporation" as filed with the California Secretary of State or state of incorporation. If Proposer's most recent Statement has only the "No change in information" box checked, the Proposer must also submit the most

recent endorsed "Statement of Information," which includes a list of corporate officers. The "Statement of Information" must list the corporate officers.

5. Experience

FAILURE TO PREPARE AND INCLUDE AN EXPERIENCE SECTION MAY RESULT IN DISQUALIFICATION OF THE PROPOSAL.

Proposer's capabilities and experience shall be described comprehensively in order to provide for a meaningful evaluation and assessment. The narrative should discuss each of the following subject areas:

- Background
- Organization (provide a chart or outline of the firm's organizational structure showing the roles of all personnel involved with this Contract, if awarded, identifying each by name/position)
- Identify the roles of and submit resumes for the firm, principals, managing employees, on-site supervisors, other key staff, presenters, Subcontractors, and any other staff involved with this Contract, if awarded
- Provide additional information for staff involved with this Contract, if awarded, with specific information regarding length and quality of experience providing similar services as described in Exhibit A, Scope of Work
- Demonstrate how the Proposer and subcontractors, if any, complies with requirements outlined in Part I, Section 1.B, Minimum Mandatory Requirements

The County may award higher points to Proposers that successfully demonstrate the following in their Proposal:

- Proposer's power point presentations, or other material presented at teacher trainings conducted from other educational programs as examples of the Proposer's work product.
- Proposer's documented account of previous teacher trainings, and presentations made including statistical data of the total number of teachers attended per training and presentations.
- Demonstrate environmental-related experience held by the Proposer's staff which directly relates to the following key areas: the four Rs (Reduce, Reuse, Recycle, and Rethink), household hazardous waste (HHW), electronic waste (E-Waste), stormwater

pollution prevention, water conservation, organics management and other waste reduction methods.

6. Work Plan

FAILURE TO PREPARE AND INCLUDE A WORK PLAN MAY RESULT IN DISQUALIFICATION OF THE PROPOSAL.

Describe comprehensively and in detail how the service will be performed to meet or exceed the requirements of Exhibit A, Scope of Work. Prepare and include a staffing plan that specifically describes the number of staff who will be committed to the project and their qualifications. If possible, list them by name. Describe and include the schedules, procedures, techniques, and methods that will be employed in meeting the objectives outlined in the Scope of Work. These may include personnel management, training, subcontracting, emergency and contingency planning, recruitment and replacement, supervision, supplies, equipment, uniforms, identification badges, safety, communications, and quality control.

The County may award higher points to Proposers that successfully demonstrate the following in their Proposal:

- Proposer's ability to respond and provide backup staff in English during workshops, school district meetings, and education outreach events during emergency situations.
- Proposer's ability to respond to malfunctions of presentation equipment and webinar software used at workshops.
- Proposer's ability to reach the minimum of 221,330 students annually through environmental service learning projects completed, education outreach events, and the environmental youth summit.
- Proposer's plan on integrating curriculum State standards into the curriculum materials for teachers.
- 7. Quality Assurance Program

Describe Proposer's Quality Assurance Program (Program) that will be utilized by the Proposer as a self-monitoring tool to ensure that these services are performed in accordance with the County's Contract requirements and recommendations. The Program must ensure service deliveries outlined in Exhibit A, Scope of Work, are completed in a timely manner, the services will be free of defects, and how those results will be achieved. The Program must comprehensively address the Proposer's organizational process for consistently delivering those requirements.

The Proposer's staffing plan must include a qualified inspector to monitor compliance with the Program and deal with customer complaints and inquiries.

At a minimum, the Program outlined in your Proposal shall address in detail:

- a. Policies and Procedures Quality control procedures for the Proposer, Subcontractors, if any, and suppliers must be described. If a Subcontractor is to perform work, the Program must detail how that Subcontractor will interface with the Proposer and how the Proposer will ensure that the Subcontractor complies with the Program.
- b. Inspection Fundamentals The Proposer shall provide samples of forms that outline required operations and quality levels. The Proposal must indicate the Proposer's inspection schedules, a methodology to correct deficiencies, level of supervision, and how the inspections are to be performed. The Proposal shall document the name, authority, relevant experience, and qualifications of the person with overall responsibility for the inspection system.
- c. Quality Control Documentation, Review, and Reporting The Program shall describe and list the records to be maintained. The Program shall detail how the Proposer will maintain inspection records and make them available to the County.
- 8. Subcontractors

If Subcontractors are to be used, submit a description of their proposed assignments, qualifications, experience, staffing, and schedules.

9. Licenses and Certifications

Submit copies of the Proposer's, employees', and/or Subcontractors' licenses and certifications required to perform the work, if any.

10. Insurance

Submit completed and signed Form PW-15, Proposer's Insurance Compliance Affirmation, acknowledging that the Proposer will comply with all provisions set forth in Exhibit B, Section 5, Indemnification and Insurance Requirements, of this Request for Proposals if awarded the Contract. In Form PW-15, Proposer affirms that the Proposer will procure, maintain, and provide the County with proof of insurance and coverage as specified by this Request for Proposals throughout the entire term of the proposed Contract, without interruption or break in coverage.

Additional information that is not presented elsewhere and is essential to a fair evaluation must appear in the last section of the Proposal and be labeled "Additional Information." If there is no additional information the Proposer wishes to present, this section will consist of the statement: "There is no additional information we wish to present."

B. <u>Proposal Submission</u>

Submission of hard copy proposals <u>will not</u> be accepted.

PROPOSALS MUST BE SUBMITTED ELECTRONICALLY USING THE FOLLOWING METHOD:

Proposals must be submitted electronically on <u>www.bidexpress.com</u>, a secure online bidding service website. To submit your proposals electronically, register with BidExpress, by the due date. A new registration page must be signed, notarized, and received by BidExpress Customer Support for processing before the due date. There is a nominal service fee to use BidExpress.

Please note, each upload of file in BidExpress is limited to 10 MB per file up to 50 files for a total of 500 MB. Proposers shall plan ahead and allow sufficient time to account for the file size limitation before the proposal submission deadline to complete the uploading of proposal files. If proposer submits a proposal through BidExpress, proposer should not send hard copies, CDs, or any other materials to the County.

Proposals received after the closing date and time specified in the Notice of Request for Proposals will be rejected by Public Works as nonresponsive.

SECTION 3

GENERAL CONDITIONS OF REQUEST FOR PROPOSALS

A. <u>Acceptance or Rejection of Proposals</u>

The right is reserved to reject any or all Proposals that, in the judgment of the Board or Director, are not in the best interests of the County/Public Works/Special Districts. The County further reserves the right to cancel this request for Proposals at any time at its sole discretion. In the event of any such rejection of Proposals or cancellation of this solicitation, the County will not be liable for any costs incurred in connection with the preparation and submittal of a Proposal.

Proposals signed by an agent other than the president and secretary of a corporation or a member of a general copartnership must be submitted with a power of attorney or corporate resolution, certified by the secretary or assistant secretary, authorizing such signature; otherwise, the Proposal may be rejected as unauthorized and nonresponsive.

No Proposal will be considered unless the Proposer submits a Proposal for all requested items. If the solicitation document requests multiple quotations, no Proposal will be considered unless the Proposer submits a price on all items within each category; however, the solicitation document may not require the Proposer to submit a price on all of the categories.

B. <u>Altering Solicitation Document</u>

The wording of the solicitation document shall not be changed. Any additions, conditions, limitations, or provisions inserted by the Proposer will render their Proposal irregular and may cause its rejection as nonresponsive.

C. <u>County Responsibility</u>

The County will not be responsible for representation made by any of its officers or employees prior to the execution of the proposed Contract unless such understanding or representation is included in the proposed Contract.

D. <u>Determination of Proposer Responsibility</u>

- 1. A responsible Proposer is a Proposer who has demonstrated the attribute of trustworthiness as well as quality, fitness, capacity, and experience to satisfactorily perform the proposed Contract. It is the County's policy to conduct business only with responsible Contractors.
- 2. Proposers are hereby notified that, in accordance with Chapter 2.202 of the Los Angeles County Code, the County may determine whether the Proposer is responsible based on a review of the Proposer's performance on any Contracts including, but not limited to, County Contracts. Particular attention will be given to violations of labor laws related to employee

compensation and benefits and evidence of false claims made by the Proposer against public entities. Labor law violations which are the fault of Subcontractors and of which the Proposer had no knowledge shall not be the basis of a determination that the Proposer is not responsible.

- 3. The County may declare a Proposer to be nonresponsible for purposes of the proposed Contract if the Board, in its discretion, finds that the Proposer has done any of the following: (1) violated a term of a Contract with the County or a nonprofit corporation created by the County; (2) committed an act or omission which negatively reflects on the Proposer's quality, fitness, or capacity to perform a Contract with the County, any other public entity, or a nonprofit corporation created by the County, or engaged in a pattern or practice which negatively reflects on same; (3) committed an act or omission which indicates a lack of business integrity or business honesty; or (4) made or submitted a false claim against the County or any other public entity.
- 4. If there is evidence that the highest-rated Proposer may not be responsible, Public Works will notify the Proposer in writing of the evidence relating to the Proposer's responsibility and its intention to recommend to the Board that the Proposer be found not responsible. Public Works will provide the Proposer and/or the Proposer's representative with an opportunity to present evidence as to why the Proposer should be found to be responsible and to rebut evidence, which is the basis for Public Works' recommendation.
- 5. If the Proposer presents evidence in rebuttal to Public Works, Public Works will evaluate the merits of such evidence, and based on that evaluation, make a recommendation to the Board. The final decision concerning the responsibility of the Proposer will reside with the Board.
- 6. These terms shall also apply to any proposed Subcontractors of Proposer on County Contracts.

E. Disqualification of Proposers

More than one Proposal from an individual, firm, partnership, corporation, or association under the same or different names will not be considered. Reasonable grounds for believing that any Proposer has an interest in more than one Proposal for the work contemplated may cause the rejection of all Proposals in which such Proposer has interest on the basis of nonresponsibility and/or nonresponsiveness. If there is reason for believing that collusion exists among the Proposals or future Proposals on the basis of nonresponsibility and/or nonresponsiveness and may subject such Proposers to debarment.

F. <u>Gratuities</u>

1. It is improper for any County officer, employee, or agent to solicit consideration, in any form, from a Proposer with the implication, suggestion, or statement that the Proposer's provision of the consideration may secure

more favorable treatment for the Proposer in the award of the proposed Contract or that the Proposer's failure to provide such consideration may negatively affect the County's consideration of the Proposer's submission. A Proposer shall not offer or give, either directly or through an intermediary, consideration, in any form, to a County officer, employee, or agent for the purpose of securing favorable treatment with respect to the award of the proposed Contract.

- 2. A Proposer shall immediately report any attempt by a County officer, employee, or agent to solicit such improper consideration. The report shall be made either to the County manager charged with the supervision of the employee or to the County Auditor-Controller's Employee Fraud Hotline at (800) 544-6861. Failure to report such a solicitation may result in the Proposer's submission being rejected on the basis of nonresponsibility and/or nonresponsiveness.
- 3. Among other items, such improper consideration may take the form of cash; discounts; services; and the provision of travel, entertainment, or tangible gifts.

G. Knowledge of Work to be Done

By submitting a Proposal, Proposer shall be held to have carefully read this RFP, all attachments, and exhibits; satisfied themselves before the delivery of their Proposal as to their ability to meet all of the requirements and difficulties attending the execution of the proposed work; and agreed that if awarded a Contract, no claim will be made against the County based on this RFP including, without limitation, claims based on any ambiguity or misunderstanding. Furthermore, the Proposer has carefully examined the location(s) of the proposed work, and is familiar with all of the physical and climatic conditions, and makes this Proposal solely upon the The Proposer has carefully examined these Proposer's own knowledge. specifications and requirements, both in general and in detail, any drawings attached, and any additional communications sent and makes their Proposal in accordance therewith. If Proposer's Proposal is accepted, the Proposer will enter into a written Contract with the County for the performance of the proposed work and will accept payment based on the prices shown in Form PW-2, Schedule of Prices, as full compensation for work performed. It is understood and agreed that the quantities set forth in Form PW-2, Schedule of Prices, and this RFP are only estimates, and the unit prices will apply to the actual quantities, whatever they may be.

H. Notice to Proposers Regarding the Public Records Act

1. Responses to this solicitation shall become the exclusive property of the County. Absent extraordinary circumstances, the recommended Proposer's Proposal will become a matter of public record when (1) Contract negotiations are complete; (2) Department receives a letter from the recommended Proposer's authorized officer that the negotiated Contract is the firm offer of the recommended Proposer; and (3) Department releases a copy of the

Secondary School Environmental Education (BRC0000195) recommended Proposer's Proposal in response to a Notice of Intent to Request a Proposed Contractor Selection Review under Board Policy No. 5.055. Notwithstanding the above, absent extraordinary circumstances, all Proposals will become a matter of public record when the Department's Proposer recommendation appears on the Board agenda. Exceptions to disclosure are those parts or portions of all Proposals that are justifiably defined as business or trade secrets, and plainly marked by the Proposer as "Trade Secret," "Confidential," or "Proprietary."

- 2. The County shall not, in any way, be liable or responsible for the disclosure of any such record or any parts thereof, if disclosure is required or permitted under the California Public Records Act or otherwise by law. A blanket statement of confidentiality or the marking of each page of the Proposal as confidential shall not be deemed sufficient notice of exception. The Proposers must specifically label only those provisions of their respective Proposal which are "Trade Secret," "Confidential," or "Proprietary" in nature. Only those provisions labeled as "Trade Secret," "Confidential," or "Proprietary" in nature at the time of Proposal submission will be accepted. The Proposers will not be granted opportunity to make any change or label any portion of their respective Proposal as "Trade Secret," "Confidential," or "Proprietary" after the submission deadline of the Proposals.
- 3. In the event County is required to defend an action on a Public Records Act request for any of the aforementioned documents, information, books, records, and/or contents of a Proposal marked "Trade Secret," "Confidential," or "Proprietary," Proposer agrees to defend and indemnify County from all costs and expenses, including reasonable attorney's fees, in connection with any requested action or liability arising under the Public Records Act.

I. Notice to Proposers Regarding the County Lobbyist Ordinance

The Board has enacted an ordinance regulating the activities of persons who lobby County officials. This ordinance, referred to as the "Lobbyist Ordinance," defines a County Lobbyist and imposes certain registration requirements upon individuals meeting the definition. The complete text of the ordinance can be found in Los Angeles County Code, Chapter 2.160. In effect, each person, corporation, or other entity that seeks a County permit, license, franchise, or Contract must certify compliance with the ordinance. As part of this solicitation process, it will be the responsibility of each Proposer to review the ordinance independently as the text of the ordinance is not contained in this RFP. Each person, corporation, or other entity submitting a response to this solicitation, must certify that each County Lobbyist, as defined by Los Angeles County Code, Section 2.160.010, retained by the Proposer is in full compliance with Chapter 2.160 of the Los Angeles County Code and each County Lobbyist is not on the Executive Office's List of Terminated Registered Lobbyist. The Proposer's signature on the Proposal submission is its certification that it is in full compliance with Los Angeles County Code, Chapter 2.160. See Attachment 3 regarding County Lobbyist.

J. <u>Opening of Proposals</u>

Proposals will not be publicly opened.

K. <u>Proposer Debarment</u>

- 1. The Proposer is hereby notified that, in accordance with Chapter 2.202 of the Los Angeles County Code, the County may debar the Proposer from bidding or proposing on, or being awarded, and/or performing work on other County Contracts for a specified period of time, which generally will not exceed 5 years but may exceed 5 years or be permanent if warranted by the circumstance, and the County may terminate any or all of the Proposer's existing Contracts with County, if the Board finds, in its discretion, that the Proposer has done any of the following: (1) violated a term of a Contract with the County or a nonprofit corporation created by the County; (2) committed an act or omission which negatively reflects on the Proposer's quality, fitness, or capacity to perform a Contract with the County or any other public entity, or a nonprofit corporation created by the County or engaged in a pattern or practice which negatively reflects on same; (3) committed an act or offense which indicates a lack of business integrity or business honesty; or (4) made or submitted a false claim against the County or any other public entity.
- 2. If there is evidence that the highest-rated Proposer may be subject to debarment, Public Works will notify the Proposer in writing of the evidence, which is the basis for the proposed debarment, and will advise the Proposer of the scheduled date for a debarment hearing before the Contractor Hearing Board.
- 3. The Contractor Hearing Board will conduct a hearing where evidence on the proposed debarment is presented. The Proposer and/or the Proposer's representative shall be given an opportunity to submit evidence at that hearing. After the hearing, the Contractor Hearing Board will prepare a tentative proposed decision, which will contain a recommendation regarding whether the Proposer should be debarred, and, if so, the appropriate length of time of the debarment. The Proposer and Public Works shall be provided an opportunity to object to the tentative proposed decision prior to its presentation to the Board.
- 4. After consideration of any objections, or if no objections are received, a record of the hearing, the proposed decision, and any other recommendation of the Contractor Hearing Board shall be presented to the Board. The Board shall have the right to modify, deny, or adopt the proposed decision and recommendation of the Contractor Hearing Board.
- 5. If a Proposer has been debarred for a period longer than 5 years, that Proposer may, after the debarment has been in effect for at least 5 years, submit a written request for review of the debarment determination to reduce the period of debarment or terminate the debarment. The County may, in its discretion, reduce the period of debarment or terminate the debarment if it

finds that the Proposer has adequately demonstrated one or more of the following: (1) elimination of the grounds for which the debarment was imposed; (2) a bona fide change in ownership or management; (3) material evidence discovered after debarment was imposed; or (4) any other reason that is in the best interests of the County.

- 6. The Contractor Hearing Board will consider requests for review of a debarment determination only where (1) the Proposer has been debarred for a period longer than 5 years; (2) the debarment has been in effect for at least 5 years; and (3) the request is in writing, states one or more of the grounds for reduction of the debarment period or termination of the debarment and includes supporting documentation. Upon receiving an appropriate request, the Contractor Hearing Board will provide notice of the hearing on the request. At the hearing, the Contractor Hearing Board shall conduct a hearing where evidence on the proposed reduction of debarment period or termination of debarment is presented. This hearing shall be conducted and the request for review decided by the Contractor Hearing Board pursuant to the same procedure as for a debarment hearing.
- 7. The Contractor Hearing Board's proposed decision will contain a recommendation on the request to reduce the period of debarment or terminate the debarment. The Contractor Hearing Board shall present its proposed decision and recommendation to the Board. The Board will have the right to modify, deny, or adopt the proposed decision and recommendation of the Contractor Hearing Board.
- 8. These terms shall also apply to proposed Subcontractors of Proposer on County Contracts.
- 9. Attachment 2 is the link to a Listing of Contractors Debarred in Los Angeles County.

L. <u>Proposal Prices and Agreement of Figures</u>

If the total amount arrived at by multiplying the unit price times the quantity does not agree with the total amount entered for the item or if the total amount is not entered, the unit price and the corrected total amount will be considered as representing the Proposer's intentions. If the total amount is entered for the item, but not the unit price, the unit price will be that which is derived by dividing the total amount proposed for the item by the number of units in the item as representing the Proposer's intentions. If the items are incorrectly calculated, the corrected total will be considered as representing the Proposer's intentions.

M. <u>Proposer's Safety Record</u>

A review of the Proposer's safety record will be made before the award. Proposers are required to submit this information, with their Proposal, on Form PW-4, Contractor's Industrial Safety Record form provided. Nonsubmission or an

adverse finding as to the Proposer's safety record may be cause for rejection of the Proposal on the basis of nonresponsibility and/or nonresponsiveness.

N. Qualifications of Proposer

No award will be made to any Proposer who cannot give satisfactory assurance as to its ability to carry out the intended Contract, based both on financial strength and experience as a Contractor on work of the nature contemplated in the proposed Contract. Proposers are encouraged to submit records of work of similar nature, size, or extent to that proposed under these specifications and requirements. A reasonable inquiry to determine the responsibility of a Proposer will be conducted. The unreasonable failure of a Proposer to promptly supply information in connection with such inquiry including, but not limited to, information regarding past performance, financial stability, and ability to perform on schedule, may be grounds for a determination of nonresponsibility and/or nonresponsiveness with respect to such Proposer. Unfamiliarity with the type of work required by Public Works may be cause for rejection of the Proposal on the basis of nonresponsibility and/or nonresponsibility a

O. <u>Qualifications of Subcontractors</u>

Proposers shall list all Subcontractors, if any, to be used on the List of Subcontractors (Form PW-8). The use of Subcontractors shall be subject to Public Works' approval. Subcontractors shall be properly licensed under the laws of the State of California for the type of work, which they are to perform. Alternate Subcontractors shall not be listed for the same work.

P. <u>Safely Surrendered Baby Law</u>

The Proposer shall notify and provide to its employees, and shall require each Subcontractor, if any, to notify and provide to its employees, a fact sheet regarding the Safely Surrendered Baby Law, its implementation in Los Angeles County, and where and how to safely surrender a baby. The fact sheet is set forth in Part II, Exhibit D, of this solicitation document and is also available on the Internet at www.babysafela.org for printing purposes.

Q. Term of Proposals

All Proposals shall be firm offers and may not be withdrawn for a period of 270 days following the deadline for submission of Proposals.

R. <u>Truth and Accuracy of Representations</u>

False, misleading, incomplete, or deceptively unresponsive statements in connection with a Proposal will be sufficient cause for the rejection of the Proposal. The evaluation and determination in this area will be at the Director's sole judgment and the Director's judgment will be final.

S. Wages, Materials, and Other Costs

It is the responsibility of the Proposer to calculate the Proposal price to take into consideration a possible escalation of wages, materials, and other costs during the Contract period. The Board, County, Public Works, District(s), or Director make no representations regarding future costs or the rate of wages that may become necessary to pay employees of the Contractor for the work performed during the Contract period.

T. <u>Contractor Independence</u>

A Proposer or its subsidiary or Subcontractor (Proposer), is prohibited from submitting a bid or proposal in a County solicitation if the Proposer has provided advice or consultation for the solicitation. A Proposer is also prohibited from submitting a bid or proposal in a County solicitation if the Proposer has developed or prepared any of the solicitation materials on behalf of the County. A violation of this provision shall result in the disqualification of the Proposer from participation in the County solicitation or the termination or cancellation of any resultant County contract. This provision shall survive the expiration, or other termination of this Agreement.

U. <u>Conflict of Interest</u>

Proposer shall comply with the provisions under County Ordinance 2.180. Failure to comply with this Paragraph may be considered a breach of contract.

Notwithstanding any other section of the Los Angeles County Code, the County shall not contract with, and shall reject any bid or proposal submitted by, the persons or entities specified below, unless the Board of Supervisors finds that special circumstances exist, which justify the approval of such contract:

- 1. Employees of the county or of the public agencies for which the Board of Supervisors is the governing body;
- 2. Profit-making firms or businesses in which employees described in subparagraph 1 above serve as officers, principals, partners or major shareholders;
- 3. Persons who, within the immediately preceding 12 months, came within the provisions of subparagraph 1 above, and who:
 - a. Were employed in positions of substantial responsibility in the area of service to be performed by the contract; or
 - b. Participated in any way in developing the contract or its service specifications; and

4. Profit-making firms or businesses in which the former employees, described in subparagraph 3 above, serve as officers, principals, partners or major shareholders.

V. Acceptance of Terms and Conditions

Each Proposer understands and agrees that submission of Proposals in response to this RFP constitutes acknowledgment and acceptance of, and willingness to comply with, all terms and conditions of this RFP, including all addenda to the RFP.

W. <u>Contractors with Unresolved Disallowed Costs</u>

If Proposer's/Bidder's compliance with a County contract has been reviewed by the A-C within the last 10 years, Proposer/Bidder must not have unresolved questioned costs identified by the A-C in an amount over \$100,000.00 that are confirmed to be disallowed costs by the contracting County department and remain unpaid for a period of six months or more from the date of disallowance, unless such disallowed costs are the subject of current good faith negotiations to resolve the disallowed costs, in the opinion of the contracting County department.

SECTION 4

EVALUATION OF PROPOSALS, AWARD, AND EXECUTION OF CONTRACT

A. <u>Award of Contract</u>

Subject to the right of the Board to make the ultimate decisions concerning the award of Contracts, the County intends to award a Contract to the highest-rated Proposer or Proposers based on the evaluation criteria in Part I, Section 4.E, Evaluation Criteria, whose Proposal(s) provide(s) the most beneficial program and price with all other factors considered. The County retains the right to select a Proposal other than the Proposal receiving the highest number of points, if County determines, in its sole discretion, another Proposal is the most overall qualified, cost-effective, responsive, responsible, and in the best interest of the County. The recommended awardee shall sign and return the Agreement within 14 calendar days of its mailing to the recommended awardee for signature by Public Works. The recommended awardee shall submit copies of its proof of insurance coverage, within 14 days after Board approval of the proposed Contract or at least 14 days prior to the proposed Contract's start date, whichever occurs last. Work under the proposed Contract cannot begin before proof of valid insurance coverage is submitted to Public Works.

B. Final Contract Award by Board

Notwithstanding a recommendation by Public Works, the Board retains the right to exercise its judgment concerning the selection of a Proposal, the terms of any resultant Contract/agreement, and to determine which Proposal best serves the interests of the County. The Board is the ultimate decision-making body and makes the final determinations necessary to arrive at a decision to award, or not award, a Contract, or to award a Contract to a Proposer other than the highest-rated Proposer.

C. Evaluation of Proposals

- 1. All responses to this RFP become the property of the County. Upon receipt of the Proposal as specified and evaluation of Proposals in accordance with the evaluation criteria set forth below, Public Works may recommend the award of a Contract to one or more of those submitting Proposals. The proposed Contract may be submitted to the Board for consideration and possible approval.
- 2. The County may require whatever evidence it deems necessary to determine the Proposer's overall and specific abilities to meet the requirements of proposed Contract over the entire Contract term. This determination will be based on, but not limited to, an evaluation of the Proposer's experience, personnel, financial stability and resources, work plan, cost to perform requested services, and staffing plan.

- 3. The County reserves the sole right to judge the Proposer's written and oral representations and to review, evaluate, and select the successful Proposal(s).
- 4. The County may make on-site inspections of Proposer's current jobs and/or facilities.
- 5. The County, in its sole discretion, may elect to waive any error or informalities in the form of a Proposal or any other disparity, if, as a whole, the Proposal substantially complies with the RFP's requirements.
- 6. The County may utilize the services of appropriate experts to assist in the evaluation process.

D. <u>Pass/Fail Review</u>

Proposals will be reviewed on a Pass/Fail basis concerning the items listed below. Proposals not meeting all of these requirements may be rejected as nonresponsive:

- 1. Proposer is signed on the electronic sign-in-sheet as attending the Proposers' Conference.
- 2. Proposal was submitted electronically using the BidExpress method described in Part I, Section 2.B, Proposal Submission. Any Proposal received after the closing date and time specified in the Notice of Request for Proposals will be rejected.
- 3. Proposer and Subcontractors, if any, has demonstrated that it complies with all minimum requirements as outlined in Part I, Section 1.B, Minimum Mandatory Requirements, and has submitted a completed and signed Form PW-20.
- 4. Proposer submitted information regarding Experience and Work Plan as outlined in Part I, Section 2.A
- 5. Proposer and Subcontractors, if any, have completed and signed all appropriate forms.
- 6. Proposer's total sum as shown on their submitted Form PW-2, Schedule of Prices shall not exceed \$670,000.
- 7. The County will not allow any Proposer's exceptions, additions, conditions, limitations, modifications or provisions to the RFP and Contract.

E. Evaluation Criteria

All Proposals will receive a composite score (rating) and be ranked in numerical sequence from high to low based on the following criteria:

1. Proposed Price (25 points)

The proposed price should accurately reflect the Proposer's cost of providing the required products and services and any profit expected during the Contract term. Prior to scoring, the proposed prices must be adjusted in accordance with the LSBE, DVBE, or SE Preference Programs, as applicable.

LSBE, DVBE, or SE Preference Programs: To the extent permitted by State and Federal law, should one or more of the bidders qualify for the County's Preference Programs stated in Part I of Form PW-9, Request for County's Preference Programs Consideration and CBE Firm/Organization Information Form, the price component points will be adjusted prior to scoring as follows: 15 percent of the lowest price proposed will be calculated, which shall not exceed \$150,000, and that amount will be deducted from the prices submitted by all LSBE, DVBE, or SE Bidders who requested and were granted the LSBE, DVBE, or SE Preference. The LSBE, DVBE, or SE Preference will not reduce or change the Proposer's payment, which is based on the Proposer's bid amount.

Subject to such adjustment(s), the lowest Total Adjusted Proposed Annual Price quoted in the Schedule of Prices (Form PW-2) will receive the full weight of this evaluated item. Other Proposals will receive a prorated score calculated as follows: divide the lowest Total Adjusted Proposed Annual Price by each other Proposer's Total Adjusted Proposed Annual Price and multiply the result by the maximum possible points for this evaluation criterion. The Proposal with the lowest Total Adjusted Proposed Annual Price may not necessarily be awarded a Contract.

- 2. Performance History/References (10 points)
 - a. Potential Points

Public Works will attempt to obtain the required number of Proposer's references for overall satisfaction with Proposer's services, with priority given to services provided in the following order: County of Los Angeles departments, other counties, cities, governmental entities, nonprofit entities, private companies, etc. Proposer may receive up to a maximum of 2.5 points for each responding reference up to a total of 4 responding references. On Form PW-6, Proposer's Reference List, Proposers must identify all Contracts with the County of Los Angeles during the previous 3 years and must identify County's Contacts for each Contract. Public Works reserves the right to utilize any reference of Proposer, County or other, listed or not listed. Proposer shall receive zero points for each of the minimum required references not received.

b. Potential Deductions

In addition to the references provided, the review will include the Contractor Alert Reporting Database (CARD), if applicable, reflecting past performance history on County or other Contracts. If references fail to substantiate Proposer's description of services provided; references fail to support that Proposer has a continuing pattern of providing capable, productive, and skilled personnel and services; or a significant unacceptable weakness in references may result in a low or zero score. Additionally, a Proposer's unacceptable performance on another County Contract(s), as documented by Contractor Alert Reporting Database (CARD) by an unfavorable reference, may result in point deductions up to 100 percent of the total points awarded in this evaluation category. A score of zero in this evaluation category may result in rejection of the Proposal as nonresponsive.

References may be contacted by telephone, facsimile, mail, express delivery, or e-mail. It is the Proposer's responsibility to ensure that accurate and timely contact information is included in the Proposal. Public Works will ordinarily not make repeated attempts to contact references and will ordinarily not contact the Proposer to correct bad phone numbers, etc. It is the Proposer's responsibility to ensure that its references respond promptly to Public Works' requests for information.

3. Experience (30 points)

Proposers will be evaluated on the Experience submitted as part of Section 2.A.5 (Experience). The evaluators may give reduced scores to any Proposer that omits or fails to sufficiently address any of the items specified in Section 2.A.5 of this RFP. Failure to demonstrate the minimum lengths of experience performing the service may result in rejection of the Proposal as nonresponsive.

The evaluators may award higher points for the higher quality and quantity of experience of the Proposer, its key personnel, supervising employees, and Subcontractors, if any, in providing the requested services to organizations. Greater weight will be given to services provided to agencies of similar size and nature. The evaluators may consider the Proposer's description of its capabilities, resumes of key personnel (Part I, Section 2.A.5), and any other relevant information including, but not limited to, pending litigation and judgments and a review of terminated Contract(s) reported on Form PW-13, Proposer's List of Terminated Contracts. The evaluators may consider the safety record of the Proposer and any Subcontractors to ensure that they have provided services in a safe manner. Significant unacceptable weakness in quality or quantity of experience may result in a low or zero score. A score of zero in this evaluation category may result in rejection of the Proposal as nonresponsive.

4. Work Plan (30 points)

Proposers will be evaluated on the Work Plan submitted as part of Section 2.A.6 (Work Plan). The evaluators may give reduced scores to any Work Plan that omits or fails to sufficiently address any of the items specified in Section 2.A.6 of this RFP. Evaluation and scoring of the Proposer's Work

> Secondary School Environmental Education (BRC0000195)

Plan will be based on the extent to which it demonstrates that the Proposer is likely to meet or exceed the performance requirements set forth in Exhibit A, Scope of Work; to demonstrate creativity and innovation that exceed the minimum requirements of the Scope of Work; to render timely and responsive service to Public Works; to respond to contingencies and emergencies; and to provide a professional level of quality in the service and work product. The highest scores will be awarded to the most comprehensive and detailed work plans that are highly likely to lead the Contractor to exceed minimum work requirements.

The evaluators will award higher scores to work plans that commit to specific staffing levels and staff qualifications that exceed the requirements of the work.

Comprehensiveness of the Work Plan will be evaluated based on detailed, specific discussion of all issues relevant to the work. These may include personnel management, training, subcontracting, recruitment and replacement, supervision, supplies, equipment, identification badges, safety, communications, quality control, and other issues.

The evaluation committee may make these determinations from all relevant information presented in the Proposal, which may include the work plan, staffing plan, quality assurance plan, schedules, and other documents.

The evaluation committee may also make this determination from all relevant information presented in the Proposer's written Quality Assurance Program (Program), which may include, but is not limited to, policies and procedures, inspection fundamentals as well as a description of quality control documentation, review, and reporting. Failure of the Proposer to designate a qualified inspector that will be provided by Proposer to monitor compliance of the Program and deal with customer complaints and inquiries will result in a reduced score in this category. If a Subcontractor is to perform Quality Assurance, the Program must detail how that Subcontractor will interface with the Proposer and comply with the Program.

Significant unacceptable weakness in any of the Work Plan subject areas or omission of a Work Plan from the Proposal at the time of submission may result in a low or zero score. A score of zero in this evaluation category may result in rejection of the Proposal as nonresponsive.

5. Interview/Presentation (5 Points)

The Proposer's presentation team consisting of a minimum of three to five staff (managing employees, account manager, environmental service learning coordinator, etc.) that are listed in its proposal shall make a presentation and participate in an ensuing interview session within two weeks' notice provided by the County. The presentation team shall provide up to a 30-minute presentation followed by a 15-minute session for questions from

the County. The presentation and interview will include but is not limited to the following topics.

- i. Demonstration of how the Proposer's strategic vision, planning, and methodology of execution will achieve and/or exceed the Los Angeles County Public Works' Secondary School Environmental Education Program's goals.
- ii. Demonstration of how the Team's communication, collaboration, management, and methodology of execution will result in a coherent and unified effort for the Proposer's program to achieve and/or exceed the Los Angeles County Public Works' Secondary School Environmental Education Program's goals.
- iii. Demonstration of how the team will proactively adapt to, as well as react to, unforeseen/changing event conditions and/or requests from the County.
- iv. Presentation by the facilitator(s) of a previously implemented environmental education public outreach, demonstrating facilitator's knowledge of environmental issues.

The evaluators may award up to 5 points for this category. Significant or unacceptable weakness in any part of the presentation or interview may result in a low or zero score. A zero score in this evaluation category may result in rejection of the Proposal as nonresponsive.

6. Additional Criteria

These criteria are not exclusive. The County reserves the right to apply additional evaluation criteria.

F. <u>Negotiation</u>

The County reserves the right to negotiate the terms, conditions, and price of the Proposal, in the sole discretion of the County, to achieve the most beneficial program and price for the County. The County, in its sole discretion, may limit the negotiation, if any, to one or more responsive and responsible Proposers who receive the highest scores in a preliminary scoring of Proposals in accordance with the evaluation criteria set forth in this Part I, Section 4.E, Evaluation Criteria. The negotiation with the Proposer(s) will not result in a change in the rating of the Proposers. If a satisfactory Contract cannot be negotiated, the County may, at its sole discretion, begin Contract negotiations with the next highest-rated Proposer who submitted a Proposal, as determined by the County.

SECTION 5

PROTEST POLICY

A. <u>Protest Policy Review Process</u>

- 1. Under Board Policy No. 5.055 (Services Contract Solicitation Protest), any prospective Proposer may request a review of the requirements under a solicitation for a Board-approved services Contract, as described in paragraph C, Solicitation Requirements Review, below. Any Proposer may request a review of a disqualification or of a proposed Contract award under such a solicitation, as described respectively in Sections below. Additionally, any Proposer may obtain copies of Proposals and Public Works evaluation documents as provided in Part I, Section 3, paragraph H. Under any such review, it is the responsibility of the Proposer challenging the decision of Public Works to demonstrate that Public Works committed a sufficiently material error in the solicitation process to justify invalidation of a solicitation or a proposed Contract award as the case may be.
- 2. Throughout the review process, the County has no obligation to delay or otherwise postpone an award of Contract based on a Proposer protest. In all cases, the County reserves the right to make an award when it is determined to be in the best interest of the County of Los Angeles to do so.

B. <u>Department Level Reviews</u>

Unless State or Federal statutes or regulations otherwise provide, the level of review as provided under the protest policy are as follows:

- Solicitation Requirements
- Disqualification Review
- Proposed Contractor Selection Review

C. <u>Solicitation Requirements Review</u>

Any person or entity may seek a Solicitation Requirements Review by submitting a written request for review to Public Works conducting the solicitation as described in this paragraph. A Request for a Solicitation Requirements Review may be denied, in Public Works' sole discretion, if the request does not satisfy all of the following criteria:

1. The request is made within the time frame identified in the solicitation document (generally within ten business days of issuance of the solicitation document).

- 2. The request includes documentation (e.g., letterhead, business card, etc.), which identifies the underlying authority of the person or entity to submit a Proposal.
- 3. The request itemizes in appropriate detail, each matter contested, and factual reasons for the requested review.
- 4. The request asserts either that:
 - a. Application of the minimum requirements, evaluation criteria, and/or business requirements unfairly disadvantages the person or entity; or,
 - b. Due to unclear instructions, the process may result in the County not receiving the best possible responses from prospective Proposers.
- 5. Requests for a Solicitation Requirements Review not satisfying all of these criteria may, in the department's sole discretion, be denied.
- 6. The Solicitation Requirements Review will be completed and Public Works' determination shall be provided to the requesting person or entity, in writing, within a reasonable time prior to the bid/Proposal due date.

D. <u>Place to Submit Requests for Review</u>

All Requests for Review shall be submitted to the Contract Analyst.

- E. <u>Disqualification Review</u>
 - 1. A bid/Proposal may be disqualified from consideration because Public Works determined it was nonresponsive at any time during the review/evaluation process. If Public Works determines that a bid/Proposal is disqualified due to nonresponsiveness, Public Works shall notify the Proposer in writing.
 - 2. Upon receipt of the written determination of nonresponsiveness, the Proposer may submit a Transmittal Form to Request a Disqualification Review within the timeframe specified in the disqualification document.
 - 3. A request for a Disqualification Review may, in Public Works' sole discretion, be denied if the request does not satisfy all of the following criteria:
 - a. The request for a Disqualification Review is submitted within the timeframe specified in the disqualification review.
 - b. The request for a Disqualification Review asserts that the determination of disqualification due to bid/Proposal nonresponsiveness was erroneous (e.g., factual errors, etc.) and provides factual support on each ground asserted as well as copies of all documents and other material that support the assertions.

- 4. The Disqualification Review shall be completed and the determination shall be provided to the requesting Proposer, in writing, prior to the conclusion of the evaluation process.
- F. <u>Debriefing Process</u>

For solicitations where Proposals are evaluated and scored in accordance to Section 4, Evaluation of Proposals, the following provisions shall apply:

- 1. Upon completion of the evaluation, Public Works will notify the remaining Proposers in writing that Public Works is entering negotiations with another Proposer. Upon receipt of the letter, any nonselected Proposer may submit a written request for a Debriefing within the time frame specified in the letter. A request for a Debriefing may, in Public Works' sole discretion, be denied if the request is not received within the specified time frame.
- 2. The purpose of the Debriefing is to compare the requesting Proposer's response to the solicitation document with the evaluation document. The requesting Proposer shall be debriefed only on its response. Because Contract negotiations are not yet complete, responses from other Proposers shall not be discussed, although Public Works may inform the requesting Proposer of its relative ranking.
- 3. During or following the debriefing, Public Works will instruct the requesting Proposer of the manner and time frame in which the requesting Proposer must notify Public Works of its intent to request a Proposed Contractor Selection Review, below, if the requesting Proposer is not satisfied with the results of the Debriefing.

G. <u>Proposed Contractor Selection Review Process</u>

Any Proposer that has timely submitted a notice of its intent to request a Proposed Contractor Selection Review as described in paragraph F, above, may submit a written request for a Proposed Contractor Selection Review in the manner and time frame as specified by Public Works. For low-bid solicitations, where applicable, upon selection of the lowest-cost, responsive, and responsible bidder, Public Works will notify the remaining bidders in writing that Public Works is entering negotiations with another bidder. Public Works will instruct the remaining bidders of the manner and time frame in which each remaining bidder must notify Public Works of its intent to request a Proposed Contractor Selection Review, should such remaining bidder desire to have such a review performed.

A request for a Proposed Contractor Selection Review may, in Public Works' sole discretion, be denied if the request does not satisfy all of the following criteria:

1. The request for a Proposed Contractor Selection Review is submitted timely (i.e., by the date and time specified by Public Works).

- 2. The person or entity requesting a Proposed Contractor Selection Review asserts in appropriate detail with factual reasons one or more of the following grounds for review:
 - a. Public Works materially failed to follow procedures specified in its solicitation document. This includes:
 - i. Failure to correctly apply the standards for reviewing the Proposal format requirements.
 - ii. Failure to correctly apply the standards, and/or follow the prescribed methods, for evaluating the Proposals as specified in the solicitation document.
 - iii. Use of evaluation criteria that were different from the evaluation criteria disclosed in the solicitation document.
 - b. Public Works made identifiable mathematical or other errors in evaluating bids/Proposals, resulting in the Proposer receiving an incorrect score, and not being selected as the recommended Contractor.
 - c. For applicable solicitations where responses are evaluated and scored, a member of the Evaluation Committee demonstrated bias in the conduct of the evaluation.
 - d. Another basis for review as provided by State or Federal law.
- 3. The request for a Proposed Contractor Selection Review sets forth sufficient detail to demonstrate that, but for Public Works' alleged failure, the Proposer would have been the lowest-cost, responsive, and responsible bid or the highest-scored Proposal, as the case may be.

Upon completing the Proposed Contractor Selection Review, Public Works representative shall issue a written decision to the Proposer within a reasonable time following receipt of the request for a Proposed Contractor Selection Review, and always before the date the Contract award recommendation is to be heard by the Board. The written decision shall additionally instruct the Proposer of the manner and time frame for requesting a review by a County Independent Review, paragraph H, below.

H. <u>County Independent Review</u>

1. Any Proposer that is not satisfied with the results of the Proposed Contractor Selection Review may submit a written request for a County Independent Review in the manner and time frame specified by Public Works in Public Works' written decision regarding the Proposed Contractor Selection Review.

- 2. A request for a County Independent Review may, in the County's sole discretion, be denied if the request does not satisfy all of the following criteria:
 - a. The request for a review by a County Independent Review is submitted timely (i.e., by the date and time specified by Public Works).
 - b. The person or entity requesting review by a County Independent Review has limited the request to items raised in the Proposed Contractor Selection Review as listed in paragraph G above.
- 3. Proposer that request a County Independent Review may not add new assertions or documentation to the assertions presented in their Proposed Contractor Selection Review. Proposers may remove assertions presented in their Proposed Contractor Selection Review if they feel that the department response has resolved their assertion.
- 4. Upon completion of the County Independent Review's, Internal Services Department will forward its report to Public Works, which will provide a copy to the Proposer.

County of Los Angeles Lobbyist Ordinance



IT'S THE LAW

It may affect you!

Chapter 2.160 of the Los Angeles County Code requires Lobbyists, Lobbying Firms and Lobbyist Employers to register with the Executive Office of the Board of Supervisors. This ordinance imposes extensive reporting requirements on individuals, businesses and other organizations. It places restrictions on the activities of anyone seeking to influence an official action of the County of Los Angeles including actions of the Board of Supervisors or the granting or denial of County contracts, licenses, permits, grants and franchises.

YOU MAY BE CONSIDERED A COUNTY LOBBYIST

If you are compensated to communicate directly (or through agents) with any County official for the purpose of influencing official action, then you may be required to register with the Executive Office of the Board of Supervisors. The requirement to register is the same whether you are an employee of, or on contract with, a firm or organization with business before the County. Additionally, an individual or business entity may be considered a County Lobbying Firm if it receives compensation to influence the County on behalf of any **other** persons or businesses. An individual, business entity or organization that employs or contracts with another individual or firm to represent or make contacts with a County agency on their behalf to influence County action may be considered a County Lobbyist Employer who must also register. If in doubt, it is best to register.

Furthermore, each person or entity who is not otherwise required to register as a County Lobbyist, Lobbying Firm or Lobbyist Employer, but who directly or indirectly expends \$5,000 or more during a calendar quarter to influence official action need not register BUT must report the expenditure to the Executive Office of the Board of Supervisors on a form available from the Executive Office.

REGISTERING IS IMPORTANT

Failure to comply with the ordinance may subject offending Lobbyists, Lobbying Firms, and Lobbyist Employers to serious penalties including fines up to \$2,000 and denial of contracts, licenses, permits, grants or franchises. Moreover, some violators may be refused permission to address the Board of Supervisors or any County commission.

HERE'S HOW TO COMPLY WITH THE LAW

Within 10 days of qualifying as a County Lobbyist, Lobbying Firm, or Lobbyist Employer as described in the ordinance, you must register with the Executive Office of the Board of Supervisors.



THIS AGREEMENT, made and entered into this _____ day of _____, 2020, by and between the COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES, a subdivision of the State of California, a body corporate and politic (hereinafter referred to as COUNTY) and [Name of CONTRACTOR], a [State of Incorporation] [Form of Entity] (hereinafter referred to as CONTRACTOR).

<u>WITNESSETH</u>

<u>FIRST</u>: The CONTRACTOR, for the consideration hereinafter set forth and the acceptance by the Board of Supervisors (Board) of said COUNTY of the CONTRACTOR'S Proposal filed with the COUNTY on ______, 2020, hereby agrees to provide services as described in this Contract for On-Call Secondary School Environmental Education Program.

<u>SECOND</u>: This AGREEMENT, together with Exhibit A, Scope of Work; Exhibit B, Service Contract General Requirements; Exhibit C, Internal Revenue Service Notice 1015; Exhibit D, Safely Surrendered Baby Law Posters; Exhibit E, Defaulted Property Tax Reduction Program; Exhibit F, Performance Requirements Summary; Exhibit G, Maps and Locations; Exhibit H, Los Angeles County Public Schools; Exhibit I, Los Angeles County Private Schools; Exhibit J, School Enrollment Data; Exhibit K, Program Participation Data; Exhibit L, Workshop Flyers; Exhibit M, Presentation Guidelines; Exhibit N, Summer Institute Flyer; Exhibit O, Promotional Items; and Exhibit P, Waiver Release Forms; the CONTRACTOR'S Proposal, all attached hereto; the Request for Proposals; and Addenda to the Request for Proposals, all of which are incorporated herein by reference, are agreed by the COUNTY and the CONTRACTOR to constitute the Contract.

<u>THIRD</u>: The COUNTY agrees, in consideration of satisfactory performance of the foregoing services in strict accordance with the Contract specifications to the satisfaction of the Director of Public Works, to pay the CONTRACTOR pursuant to the Schedule of Prices set forth in the Proposal and attached hereto as Form PW-2, an amount not to exceed \$_____ per year, or such greater amount as the Board may approve (Maximum Contract Sum).

<u>FOURTH</u>: This Contract's initial term shall be for a period of one year commencing upon the Board's approval and execution between both parties. The COUNTY shall have the sole option to renew this Contract term for up to three additional one-year periods and six month-to-month extensions, for a maximum total Contract term of 4 years and six months. Each such option shall be exercised at the sole discretion of the COUNTY. The COUNTY, acting through the Director, may give a written notice of intent to renew this Contract at least ten days prior to the end of each term. At the sole discretion of the COUNTY, in lieu of renewing the Contract for the full one year, this Contract may be renewed on a month-to-month basis, upon written notice to the CONTRACTOR at least ten days prior to the end of a term. The Director will provide a written notice of nonrenewal at least ten days before the last day of any term, in which case this Contract shall expire as of midnight on the last day of that term. Where all option years have been exercised, the Director will not provide a written notice of nonrenewal.

<u>FIFTH</u>: The CONTRACTOR shall bill monthly, in arrears, for the work performed during the preceding month. Work performed shall be billed at the hourly rates and/or unit prices quoted in Form PW-2, Schedule of Prices.

<u>SIXTH</u>: Public Works will make payment to the CONTRACTOR within 30 days of receipt and approval of a properly completed and undisputed invoice. However, should the CONTRACTOR be certified by the COUNTY as a Local Small Business Enterprise, payment will be made in accordance with Board of Supervisors Policy No. 3.035, Small Business Liaison and Prompt Payment Program. Each invoice shall be in triplicate (original and two copies) and shall itemize the work completed. The invoices shall be submitted to:

<u>SEVENTH</u>: In no event shall the aggregate total amount of compensation paid to the CONTRACTOR exceed the amount of compensation authorized by the Board. Such aggregate total amount is the Maximum Contract Sum.

<u>EIGHTH</u>: The CONTRACTOR understands and agrees that only the designated Public Works Contract Manager is authorized to request or order work under this Contract. The CONTRACTOR acknowledges that the designated Contract Manager is not authorized to request or order any work that would result in the CONTRACTOR earning an aggregate compensation in excess of this Contract's Maximum Contract Sum.

<u>NINTH</u>: If requested by the Contractor, the contract (hourly, daily, monthly, etc.) amount may, at the sole discretion of the County, be increased at the time of contract renewal, if exercised by the County, based on the most recently published percentage change in the U.S. Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics' Consumer Price Index (CPI) for the Los Angeles-Long Beach-Anaheim area for the 12-month period preceding the renewal date, which shall be the effective date for any Cost-of-Living Adjustment (COLA). However, any increase shall not exceed the general salary movement granted to County employees as determined by the Chief Executive Officer as of each July 1 for the prior 12-month period. Furthermore, should fiscal circumstances ultimately prevent the Board from approving any increase in County employee salaries, no COLA will be granted. Upon approval of COLA, a notification will be sent to the Contractor.

<u>TENTH</u>: In the event that terms and conditions, which may be listed in the CONTRACTOR'S Proposal, conflict with the COUNTY'S specifications, requirements, and terms and conditions as reflected in this AGREEMENT including, but not limited to, Exhibits A through P, inclusive, the COUNTY'S provisions shall control and be binding.

<u>ELEVENTH</u>: The CONTRACTOR agrees in strict accordance with the Contract specifications and conditions to meet the COUNTY'S requirements.

<u>TWELFTH</u>: This Contract constitutes the entire agreement between the COUNTY and the CONTRACTOR with respect to the subject matter of this Contract and supersedes all prior and contemporaneous agreements and understandings. This CONTRACT may be signed by the parties hereto in separate counterparts, including both counterparts that are executed on paper and counterparts that are in the form of electronic signatures. Electronic signatures include facsimile or e-mail electronic signatures. Each executed counterpart shall be deemed an original. All counterparts, taken together, constitute the executed Agreement.

The parties hereby acknowledge and agree that electronic records and electronic signatures, as well as facsimile signatures, used in connection with the execution of this Agreement and electronic signatures, facsimile signatures or signatures transmitted by electronic mail in so-called pdf format shall be legal and binding and shall have the same full force and effect as if a paper original of this Agreement had been delivered and had been signed using a handwritten signature. Contractor and County (i) agree that an electronic signature, whether digital or encrypted, of a party to this Agreement is intended to authenticate this writing and to have the same force and effect as a manual signature, (ii) intend to be bound by the signatures (whether original, faxed or electronic) on any document sent or delivered by facsimile, or electronic mail, or other electronic means, (iii) are aware that the other party will reply on such signatures, and (iv) hereby waive any defenses to the enforcement of the terms of this Agreement based on the foregoing forms of signature. If this Agreement has been executed by electronic signature, all parties executing this document are expressly consenting under the United States Federal Electronic Signatures in Global and National Commerce Act of 2000 (E-SIGN) and California Uniform Electronic Transactions Act (UETA)(Cal. Civ. Code § 1633.1, et seq.), that a signature by fax, e-mail or other electronic means shall constitute an Electronic Signature to an Electronic Record under both E-SIGN and UETA with respect to this specific transaction.

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SCOPE OF WORK ON-CALL SECONDARY SCHOOL ENVIRONMENTAL EDUCATION PROGRAM (BRC0000195)

A. <u>Public Works Contract Manager</u>

Public Works Contract Manager (CM) will be Ms. Edna Gandarilla of Environmental Programs Division, who may be contacted at (626) 458-6536 or <u>eganda@pw.lacountv.gov</u>, Monday through Thursday, 7 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. The CM is the only person authorized by Public Works to request work of the Contractor. From time to time, Public Works may change the CM. The Contractor will be notified in writing when there is a change in the Contract Manager.

B. <u>Work Location</u>

Contractor shall perform the contracted services at designated independent, public and private schools within incorporated cities and unincorporated areas within County of Los Angeles as shown on Exhibit G, Maps and Locations.

C. <u>Request of Work from Contractor</u>

The County may request contracted services from the Contractor on an oncall and intermittent basis. The County reserves the right to determine if any work is or will be needed and/or requested under this Contract at the County's sole and absolute discretion. The Contractor waives all claims against the County for damages or loss of any nature resulting from the County's failure to use the Contractor's services including, but not limited to, lost profit.

D. Contract Cost

All services required in this Exhibit A, Scope of Work (SOW), shall be included in the prices quoted by the Contractor in Form PW-2, Schedule of Prices, unless stated otherwise in the Contract.

E. Introduction

The County covers an area of over 4,000 square miles with a population of over 10 million residents or nearly 30 percent of the entire population in the State of California. To raise environmental awareness and instill positive behaviors in the County's school aged children, Public Works implements 2 long-term Environmental Education Programs; one for K-5 grade students, and another, the subject of this Program, for 6-12 grade students at independent, private/parochial, and public schools.

The Generation Earth Program (Program) is also commonly referred to as the County's Secondary School Environmental Education Program. The Program provides environmental education to 6-12 grade students by addressing key areas: The Four R's (Reduce, Reuse, Recycle, Rethink), organics management, household hazardous waste (HHW), electronic waste (E-Waste), stormwater pollution prevention, water conservation, and other sustainability messages.

F. <u>Background</u>

Residents and businesses in the County dispose of approximately over 10.7 million tons of solid waste each year, with approximately half disposed of in landfills within the County.

The solid waste industry in California continues to undergo many changes. Many drivers are prompting these changes, including diminishing landfill capacity within the County and new legislative mandates from the State, such as Assembly Bill (AB) 341 (mandatory commercial recycling), AB 1826, AB 1594, and AB 1383 (organics management). Also, in February 2017, China announced a new policy termed the "National Sword" restricting the import of 24 recyclable materials, including low-grade plastics, unsorted mixed-paper, and scrap metals beginning in January of 2018. The County continues to work with the State to continue its efforts to address the need to develop sufficient statewide infrastructure and take a leadership role in the expansion of markets for recycled products. In addition, there is a strong desire to continuously improve and preserve the quality of life for Los Angeles County residents and preserve the environment for future generations.

Public Works implemented public education programs for students in grades K-12 in the cities' and County's unincorporated areas identified in Exhibit G, Maps and Locations, as part of the County's efforts to meet AB 939 waste diversion requirements.

Another key element of the Program has been stormwater pollution prevention. The 2012 National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System Municipal Storm Sewer System Permit issued by the Los Angeles Regional Water Quality Board requires the County to educate school children (K-12 grade) on stormwater pollution prevention.

G. <u>Generation Earth Program Information</u>

The purpose of the Program is to educate 6-12 grade students about the Four R's (Reduce, Reuse, Recycle, Rethink), organics management, HHW/E-Waste, stormwater pollution prevention, water conservation, and other sustainability messages.

The Program was developed approximately 21 years ago and is well known by students and teachers throughout Los Angeles County. The County owns all intellectual property rights to the Program and all materials developed for the Program (e.g., promotional materials, curriculum materials, flyers, logo, and website content).

The County will continue to use the Program to educate 6-12 grade students by using the developed curriculum materials, promotional materials, and program assessment methods. Exhibit G, Maps and Locations, provides a map of Los Angeles County listing the 88 cities and the Los Angeles County unincorporated areas to be served by the Contractor. Exhibits H and I, Los Angeles County Public Schools and Private Schools, provide information on all listed private and public schools located Countywide and in the unincorporated areas. Refer to Exhibit J and Exhibit K, School Enrollment and Program Participation Data, for the total schools, teachers, and students reached annually through the duration of the previous contract. Public Works desires to reach approximately 221,330 students in grades 6-12 annually.

H. <u>Work Description – Tasks/Deliverables</u>

The CM has the sole option to discontinue any approved Task due to time constraints and cost effectiveness concerns. The CM has the right to reallocate or reserve any unspent funds. To achieve the Program's goal, the Contractor shall perform the Tasks identified in Section I of this Exhibit A, SOW, according to the approved Work Plan schedule and Deliverable for each Task. Time extensions for Task completion must be submitted in writing to the CM.

The Contractor shall use staff listed in the Contractor's proposal to perform services. Whenever there is a change in staff, the Contractor shall obtain pre-approval from the CM and the replacement staff shall have equivalent or higher qualifications to perform the work.

I. <u>Tasks and Deliverables</u>

Task 1: Secondary School Environmental Education Work Plan (Work Plan)

The Contractor must create and submit an annual comprehensive Work Plan that demonstrates how the Program will reach 221,330 of all grade 6-12 students of public and private schools in the areas noted in Exhibit G, Maps and Locations, through workshops, Environmental Service Learning projects and the environmental youth summit. The Work Plan must address completion of all Tasks described in this Exhibit A, SOW.

The student population for grades 6-12 is estimated to be 885,320 for Fiscal Year 2018-19, refer to Exhibit J, School Enrollment Data. Thus, the Contractor shall be required to reach a minimum of 221,330 students annually

under this Program. Note that a minimum of 10 percent of the students reached annually must be at schools in the unincorporated area of the County.

- 1. The Work Plan shall include ten workshops (nine 1-day workshops and a 2-day Summer Institute workshop) in a classroom/conference room setting and safe environment supervised by approved staff, to be scheduled at public/private schools, community centers, etc., throughout Los Angeles County where teachers, school administrators, and students can conveniently attend. The workshops must focus on Professional Development, Stormwater Pollution Prevention, and Waste Reduction and Recycling.
- 2. The Work Plan shall demonstrate how the Contractor shall meet the requirements of each Task and Deliverable under this Contract. The Contactor shall identify baselines to measure the effectiveness of each Task.
- 3. The Work Plan shall include the Contractor's organization chart (all staff including subcontractors) and identify the staff assigned to each Task and their title/position, when available.
- 4. The Contractor is encouraged to recommend updates and/or enhancements to all, or any Task components of the Program as described in the Contract.
- 5. The Contractor shall utilize the Program logo and website as applicable for each Task and Deliverable under this Contract.

Deliverable 1: Secondary School Environmental Education (Work Plan)

Within 30 days of the start date of this Contract and annually thereafter before the beginning of each contract year, the Contractor shall prepare and submit a Work Plan inclusive of all the Tasks described in this SOW addressing each item noted in Task 1. With written approval from the CM, the Contractor shall implement the Work Plan and any new enhancements to the Program. This Deliverable will be paid upon completion of the approved annual Work Plan.

Task 2:1-Day Workshops

Sixty days prior to the start of each contract year, the Contractor shall submit the location sites of the nine workshops to be conducted representing all Supervisorial Districts. The nine 1-day workshops per each contract year will focus on the following topics: Professional Development Stormwater Pollution Prevention, and Waste Reduction and Recycling.

Each workshop scheduled must have a minimum of 30 teachers/administrators pre-registered to attend each workshop. Workshop dates and venue locations will be scheduled in a manner that will be convenient and easily accessible for

participants. Any costs for workshop room reservation fees and parking should be included this Task. All workshops must include participants from schools located in both incorporated cities and the unincorporated areas.

I. Professional Development Workshops

Conduct three Professional Development workshops specifically for teachers and school administrators in Los Angeles County. The goal of the workshop is to introduce teachers to the Next Generation Science Standards (NGSS) and Environmental Service Learning as a teaching strategy. Inform teachers on how project-based learning supports NGSS and gives teachers the framework on how to complete Environmental Service Learning projects with their students.

II. Stormwater Pollution Prevention Workshops

Conduct three Stormwater Pollution Prevention workshops for teachers, school administrators, school faculty, and students in Los Angeles County only. The workshops are to bring awareness and educate attendees on issues surrounding stormwater pollution, water conservation, and stormwater capture in Los Angeles County. The goal of the workshop is to provide attendees with the necessary tools to take action in the form of a watershed restoration project that will help improve water quality and empower participants to take responsibility for their campus watershed. To encourage workshop participation, one rain barrel will be given to a teacher through an opportunity drawing at each of the Stormwater Pollution Prevention Workshop. The cost of the rain barrel is included in this Task.

III. Waste Reduction and Recycling Workshops

Conduct three Waste Reduction and Recycling workshops for teachers, school administrators, school faculty, and students in Los Angeles County only. The workshops are to educate attendees on different solid waste issues in Los Angeles County. The goal of the workshop is to provide attendees with the necessary tools for designing, creating, implementing, and monitoring waste reduction and recycling programs on school campuses and to create awareness among students and faculty to promote a positive environmental change. One of the new waste reduction messages must focus on organics management and how students can decrease food waste on school campuses. Student participation in campus food donation programs is important to combat community food insecurity and can help reduce greenhouse gases associated with climate change. To encourage workshop participation, the Contractor will provide one compost bin to a teacher or a student through an opportunity drawing the Contractor conducts in each of the Waste Reduction and Recycling Workshops. The cost of the compost bin is included in this Task.

IV. In conducting the workshops described in this Task, the Contractor shall:

- 1. Develop, revise, print, and mail/e-mail workshop flyers, and develop social media postings. Refer to Exhibit L, Workshop Flyers, to schools to promote the workshops. Developed flyer must be pre-approved by the CM. The cost for postage is included in this Task.
- 2. Develop, revise, print, and provide an electronic or printed evaluation form to be completed by each participant that attends each workshop. The evaluation form must rate the overall program and the Contractor's presenters on a rating scale of 1-5 as follows: 1) Unsatisfactory, 2) Needs Improvement, 3)Satisfactory/Average, 4) Above Average, and 5) Excellent (e.g., effectiveness of presenters, participant interest in the workshop, and include open-ended questions, such as what part of the workshop was most effective, what improvements can be made, etc.).
- 3. Prepare a PowerPoint presentation for each of the three types of workshops as described in this Task. Refer to Exhibit M, Presentation Guidelines, when developing and formatting presentations. As needed, revise the presentations with new information as requested by the CM.
- 4. Print and distribute curriculum materials to participants at the workshops. The cost of printing and distributing materials at the workshops is included in Task 9, Curriculum Materials.
- 5. Provide refreshments (no pre-packaged food items and use reusable utensils) to participants at each of the workshops (e.g., water, coffee, fruit, muffins, cookies, etc.). The cost of providing refreshments is included in this Task 2, 1-Day Workshops. The Contractor will use County's Waste Free Guide when planning the workshops.
- 6. Incorporate a free webinar component into each of the nine workshops and to be offered as an option to teachers and school administrators who are unable to attend in person but would still like to participate in the workshops. Example of software to use for the webinars must be submitted for CM approval. In addition, event participants should be able to register using Eventbrite or through Google forms. The Contractor will be responsible for using webinar software and facilitating the webinars in addition to keeping track of attendees throughout the duration of the workshop, which also includes answering participants' questions through the webinar. Cost of webinar software is the Contractor's responsibility.
- 7. Within 7 days of each workshop, submit a workshop concise recap report, with photographs of the workshop. The workshop recap report shall include: date/name of workshop, number in attendance, school name and Supervisorial District, attendee's name, identify attendees as teacher,

administrator, or student, highlights, photographs, and recommendations to enhance the workshops. A summary of the completed evaluation forms will be included in the recap report in addition to including a copy of the completed evaluation forms. Pictures taken of participants must have a completed Waiver Release Form, as shown in Exhibit P, Waiver Release Form(s).

- 8. Note: Presenters must wear Generation Earth polo shirts and khaki pants at all workshops. The design/purchase of the Generation Earth polo shirts and khaki pants for all staff shall be included in this Task.
- 9. Purchase three rain barrels that will be provided through an opportunity drawing in each of the three Stormwater Pollution Prevention workshops to a participating teacher/school administrator.
- 10. Purchase three compost bins that will be provided through an opportunity drawing in each of the three Recycling and Waste Reduction workshops to a participating teacher/school administrator or student.

Deliverable 2: 1-Day Workshops

Within 60 days of the start of each contract year, the Contractor shall:

- 1. Submit a list of the 1-day workshops with the location, date, and time to be scheduled during each contract year. All workshops must be equally represented in each Supervisorial District. If a workshop date needs to be rescheduled, the Contractor will submit the request in writing for approval to the CM.
- Develop and submit all three workshops' (Professional Development, Stormwater Pollution Prevention, and Waste Reduction and Recycling) PowerPoint presentations, refer to Exhibit M, Presentation Guidelines. PowerPoint presentations must be reviewed and approved before workshops are conducted.
- 3. Develop, submit, and print workshop flyers and evaluation forms that must be reviewed and approved before the workshops are conducted.
- 4. Promote 1-day workshops by mailing/e-mailing workshop flyers including social media posting to all middle school and high school teachers/school administrators regarding each workshop. All costs associated with the workshop flyers are included in this Task.
- 5. Develop and maintain social media postings for various media platforms.

- 6. Purchase three rain barrels for the Stormwater Pollution Prevention Workshops.
- 7. Purchase three compost bins for the Waste Reduction and Recycling Workshops.
- 8. All materials will be approved by the CM prior to distribution.

Task 3: Summer Institute Workshop

Sixty days prior to the start of each contract year, the Contractor shall recommend a location to conduct the Summer Institute workshop (a 2-day Professional Development workshop) once a year preferably during early summer break or a time that is accommodating to teachers' schedules in the school year.

The Summer Institute workshop is only open to teachers and/or school administrators that teach in middle or high schools within Los Angeles County. The annual attendance goal is a minimum of 25 teachers to attend the 2-day workshop. The Summer Institute workshop must include participants from schools located in incorporated cities and the unincorporated areas. The Contractor will be responsible for providing morning refreshments and lunch. The transportation cost for the field trip is included in this Task. Printing of curriculum materials is included in Task 9, Curriculum Materials.

The Summer Institute workshop will focus on providing in-depth knowledge to teachers on key environmental issues, such as waste reduction and stormwater pollution prevention issues facing Los Angeles County. Teachers will also participate in a field trip to a local landfill, recycling facility, or another field trip destination as appropriate. The transportation cost for the field trip is included in this Task 3, Summer Institute Workshop. The workshop will also include a resource fair where pre-approved local organizations are invited to host an information booth where they can share their resources with teachers in order to assist them in integrating Environmental Service Learning projects on their school campuses.

The Contractor will coordinate participation of one teacher who is an active participant of the Program who can participate as a voluntary presenter to share their experience in developing and implementing an Environmental Service Learning project utilizing the Program curriculum materials. Teachers will be provided with a \$100 stipend for their participation as a presenter. The \$100 stipend will be paid for out of this Task 3, Summer Institute Workshop.

To this end the Contractor shall:

1. Develop, revise, print, and mail/e-mail Summer Institute workshop flyer, and develop social media postings, refer to Exhibit N, Summer Institute Flyer, to schools to promote the workshop. The cost for postage shall be included in this Task. The flyers will be approved by the CM.

- Develop, revise, print, and provide an electronic or printed evaluation form to be completed by each participant that attends the Summer Institute workshop. The evaluation form must rate the overall program and the Contractor presenters on a rating scale of 1-5 as follows: 1) Unsatisfactory, 2) Needs Improvement, 3) Satisfactory/Average, 4) Above Average, and 5) Excellent (e.g., effectiveness of presenters, participant interest in the workshop, and include open-ended questions, such as what part of the workshop was most effective, what improvements can be made, etc.).
- 3. Prepare a PowerPoint presentation for the Summer Institute workshop. Refer to Exhibit M, Presentation Guidelines, when developing and formatting presentations, and as needed revise the presentations with new information as requested by the CM.
- 4. Print and distribute curriculum materials to participants at the Summer Institute workshop. The cost of printing and distributing materials at the workshop is included in Task 9, Curriculum Materials.
- 5. Provide refreshments (no pre-packed food items and use reusable utensils), including lunch to participants at the Summer Institute workshop (e.g., water, coffee, fruit, muffins, sandwiches, chips, cookies, etc.). The cost of refreshments is included in this Task 3, Summer Institute Workshop. The Contractor will use the Waste Free Event Guide when planning the Summer Institute Workshop.
- 6. Incorporate a free webinar component into the Summer Institute workshop to be offered as an option to teachers and school administrators who are unable to attend in person but would still like to participate in the workshop. Examples of software to be used for the webinar must be submitted for CM approval. The Contractor will be responsible for using webinar software and facilitating the webinars in addition to keeping track of attendees throughout the duration of the workshop, which also includes answering participant's questions through the webinar. The cost of webinar software is the Contractor's responsibility.
- 7. Within 7 days after the Summer Institute workshop, submit a Summer Institute recap report. The recap report shall include: date/name of workshop, number in attendance, school name and Supervisorial District, attendee's name (identify attendees as teacher or administrator), highlights, photographs, and recommendations to enhance the Summer Institute workshop. A summary of the completed evaluation forms will be included in the recap report in addition to providing a copy of the completed

evaluation forms. Pictures taken of participants must have a completed Waiver Release Form, refer to Exhibit P, Waiver Release Form(s).

8. Note: Presenters must wear Generation Earth polo shirts and khaki pants at the Summer Institute workshop. The design/purchase of the Generation Earth polo shirts and khaki pants for all staff is included in Task 2, 1-Day Workshops.

Deliverable 3: Summer Institute Workshop

Within 60 days of the start of the contract year, the Contractor shall:

- 1. Submit a Summer Institute fact sheet with the location, date, agenda, resource fair participant information, time of the 2-day Summer Institute workshop, and any other important details to be submitted each contract year. If the Summer Institute workshop date needs to be rescheduled the Contractor will submit the request in writing for CM approval.
- 2. Develop and submit the Summer Institute PowerPoint presentation that must follow the County's guidelines, refer to Exhibit M, Presentation Guidelines. PowerPoint presentations must be reviewed and approved before the Summer Institute workshop is conducted.
- 3. Promote the Summer Institute Workshop by mailing/e-mailing flyers and develop social media postings to all middle and high school teachers/school administrators regarding the workshop. All costs associated with the workshop flyer are included in this Task.
- 4. Provide bus transportation services for participants for the field trip portion of the Summer Institute workshop.
- 5. Provide the teacher/presenter with a \$100.00 stipend for their participation.

Task 4: Education Outreach Events

The Contractor shall identify (make efforts to identify as much as possible that all Supervisorial Districts are represented) and attend 10 education outreach events (e.g., teacher/student conferences, teacher trainings, school workshops, etc.) annually that are attended by middle and high school teachers, school administrators and/or students. The education outreach events must be appropriate for promoting the Program and reaching Los Angeles County teachers/school administrators and students.

The Contractor shall:

1. Thirty days prior to the commencement of each contract year, including renewal years, if exercised by the County, submit a proposed schedule

and spreadsheet of recommended education outreach events that the Contractor recommends attending during the contract year. The spreadsheet shall include, but is not limited to event name, date, address, Supervisorial District, expected attendance, staff attending, expected number of teachers, administrators, or students attending an education outreach event, method of participation, such as hosting an information booth or as a speaker promoting the program, potential fees, if any, and how participation will meet the objectives of the Program. The CM reserves the right to modify the annual education outreach events schedule by adding and/or eliminating events and requesting the Contractor to update the spreadsheet.

- 2. Coordinate and attend the approved Education Outreach events.
- 3. If speaking at an education outreach event, develop and submit a PowerPoint presentation following guidelines as shown in Exhibit M, Presentation Guidelines, for review and approval.
- 4. Be responsible for submitting required applications and paying for all applicable registration fees associated with attending the education outreach events. Prior to attending education outreach events, the Contractor shall negotiate an event waiver and government rate, if any. For multiple day events, the Contractor shall recommend attendance on the day with the expected highest attendance.
- 5. Staff each event with a minimum of two staff members. However, if needed, the Contractor shall submit a request for additional staffing for a specific education outreach event that is subject to approval by the CM. The request shall include the list of staff, role of each staff member at the event and provide justification as to why the additional staff is necessary. Setup and teardown are included in this Task.
- 6. Staff each education outreach event upon approval of the CM. The Contractor is to include setup and teardown as part of the time estimate, as well as participation fees, if any, and provide promotional and curriculum materials to participants. Within 7 days of the event, submit a concise school outreach event recap report with photographs of the event. The recap report shall include: date/name of event, number in attendance, number of teachers, school administrators, or students who visited the event/Program booth or how many attended the presentation, name of schools and the Supervisorial District, highlights of the event, and recommendations about attending the event in the future. Pictures taken of students and teachers at any education outreach event may not be taken without first having a photo/video release waiver form completed as shown in Exhibit P, Waiver Release Form(s).

- 7. Conduct intercept surveys of attendees at education outreach events and provide results in the recap event report regarding what attendees know about the Program and in what capacity they have worked with Generation Earth staff.
- 8. Note: Presenters must wear Generation Earth polo shirts and khaki pants at the Education Outreach events. The design/purchase of the Generation Earth polo shirts and khaki pants for all staff are included in Task 2, 1-Day Workshops.
- 9. Purchase two table cloths displaying the Generation Earth logo, website and the County Seal that will be used at the education outreach events.

Deliverable 4: Education Outreach Events

- 1. Within 30 days of the start of this Contract, and 30 days prior to each contract year, the Contractor shall prepare and submit a spreadsheet with a list of the 10 education outreach events to attend on an annual basis.
- 2. The Contractor shall coordinate, staff, and attend each education outreach event approved by the CM.
- 3. Within 7 days after each education outreach event, the Contractor shall submit an outreach event recap report of at least one-two page(s) in length with photographs of the event. The recap report shall include: date/name of event, number of event attendees and the number of teachers and students who visited the information booth or attended the presentation, highlights of the event, and recommendations for attending the event in the future. Events will be paid upon completion and submittal of this education outreach event recap report.
- 4. Be responsible for distributing workshop flyers, promotional materials and curriculum materials at the education outreach events. The cost of development, printing, and purchase of any of these items listed are included in the pricing for the specified Tasks (Task 2, 1-Day Workshops; Task 3, Summer Institute Workshop; Task 8, Promotional Items; and Task 9, Curriculum Materials) in Form PW-2, Schedule of Prices.

Task 5: Assist Teachers/Students with Environmental Service Learning Projects

Over the years, there have been many definitions of Service Learning that have emerged. The Program uses the following definition provided by The National Commission on Service Learning: "Service Learning is a teaching and learning

approach that integrates community service with academic study to enrich learning, teach civic responsibility, and strengthen communities."

Service Learning primarily uses the methods of practice by doing and teaching others, both of which yield the highest learning retention rates. By integrating what's learned in the classroom with outside-the-classroom community experiences, students retain more. Environmental Service Learning uses the environment as the integrating context for learning and Service Learning as the instructional strategy. It uses the environment as a theme to teach core curricular content areas, including social studies, language arts, science, math, English, as well as electives. It can be implemented across all geographic and socio-economic settings and is applicable to all students, regardless of their academic or developmental standing. Environmental Service Learning transforms the campus into a laboratory where students have the opportunity to take classroom awareness and put it into action. Not only does it increase the students' understanding of local environmental issues, it gives them a sense of empowerment. Learning becomes more relevant by directly allowing students to exercise skills in real life situations. When they see for themselves the measurable improvement they have made in their environment, personal responsibility and civic engagement take on new meaning. Youth become resources and change agents in their schools and communities.

A variety of elements may be identified as part of the Environmental Service Learning methodology. The Program uses the following seven elements:

- 1. Integrated Learning and Instruction
 - a) Environmental Service Learning supports the academic curriculum and vice versa.
 - b) Provides students with opportunities to apply academic content to realworld, meaningful experiences.
 - c) Supports the teaching of standard-based objectives to help students achieve academic success.
- 2. Service to Community
 - a) Environmental Service Learning brings together students, teachers and community partners to provide meaningful service that meets community needs.
 - b) Provides meaningful service activities that respond to a recognized community need.

- 3. Student Voice
 - a) Environmental Service Learning involves students in every aspect of the project.
 - b) Involves students as partners in identifying community needs and issues, selecting, planning, evaluating, reflecting on their learning and service, and celebrating their success.
- 4. Collaboration
 - a) Environmental Service Learning incorporates many partners (stakeholders) into planning and implementation.
 - b) Brings together students, teachers, and community partners who can contribute to and benefit from the planning, implementation and evaluation of the Environmental Service Learning project.
- 5. Civic Responsibility
 - a) Environmental Service Learning helps students recognize that they can have an effect on their community and learn that their voices and actions count.
 - b) Involves students in identifying and mitigating their personal effects on their communities.
 - c) Shows students that their voice and activities influence the functioning of their communities.
- 6. Reflection and Celebration
 - a) Environmental Service Learning helps students and teachers understand the significance of their projects and make connections with the academic curriculum.
 - b) Provides students the opportunity to think and communicate about implementing Environmental Service Learning projects before, during, and after the project.
 - c) Allows students and teachers to acknowledge and celebrate what they learned and how they feel about their Environmental Service Learning projects.

- 7. Evaluation
 - a) Environmental Service Learning involves students, teachers, administrators, and community partners in measuring progress toward learning and service goals and uses that information to improve the project.
 - b) Gives participating stakeholders an opportunity to identify changes that they might make to improve the project in order to increase the benefits to the community, quality of instruction, and level of student achievement.

The Program uses a 10-step pathway to assist teachers in integrating Environmental Service Learning into the classroom. This pathway is used to assist and support teachers in order to complete projects on campus.

- 1. Planning: Planning involves using either the Generation Earth Lesson Plan Builder, or a teacher's plan to create a unit of study. Whichever instructional strategy is chosen for an Environmental Service Learning project, it should be meaningful to students, instructional goals, and the community.
- 2. Pre-Test: A simple pretest is administered to students to gauge their current environmental actions and their attitude about them.
- 3. Campus/Community Audit: To get students actively involved and immediately introduced to the issue, students conduct an audit on campus or in their community. Depending on the environmental focus, students can collect baseline data to begin to develop ideas about what is going on in their environment. For example, a waste audit at the school measures the amount of recyclables left in trash cans. A water audit at school maps where water is going, as well as where harmful trash/pollution is left on the ground and carried by water into the storm drain system. After the audit is completed students may reflect on their findings.
- 4. Introductory Activity: The introductory lesson provided by Generation Earth is designed to introduce environmental subject matter to the students. Current environmental issues within Los Angeles County are explored and allow students to reflect on what they have learned and compare it to the audit information they gathered.
- 5. Unit/Class Lessons: This step involves continuing with additional lessons that support content knowledge, textbook information and whatever else is needed to drive content standards.
- 6. Field Trip: A field trip is encouraged to help students build on their knowledge by seeing the impact of environmental issues beyond their

campus. The Contractor will provide transportation, such as buses, vans, etc., for field trips to be granted to schools. The following criteria must be followed: 1) students must complete a pretest; 2) teacher/students must commit to completing an Environmental Service Learning project; 3) field trip must relate to the Environmental Service Learning project; and 4) students must complete a posttest once the Environmental Service Learning project is completed.

Note: Contractor must submit a Verification Form for each school field trip. The Verification Form will be developed and printed by the Contractor and signed by the Principal/school administration staff to confirm the students attended the field trip to complete their Environmental Service Learning project. The Contractor shall attach the transportation invoice and completed Verification Forms for each school with each monthly invoice. The CM shall approve the Verification Form before distribution.

- 7. Reflection: Once lessons are complete, students think about what they have learned, brainstorm their ideas for improving the school community, and anticipate the significance of their Environmental Service Learning project.
- 8. Environmental Service Learning Project: A project mapping activity is provided to assist students in developing their project. Also included are Student Action Guides, one for the Project Manager and one for each student. These guides serve to help each student manage their individual tasks and keep track of their progress.
- 9. Evaluation: As the final step of their project, students evaluate what worked, did not work, and whether their goals for the project were obtained. Now, students may reflect on their Environmental Service Learning experience by thinking about communicating and celebrating its effect on them, their community, and the environment.
- 10. Posttest: A simple posttest is administered to students to measure any changes in environmental actions the students are doing and their attitude about them.

The Environmental Service Learning project(s) will address the key program areas: HHW/E-waste, the Four R's (Reduce, Reuse, Recycle, Rethink), organics management, other waste reduction messages, water conservation, and stormwater pollution prevention. Example of Environmental Service Learning project(s) can include, but not limited to source reduction, water quality, water conservation, etc., refer to Exhibit K, Program Participation Data.

Provide teachers and school administrators the support and resources for implementing Environmental Service Learning projects on their campus. The Contractor must keep track of the Environmental Service Learning projects completed annually and how teachers and school administrators are continuing to maintain the completed projects. If a school implements a recycling program in their classroom as an Environmental Service Learning project, the Contractor shall provide recycling bins for classroom use as requested by the school. The purchase of recycling bins is included in this Task.

Deliverable 5: Assist Teachers/Students with Environmental Service Learning Projects

The Contractor shall:

- 1. Be responsive and assist teachers/students with their Environmental Service Learning project(s) from the beginning to the completion of the project(s). The Environmental Service Learning project(s) will address the key program areas listed above. The Contractor supports and guides the teacher/students through this process, which include but are not limited to attending meetings at the school and e-mail/telephone/digital communication directly with the teacher. The Contractor must follow the seven elements and 10-step pathway and enhance and/or develop additional steps for Environmental Service Learning projects in addition to developing sustainable practices.
- 2. Submit two excel spreadsheets, 30 days before the end of each contract year, of all Environmental Service Learning projects completed and all of the Environmental Service Learning existing projects that continue to be sustained by schools. The spreadsheets must include project start and end dates, school address, school district, teacher name, contact information, Supervisorial District, identify the city or unincorporated area, project name, students directly impacted, students potentially impacted, and the description and method of sustainability for the project.
- 3. Administer the pretest to the students when they begin the development of the Environmental Service Learning projects and then administer the posttest survey at the end of the completed projects. The Contractor can provide a recommendation on the best method to ensure the pre and post tests are completed by the students.

Task 6: Program Outreach

Contractor shall conduct outreach to:

1. School Districts by attending a minimum of four school district meetings and or school administration meetings, etc., (in each Supervisorial District), to promote the Program and to motivate and encourage teachers to attend Generation Earth workshops, complete an Environmental Service Learning project, and participate in the youth summit. If required by the school districts or school administration meetings, develop and submit a PowerPoint presentation about the Generation Earth Program following the guidelines shown in Exhibit M, Presentation Guidelines, for review and approval by the CM. The approved Generation Earth power point presentation would be used when presenting to school districts.

- 2. Every School District in Los Angeles County on an annual basis, by e-mail and telephone, to promote the Program.
- 3. The 88 city recycling coordinators in Los Angeles County to promote the Program and to encourage recycling coordinators to promote the Program to schools in their jurisdictions on a monthly basis. The recycling coordinators can be reached by e-mail and by telephone calls.
- 4. Promote the Program on a quarterly basis through the California Regional Environmental Education Community (CREEC Network, <u>creec.org</u>), Los Angeles County Office of Education and through other approved environmental and educational organizations where educators can go online and find information regarding the Program. The CREEC Network collaborates with environmental education providers, businesses, government agencies, and community organizations to support environmental education for students and families.

Deliverable 6: Program Outreach

The Contractor will attend four school district meetings and/or school administration meetings held in Los Angeles County schools, per contract year to promote the Program, workshops, and youth summit to teachers and school administrators. Contractor will provide a program outreach recap report of school district meetings and/or school administration meetings attended. The Contractor will also contact the city recycling coordinators on a monthly basis to promote the Program. The Contractor will promote the Program and website through the other environmental and educational organizations on a quarterly basis.

Task 7: Environmental Youth Summit

The Contractor shall develop and conduct an annual Environmental Youth Summit and invite Los Angeles County public and private middle and high schools to participate. The purpose of the Summit is for students to share the service learning projects they have implemented on their school campuses.

The Summit shall consist of students discussing among their peers the Environmental Service Learning projects completed during the school year consisting of the Four R's (Reduce, Reuse, Recycle, Rethink), organics management, HHW/E-Waste, stormwater pollution prevention, water

conservation, and other sustainability projects. The Contractor will obtain corporate partnerships to assist in sponsoring the summit (i.e., venue, luncheon, giveaways, guest speakers, etc.).

Deliverable 7: Environmental Youth Summit

Within 90 days of the start of this Contract the Contractor shall:

- 1. Submit a detailed plan and a proposed timeline as to when the Environmental Summit will occur. Provide details (e.g., venue, how schools will be selected to attend the summit, partnership opportunities that have been established, guest speakers, etc.), Establish corporate partnerships that will assist in sponsoring the annual summit, and provide for a substitute teacher to be present in the classroom, as needed, so that the teacher can attend the summit with their students.
- 2. Provide bus transportation services for participants; the costs of which are included in this Task.
- 3. Design and order Environmental Youth Summit T-shirts for participants. Design and order participation ribbons for all participants. Design and order participation certificates for each school participating.

Task 8: Promotional Items

The Contractor shall develop and produce Generation Earth promotional items for teachers and students to be distributed at workshops, Environmental Service Learning meetings, school district meetings, teacher trainings, education outreach events, Environmental Youth Summit, etc. These items shall be age appropriate, nonhazardous, using aluminum or other sustainable material when possible and shall consist of T-shirts, commuter/travel mugs, metal straws, reusable drawstring bags, reusable utensils, California Poppy seeds, and Generation Earth stickers. Refer to Exhibit O, Promotional Items, for examples and photos of current promotional materials used in the Program. Promotional materials shall include recycled content when feasible and include the Generation Earth logo and website.

The Contractor shall purchase enough quantities of each promotional item to supply teachers and students for Task 2, 1-Day Workshops, Task 3, Summer Institute Workshop, Task 4, Education Outreach Events, and Task 7, Environmental Youth Summit with the specified quantities as listed on the Schedule of Prices for Task 8, Promotional Items.

All promotional items purchased for this Program are the property of the County and must be pre-approved by the CM prior to purchase, production, and distribution. All materials should be made with recycled content, reduce packaging when shipping, and must display appropriate Generation Earth logo and website.

Upon approval of the CM, the Contractor shall order the promotional items in the approved form and quantity. The County will compensate the Contractor at the applicable unit rate on Form PW-2, Task 8, Promotional Items. The rate for promotional items shall include all charges for graphic layouts and purchases of promotional items. Note that the promotional items should be ordered by the Contractor and a sample of each item shall be provided for approval by the CM prior to ordering. It is the Contractor's responsibility to store and replace any lost and/or stolen promotional items for the entire duration of the Contract.

Deliverable 8: Promotional Items

The Contractor shall:

- 1. Within 90 days of the approval of the Work Plan, submit a list and detailed description of promotional item(s) to be produced, purchased, and distributed (including cost, quantity per item, and recycled content) to the CM for approval, for the specified target audiences (students and teachers).
- 2. Store promotional and distribute items for Task 2, 1-day Workshops, Task 3, Summer Institute Workshop, Task 4, Education Outreach Events, and Task 7, Environmental Youth Summit.
- 3. Upon approval of the CM, the Contractor shall order promotional items and inspect them for quality control. The CM reserves the right not to pay for any promotional items that are damaged or misplaced by Contractor.

This deliverable will be paid as the promotional items are purchased and stored by the Contractor.

Task 9: Curriculum Materials

The Contractor will revise and/or develop curriculum materials for teachers/students to use for their classroom lessons, Environmental Service Learning projects, and workshops that meet and/or exceed State curriculum standards, including NGSS.

The Contractor shall engage with appropriate experts (e.g., the Los Angeles County Office of Education, CREEC, CalRecycle, Los Angeles Regional Water Quality Control Board, etc.) to review and develop all curriculum materials for teachers and students to meet State curriculum mandates. Listed below are the curriculum materials that were developed for the Program. The Contractor will review these materials and update as needed and/or develop new

curriculum materials as needed. The Contractor will reprint curriculum materials whenever necessary. Below is a brief description of the current curriculum materials provided. The Contractor shall review the materials and provide suggestions whenever necessary. Curriculum materials can be viewed at https://dpw.lacounty.gov/epd/ge/ProjectResources.aspx.

Generation Earth Project Toolkits are used to assist teachers in completing Environmental Service Learning projects. The toolkits provide the instructions and supporting tools that teachers need to identify current or potential environmental issues in their schools and local communities and motivate them to take the necessary steps to develop a viable resolution that will positively impact their communities.

Generation Earth Toolkits and Guides include the following:

Waste Reduction and Recycling Project Toolkit:

Assists students on identifying potential waste issues from all aspects in their campuses and communities, and guides students on the different methods to reducing waste and creating a sustainable program that addresses waste issues, organic waste and creating a curbside recycling program.

Stormwater Pollution Prevention Project Toolkit:

Provides assistance to students on identifying sources of stormwater pollution on their campuses and local communities and provides them with the general knowledge necessary to think of solutions to reduce stormwater pollution.

Teacher Action Guide:

Provides information on the Program and provides resources that guide teachers and educators on how to successfully facilitate Environmental Service Learning projects for their students.

Generation Earth Guides are designed to assist students in completing an Environmental Service Learning project by providing them with helpful instructions, tools, and supporting materials needed to learn about important environmental topics and taking the necessary actions to complete projects that will positively impact their schools and local communities.

Waste Reduction and Recycling Project Guide:

Assists students in creating an education campaign and raising awareness of waste issues by informing their audience (school and community) about the importance of addressing the issues.

Stormwater Pollution Prevention Project Guide:

Assists students in creating an education campaign with the goal of raising awareness of stormwater pollution issues and informing their audience (school and community) about the importance of preventing pollution.

Textile Recycling Project Guide:

Educates students on the proper management of textile waste and diversion from landfills through donating, recycling, repurposing, and other methods. The guide also provides knowledge to students on how to promote the proper disposal methods for textiles waste to other students and their local community.

Food Rescue Project Guide:

Assists students in identifying the different sources of food waste in their schools and provides guidance on planning and creating of a sustainable food waste reduction and rescue program.

E-Waste Collection Project Guide:

Educates students in the proper disposal of E-Waste and keeping E-Waste from landfills by hosting their own E-waste collection event.

Community Swap Project Guide:

Provides guidance to students on promoting the reuse of items and reducing waste in the process by leading a student-run swap event allowing other students and their communities to donate, as well as take items for free.

Deliverable 9: Curriculum Materials

Within 60 days of the start of this Contract, the Contractor shall review and provide a recommendation as to what curriculum materials need to be revised or developed to the CM. The Contractor is responsible to revise, develop, reproduce, and store all curriculum materials that will be distributed to teachers and students at all workshops and education outreach events.

Task 10: Assessments

The Contractor shall work with a research company or the Contractor may have research development staff within their company to conduct research studies and evaluations. Staff assigned to this task must have experience in conducting such research assessments. The Contractor shall obtain approval from the CM before commencing any research studies and other evaluations.

The Contractor shall conduct the following evaluations:

- 1. Conduct an evaluation study annually including renewal years, if exercised by the County. The Contractor's research staff shall conduct an evaluation study that includes reviewing the pre and post awareness surveys completed by the students in Task 5, Assist Teachers/Students with Environmental Service Learning Projects. The pre and post surveys by the students should address the findings on their knowledge of key environmental messages regarding the Four Rs, organics management, HHW/E-Waste, and stormwater pollution prevention to measure the Program's effectiveness. The evaluation should measure the target audience's behavioral change after being educated through the Program. The Contractor will submit an evaluation report describing the survey findings and providing recommendations for Program modifications. The Contractor shall also recommend enhancements to the pre and post surveys. A sample of such research results may be made available to the Contractor upon request to the CM.
- 2. Conduct an online teacher survey annually. The online survey is to assess the level of involvement teachers have with the Program (e.g., what workshops did they attend; what Generation Earth curriculum did they use; did they complete a service learning project; did the Generation Earth Environmental Service Learning facilitator provide sufficient assistance; did they conduct a field trip; and how can we improve the program, etc.). The online survey shall be sent to all teachers who are using/have used the Program each contract year. The CM and the Contractor will determine the number of teacher online surveys that need to be completed each contract year.
- 3. Conduct two focus groups that will be conducted during the odd contract years, including renewal years, if exercised by the County. The Contractor's research staff shall conduct focus groups with teachers/principals. The second focus group will be conducted with students. The focus groups are for teachers and students who have worked with the Program to evaluate and provide input of the Program's website, promotional materials, curriculum materials, workshops, Generation Earth facilitators, and youth summit. The focus groups conducted shall include schools from incorporated cities and the unincorporated areas.

The Contractor shall submit a focus group evaluation report describing the focus group findings and provide recommendations for Program modifications.

Teachers and students participating in the focus groups will be provided with a stipend (teachers, \$100.00 and students, \$75.00) for participating in the focus group. Each focus group shall consist of 10 teachers and 10 students. Participants must represent incorporated and unincorporated area schools.

Deliverable 10: Assessment

Within 90 days of each research study and evaluation conducted as approved by the CM, the Contractor will submit an evaluation report to the CM on each completed research study, such as focus groups, and any new recommendations to be included in the evaluation studies.

Task 11: Program Participation Data (Schools and Students)

The Contractor shall:

- 1. Evaluate the actual number of all students enrolled in 6-12 grade public and private schools annually in the Los Angeles County. The Contractor shall provide a spreadsheet that includes the 6-12 grade student enrollment information and the number of students they project to reach each contract year as part of the Work Plan. Refer to Exhibit J, School Enrollment Data, for the past student population statistics. The student enrollment is viewable at the California Department of Education websites listed below:

- 2. Review and update on an annual basis the list of schools provided on Exhibits H and I, Los Angeles County Public Schools and Private Schools, and verify the schools' information through the California Department of Education to determine if any new school(s) have been established or closed that should be added or deleted to either of the school lists.
- 3. Track the schools that the Contractor has reached in the Countywide and unincorporated areas in a separate excel spreadsheet. In addition, the Contractor shall track schools that decline the educational opportunities that the Program provides and record the schools reason for declining. The Contractor will provide the CM with a clear and concise spreadsheet that includes the names and addresses of the schools, the number of schools and students reached, and County Supervisorial District, which includes determining if a school is located in an incorporated city or an unincorporated area within Los Angeles County for any time period (e.g., fiscal year, contract year, calendar year, etc.). At any time during the duration of this Contract, the CM may request such information on the schools reached. The Contractor is required to respond to such requests within 1-2 business days.

- 4. On a monthly basis, provide an up-to-date excel spreadsheet with a list of students and schools reached for all the Program Tasks.
- 5. Provide a map of the County of Los Angeles on a quarterly basis, which plots the geographical location of the schools the Contractor has reached and those who have declined. This will assist the Contractor in ensuring outreach efforts have been met throughout all five County Supervisorial Districts and provide the necessary data to make informed decisions on where to focus scheduling efforts to reach the 221,330 students (including identifying the 10 percent of students to be reached at schools located within the unincorporated areas). Deliverable 11: Program Participation Data (Schools and Students)

Within 90 days of the start of this Contract, the Contractor shall:

- 1. Provide a spreadsheet that includes the 6-12 grade student enrollment information according to the California Department of Education school databases and the number of students the Contractor projects reaching each contract year as part of the Work Plan.
- 2. Review and update on an annual basis the list of schools provided Exhibits H and I, Los Angeles County Public Schools and Private Schools, according to the California Department of Education school databases.
- 3. Create and provide the CM on a monthly basis an up-to-date excel spreadsheet tracking all schools and student participation for the Program for the reporting period.
- 4. Create and provide the CM with a map that tracks schools in the service area and shows workshops, schools that completed service learning projects and schools that participated in the youth summit.

Task 12: Bus Transportation – For Environmental Service Learning Projects (Field Trips)

The Contractor shall:

- 1. Provide and coordinate bus transportation of teachers/students to their qualified field trips that relate to their Environmental Service Learning projects.
- 2. Develop, print, distribute, and collect a completed School Bus Verification Form to be completed by the School Principal/school administration staff that confirms the bus transportation for their field trip was related to their Environmental Service Learning project. The school verification form must include the date, school name, field trip location, and shall include a short description of how the field trip related to their Environmental Service Learning project.
- 3. Maintain a log sheet for all bus transportation costs, including how the field trip destination relates to the teacher/students Environmental Service Learning project, the destination to and from, the date of the field trip, and all associated bus costs, which includes but not limited to the initial bus rental fees, taxes, tolls, and any additional rental time that may be needed during the duration of a field trip. An annual budget amount of \$25,000 is available for this Task as approved by the CM.
- 4. Payments will be made per trip on a monthly basis and Contractor will be responsible for attaching the correct bus transportation invoices, a copy of the bus transportation log sheet, and the corresponding completed School Bus Verification Forms that have been signed by the Principal/school administration staff with each monthly invoice.

Deliverable 12: Bus Transportation - For Environmental Service Learning Projects (Field Trips)

The Contractor shall maintain an annual log sheet of all bus transportation services provided to schools and copies of completed School Bus Verification forms. An annual budget of \$25,000 is available for this Task.

Task 13: Generation Earth Website

The County's Information Technology Division (ITD) hosts and maintains the current Generation Earth website and will continue to do so.

The Contractor shall review the website content (e.g., current resources, content information, registrations forms, layout/format, etc.) quarterly. During this review process, the Contractor shall draw from experiences performing other tasks for this Program, along with current industry trends from other environmental educational programs. The current website can be viewed at www.generationearth.com.

Based on review, the Contractor shall submit recommendations for revisions to content and/or enhancements.

Enhancements and activities shall include, but are not limited to the following:

- Meetings and/or conference calls with CM and/or ITD.
- Design sessions with CM and/or ITD.
- Contractor to provide ideas, concepts, and options for the design and content.
- Contractor to provide requirements, text, content, comps, design, layout, wire frames, and/or mock-ups.
- Contractor to provide web-ready content, images, graphics, pictures, icons, etc.
- Contractor to design for 1024X768 screen size and also viewable on 800X600.
- Contractor to design for responsive layout.

The Contractor will provide the final design and layouts, along with the content, text, images, graphics, pictures, icons, etc., to the CM. The Contractor will provide all the source files for ITD to program and code. ITD will test and deploy the website enhancements. The Contractor and CM will participate in user acceptance testing to provide approval prior to deployment.

The Contractor or subcontractor staff assigned to this Task must have a minimum of three years of experience within the last five years creating, designing, and enhancing websites.

The Contractor shall provide hourly rate(s) for any enhancement work on the Schedule of Prices, Form PW-2. The CM must approve in advance, in writing, any such enhancement work before work begins. The Contractor will be paid upon County's acceptance of work, on an as-needed basis based on the hourly rate specified in the PW-2.

All design concepts, source files, license rights, logos, images, icons, pictures, content, copyright, trademark, and any and all items produced as deliverables for Task 13, Generation Earth Website will be transferred to and owned by the County.

Deliverable 13: Generation Earth Website

The Contractor shall:

1. Review the website content (e.g., current resources, content information, registrations forms, layout/format, etc.) quarterly.

- 2. The Contractor will provide the final design and layouts, along with the content, text, images, graphics, pictures, icons, etc., to the CM. The Contractor will provide all the source files for ITD to program and code.
- 3. The Contractor and CM will participate in user acceptance testing to provide approval prior to deployment.
- 4. Be paid upon final deployment/acceptance of each enhancement.

Task 14: Overall Program Management

- 1. Monthly Meetings provided at no additional cost to the County
 - a. At mutually agreed upon time, the Contractor shall schedule and conduct monthly meetings with the CM to report on work completed and discuss work in progress.
 - b. The Contractor shall submit the agenda in an electronic format for each monthly meeting to the CM at least five working days prior to the meeting.
 - c. The Contractor shall submit minutes of the monthly meetings with the agreed upon action steps and deadlines within three calendar days after the meeting, to be approved by the CM.
- 2. Monthly Status Reports provided at no additional cost to the County

The Contractor shall prepare and submit monthly status reports that include a comprehensive list of accomplishments achieved in the past month, status and progress of each Task and activity, and action steps for the upcoming month and deadlines. If necessary or as requested by the CM, the Contractor shall include an updated Task timeline when submitting the monthly status reports. The Contractor shall submit monthly status reports along with their monthly invoices.

3. Annual Report

The Contractor shall prepare and submit an Annual report within 30 days in advance of the conclusion of each contract year. The report shall include the following information and any other information the CM may request at the end of each contract Year.

- a. A summary of the status and data collected of each Task.
- b. Problems encountered in Program implementation and operation.
- c. Recommendations and changes to improve the Program.

- d. Evaluation of the effectiveness of the Program that includes, but is not limited to research results, analyses, findings (Task 13, Assessments), and recommendations based on the information obtained through analysis of Evaluation Forms (Task 2, 1-day Workshops) completed by the teachers and students.
- e. Include pictures of promotional materials produced during the contract year.
- f. Include an excel spreadsheet of students and schools reached, separated by Countywide and unincorporated areas.
- g. Submit addendum to the annual report, if needed or requested by the CM.

Deliverable 14: Overall Program Management

The Contractor shall submit annual reports to the CM within 30 calendar days in advance of the conclusion of each contract year for the duration of the Contract term. This Deliverable will include all items noted above and will be paid based on the satisfactory completion of each annual report and approval by the CM.

Task 15: Additional Tasks

Based on the evaluation of the Program efforts and/or in response to expanded or unexpected requirements and priorities of Public Works, the CM may ask the Contractor to implement strategies, enhancements to the Program, elements, promotions, activities, events, etc., not specified in this SOW. Some examples of these additional services for this Task can include coordination of press conferences, Countywide outreach, and coordinate/attend additional special events or school outreach events or add additional new enhancements to the Program not otherwise specified under any of the aforementioned Tasks in this Exhibit A, SOW. Approximately 150 staff hours are allotted for this Task.

The Contractor shall perform such tasks with only prior written request and approval from the CM and will be paid upon the Contractor's satisfactory delivery of either the total completed Deliverables or at agreed upon intervals. Prior to performing any additional Tasks, the Contractor shall prepare and submit a written description of the work and estimate of labor and materials, based on the rates quoted in Form PW-2, Schedule of Prices, using the tasks that most closely correspond to the additional Task, or if all or portion of the requested additional Task work does not closely correspond to PW-2, rates for other tasks, as determined by the CM, and the hourly rate for Task 15 shall apply. However, when a condition threatens imminent injury to the public or damage to property, the CM may orally authorize the work to be performed upon receiving a verbal estimate from the Contractor. Within 24 hours after

receiving a verbal authorization, the Contractor shall submit a written estimate to the CM for approval.

All additional work provided herein shall commence on the specified date established. The Contractor shall proceed diligently to complete said work within the time allotted.

J. Hours and Days of Service

Hours of service shall be primarily performed within the 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. time period, Monday through Friday, each week, except County observed holidays, at which time the service shall be done before or after such holiday. Work hours may be altered, when necessary, with the approval of the CM.

K. <u>Utilities</u>

The County will not provide utilities.

L. <u>Storage Facilities</u>

The County will not provide storage facilities for the Contractor.

M. <u>Removal of Debris</u>

Any and all debris derived from these services, including but not limited to Hazardous Waste and/or E-Waste, shall be removed from the Public Works worksite property and become the property of the Contractor. The Contractor shall dispose of all debris from these services in a legally established area appropriate for the given type of debris being disposed, and in compliance with all in such a manner that is compliant with all applicable Federal, State, and local legal requirements. Disposal shall be at the Contractor's expense. The Contractor shall not allow any debris from its operations under this Contract to be deposited in the storm drains and/or gutters in violation of the 2012 National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System for Municipal Storm Sewer System Permit.

N. <u>Special Safety Requirements</u>

In the performance of this Contract, precaution shall be exercised by the Contractor for the protection of all students, teachers, employees, and property. Contractor shall comply with all applicable Federal, State, and local laws governing safety, health, and sanitation. Contractor shall provide all safety devices, safeguards, and protection equipment, and take any other needed actions on its own volition, or as Public Works, may determine reasonably necessary to protect the safety of all persons associated with the Program and of the public and to protect property in connection with the performance of the work to be performed. The Contractor shall do the following for safety issues:

- 1. Contractor's personnel shall observe all applicable State of California Occupational Safety, Health Administration (Cal/OSHA), and Public Works' safety requirements while at Public Works' jobsites.
- 2. Contractor's personnel shall wear suitable clothing, gloves, and shoes that meet Cal/OSHA requirements.
- 3. Contractor shall do the following for safety issues:
 - a. Public Safety: Contractor shall perform a prework survey to identify potential safety issues, and if any are found, address them before work starts; if any hazards are found, the Contractor will report to the County's CM; and if the hazards are potentially harmful or pose imminent risk to the public, contact 911.
 - b. Emergency Response: When an emergency involves injury to a member of the public, Contractor shall call 911, and stay with the injured person until help arrives, if doing so does not pose a risk to the County or Contractor staff, and direct emergency services to the injured person, if practical; secure the site to restrict the public from going through the area. When needed, use appropriate signage and delineations.
 - c. Contractor shall file a County of Los Angeles Non-Employee Injury Report form to document the incident and injuries to the public and transmit the forms to the CM within two business days or first day of the next business week. Public Works Representative will provide the report form.
 - d. Data Privacy: Personal data collection privacy policy in compliance with the California Consumer Privacy Act (CCPA), the contractor must implement the appropriate technical and organizational measures to ensure that any Personally Identifiable Information (PII) collected is explicitly identified and managed securely. In addition, the contractor must also comply with the Children's Online Privacy Protection Act

(COPPA) as this website is geared/directed toward presenting content to a general audience under the age of 13.

- e. Data Usage: Access to County data shall be limited only to the Contractor or Service Provider's personnel to perform work necessary defined in the scope of services. The CM shall be notified in writing of any third party which the Contractor is required to share County data. The notification shall address what type of information/data is being shared and how the program participants can "opt-out".
- O. <u>Maps</u>

All locations will be designated independent, private/parochial, and public schools within the incorporated cities and unincorporated areas within County of Los Angeles as shown on Exhibit G, Maps and Locations.

P. <u>Responsibilities of the Contractor</u>

The Contractor must:

- 1. Maintain a minimum of 5 years of experience in planning and implementing public and/or private educational outreach events/programs within the last 10 years. **Subcontractors are not allowed.**
- 2. Ensure Contractor's key personnel assigned to oversee this Program must be a direct employee of the Contractor and has a minimum of 2 years of experience in planning and implementing environmental-related public and/or private educational outreach events/programs within the last 10 years. **Subcontractors are not allowed.**
- 3. Ensure Contractor's staff, or Subcontractor(s), if any, performing assessments and research evaluations have a minimum of 3 years of experience conducting assessments and research evaluations.
- 4. Ensure Contractor's staff, or Subcontractor(s), if any, conducting website enhancements for the Generation Earth website must have a minimum of 3 years of experience within the last 5 years creating, designing, and enhancing websites.
- 5. Ensure uniforms are worn by employees on the job at all times.
- 6. Ensure on-site supervisor can communicate in English.
- 7. Ensure workshop staff are responsible for conducting the Program workshops and administering Program materials when attending schools.

- 8. Ensure staff are fully equipped for all workshops, youth summit, and education outreach events with the following: uniforms, curriculum materials, promotional items, and evaluation forms.
- 9. Ensure staff distribute and collect all completed participant evaluation forms for the 1-day Workshops and the Summer Institute workshop.
- 10. Evaluate the student enrollment in 6-12 grade public and private schools annually in Los Angeles County.
- 11. Track the schools reached in the Countywide and unincorporated areas in a separate excel database spreadsheet in addition to tracking the schools that declined participation of Environmental Service Learning projects.
- 12. At any time during the duration of this Contract, be requested to provide schools reached for a specific time period and will be required to respond to such request within 1-2 business days.
- 13. On a monthly basis, provide an up-to-date excel spreadsheet with a list of students and schools reached for all the Program Tasks.
- 14. Conduct an annual evaluation study on student pre and post awareness surveys completed, online teacher surveys, and focus groups conducted during odd years of the Contract.
- 15. Review the Generation Earth website and submit updates/recommendations to enhance the website. Submit final design and layouts, along with the content, text, images, graphics, pictures, icons, etc., to the CM. Provide all the source files for Public Works' ITD to program and code. Develop CCPA and COPPA privacy policy language to be included on the website for CM approval.
- 16. Print, mail, and e-mail the Program 1-Day Workshop flyers, Summer Institute flyers, Youth Summit flyers, and curriculum materials.
- 17. Appoint an employee of the Contractor to serve as the Contractor Representation (CR). The CR shall provide overall management and coordination of this Contract and act as the main contract with Public Works. The CR shall have full authority to act for Contactor on all Contract matters relating to the daily operations of this Contract, including answering questions and responding to emergencies.
- 18. Aside from the CR, assign a dedicated team who shall be working on the specified Tasks and corresponding deliverables, and meet deadlines. The Contractor shall submit to the CM an organization chart of the team assigned to this Program, listing responsibilities of each staff member.

- 19. Not implement any service without obtaining prior approval from the CM. Public Works' CM reserves the right not to pay the Contractor for any related costs incurred on the implementation of a service without approval from the CM.
- 20. For any proposed changes or delays to the Work Plan or program Tasks, provide an explanation and justification to the CM and secure prior approval.
- 21. Submit a graphic layout of the promotional items to the CM for approval prior to ordering the promotional items.
- 22. Store and replace any lost and/or stolen promotional materials and assembly presentation equipment for the entire duration of the Contract.
- 23. Be responsible for providing bus transportation for the Summer Institute workshop, Environmental Service Learning Projects, and Youth Summit.
- 24. Be responsible for accurate recordkeeping of all files for the duration of the Contract that are subject to an audit.
- 25. Ensure all expenses are within budget per Task and annual Contract budget.
- 26. Ensure all invoices, budget reports, monthly status reports, recap reports, annual reports, and supporting documents that are submitted to the CM be reviewed for accuracy.
- 27. Submit a revised organization chart to the CM for approval in the event of staffing turnover and must provide proof of new staff meeting the minimum mandatory requirements.
- 28. Schedule a meeting with the CM and staff within 10 calendar days of the approval of this Contract by Board.
- 29. Schedule monthly meetings for the duration of the Contract.
- 30. Submit an Agenda in an electronic format for each monthly meeting to the CM at least five working days prior to the meeting.
- 31. Submit completed Bus Verification forms, invoice bus log, and bus invoices with monthly invoices.
- Q. <u>Responsibilities of Public Works</u>

The CM will administer and monitor this Contract for compliance and act as the Contractor's contact with Public Works. The CM will keep the Contractor informed as to current relevant Public Works policies and procedures relating to the requested work.

The CM has the option to discontinue any approved Task as determined to be in the best interest of the County due to time constraints and cost-effectiveness concerns or otherwise. The CM has the right to reallocate any unspent funds or not spend, if not necessary.

R. <u>Project Safety Official</u>

The Contractor shall designate in writing a Project Safety Official who shall be thoroughly familiar with the Contractor's Injury and Illness Prevention Program and Code of Safe Practices. The Contractor's Project Safety Official shall be available at all times to abate any potential safety hazards and shall have the authority and responsibility to shut down an operation, if necessary. Failure by the Contractor to provide the required Project Safety Official shall be grounds for the County to direct the cessation of all work activities and operations at no cost to the County until such time as the Contractor is in compliance.

S. <u>Gratuities</u>

- 1. Contractor is advised that it is improper for any County officer, employee, or agent to solicit consideration, in any form, from Contractor with the implication, suggestion, or statement that Contractor's provision of the consideration, or failure to provide consideration, may cause favorable or unfavorable treatment, respectively, for the Contractor relating to the amendment or extension of the Contract or the making of any determinations with respect to Contractor's performance under this Contract. A Contractor shall not offer or give, either directly or through an intermediary, such improper consideration, in any form, to a County officer, employee, or agent for the purpose of securing favorable treatment as described herein.
- 2. A Contractor shall immediately report any attempt by a County officer, employee, or agent to solicit improper consideration. The report shall be made either to the County manager charged with the supervision of the employee or to the County Auditor-Controller's Employee Fraud Hotline at (800) 544-6861.
- 3. Among other items, such improper consideration may take the form of cash, discounts, services, provision of travel, entertainment, or tangible gifts.
- 4. Note that Contractor's failure to adhere to this requirement could subject this Contract to termination for improper consideration under Section 3 Termination/Suspensions of Exhibit B.

T. Liquidated Damages and Performance Requirements Summary

- 1. In any case of the Contractor's failure to meet certain specified performance requirements, the County may, in lieu of other remedies provided by law or the Contract, assess liquidated damages in specified sums and deduct them from any regularly scheduled payment to the Contractor. However, neither the provision of a sum of liquidated damages for nonperformance or untimely or inadequate performance nor the County's acceptance of liquidated damages shall be construed to waive the County's right to reimbursement for damage to its property or indemnification against third-party claims.
- 2. The amounts of liquidated damages have been set in recognition of the following circumstances existing at the time of the formation of the Contract:
 - a. All of the time limits and acts required to be done by both parties are of the essence of the Contract.
 - b. The parties are both experienced in the performance of the Contract work.
 - c. The Contract contains a reasonable statement of the work to be performed in order that the expectations of the parties to the Contract are realized. The expectation of the County is that the work will be performed with due care in a workmanlike, competent, timely, and cost-efficient manner while the expectation of the Contractor is a realization of a profit through the ability to perform the Contract work in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Contract at the Proposal price.
 - d. The parties are not under any compulsion to Contract.
 - e. The Contractor's acceptance of the assessment of liquidated damages against it for unsatisfactory and late performance is by agreement and willingness to be bound as part of the consideration being offered to the County for the award of the Contract.
 - f. It would be difficult for the County to prove the loss resulting from nonperformance or untimely, negligent, or inadequate performance of the work.
 - g. The liquidated sums specified represent a fair approximation of the damages incurred by the County resulting from the Contractor's failure to meet the performance standard as to each item for which an amount of liquidated damages is specified.

- 3. The Contractor shall pay Public Works, or Public Works may withhold and deduct from monies due the Contractor, liquidated damages in the sum of \$500 for each consecutive calendar day that the Contractor fails to complete work within the time specified unless otherwise provided in this Contract or approved by the CM.
- 4. In addition to the above, Public Works may use Exhibit F, Performance Requirements Summary, to evaluate Contractor's performance.
- 5. Please note, should an inconsistency be determined between the SOW and the performance Requirements Summary (Refer to Exhibit F, Performance Requirements Summary), the higher service level in the judgement of Public Works shall prevail.

SERVICE CONTRACT GENERAL REQUIREMENTS

SECTION 1

INTERPRETATION OF CONTRACT

A. <u>Ambiguities or Discrepancies</u>

Both parties have either consulted or had the opportunity to consult with counsel regarding the terms of this Contract and are fully cognizant of all terms and conditions. Should there be any uncertainty, ambiguity, or discrepancy in the terms or provisions hereof, or should any misunderstanding arise as to the interpretation to be placed upon any position hereof or the applicability of the provisions hereunder, neither party shall be deemed as the drafter of this Contract and the uncertainty, ambiguity, or discrepancy shall not be construed against either party.

B. <u>Definitions</u>

Whenever in the Request for Proposals, Contract, Scope of Work, Specifications, Terms, Requirements, and/or Conditions the following terms are used, the intent and meaning shall be interpreted as follows:

Agreement. The written, signed accord covering the performance of the requested.

<u>Board</u>. The Board of Supervisors of County of Los Angeles and Ex-Officio Board of Supervisors of the Los Angeles County Flood Control District.

Contract. The written agreement covering the performance of the service and the furnishing of labor, materials, supervision, and equipment in the performance of the service. The Contract includes the Agreement, Exhibit A, Scope of Work (Specifications): Exhibit Β. Service Contract General Requirements: Exhibit C, Internal Revenue Service Notice 1015; Exhibit D, Safely Surrendered Baby Law Posters; Exhibit E, Defaulted Property Tax Reduction Program; and other appropriate exhibits, amendments, and change orders. Included are all supplemental agreements amending or extending the service to be performed, which may be required to supply acceptable services specified herein.

<u>Contractor</u>. The person or persons, sole proprietor, partnership, joint venture, corporation, or other legal entity who has entered into an agreement with County to perform or execute the work covered by this Contract.

<u>Contract Work or Work</u>. The entire contemplated work of maintenance and repair to be performed, and services rendered as prescribed in this Contract.

<u>County</u>. Includes County of Los Angeles, Los Angeles County Public Works, Los Angeles County Road Department, and/or Los Angeles County Engineer.

Day. Calendar day(s) unless otherwise specified.

<u>Direct Employee</u>. Worker employed by Contractor under Contractor's State and Federal taxpayer identification.

<u>Director</u>. The Director of Public Works, County of Los Angeles, as used herein, includes the Road Commissioner, County of Los Angeles; County Engineer, County of Los Angeles; Chief Engineer, Los Angeles County Flood Control District; and/or authorized representative(s).

<u>District</u>. Los Angeles County Flood Control District, or Los Angeles County Waterworks Districts, or Los Angeles County Consolidated Sewer Maintenance District.

<u>Employee Leasing</u>. Any agreement to employ any worker, at any tier, that is neither a Subcontract nor a direct employee relationship.

Fiscal Year. The 12-month period beginning July 1 and ending the following June 30.

<u>Maximum Contract Sum</u>. The Maximum Contract Sum is the aggregate total amount of compensation authorized by the Board.

<u>Proposal</u>. The written materials that a Proposer submits in response to a solicitation document (Request for Proposals).

<u>Proposer</u>. Any individual, person or persons, sole proprietor, firm, partnership, joint venture, corporation, or other legal entity submitting a Proposal for the work, acting directly or through a duly authorized representative.

Public Works. Los Angeles County Public Works.

<u>Solicitation</u>. Request for Proposals, Invitation for Bids, Request for Statement of Qualifications, or Request for Quotation.

<u>Specifications</u>. The directions, provisions, and requirements contained herein, as supplemented by such special provisions as may be necessary pertaining to method, manner, and place of performing the work under this Contract.

<u>Subcontract</u>. An agreement by the Contractor to employ a Subcontractor at any tier; to employ or agree to employ a Subcontractor, at any tier.

<u>Subcontractor</u>. Any individual, person or persons, sole proprietor, firm, partnership, joint venture, corporation, or other legal entity furnishing supplies, services of any nature, equipment, and/or materials to Contractor in furtherance of the Contractor's performance of this Contract, at any tier, under oral or written agreement.

C. <u>Headings</u>

The headings herein contained are for convenience and reference only and are not intended to define or limit the scope of any provision thereof.

SECTION 2

STANDARD TERMS AND CONDITIONS PERTAINING TO CONTRACT ADMINISTRATION

A. <u>Amendments</u>

- 1. For any change which affects the Scope of Work, Contract sum, payments, or any term or condition included in this Contract, an amendment shall be prepared and executed by Contractor and the Board or if delegated by the Board, the Director, and Contractor.
- 2. The Board or County's Chief Executive Officer or designee may require the addition and/or change of certain terms and conditions in this Contract during the term of this Contract. County reserves the right to add and/or change such provisions as required by the Board or the Chief Executive Officer. To implement such changes, an amendment or a change order to this Contract shall be prepared by Public Works and signed by the Contractor.
- 3. County may, at its sole discretion, authorize extensions of time to this Contract's term. Contractor agrees that such extensions of time shall not change any other term or condition of this Contract during the period of such extensions. To implement an extension of time, an amendment to this Contract shall be prepared and executed by Contractor and the Board or if delegated by the Board, the Director, and Contractor. To the extent that extensions of time for Contract, Public Works may, at its sole discretion, grant Contractor extensions of time, provided the aggregate of all such extensions during the life of this Contract shall not exceed 180 days.
- 4. For any change which does not materially affect the Scope of Work or any other term or condition included under this Contract, a change order shall be prepared by Public Works and signed by the Contractor. If the change order is prepared by the Contractor, it shall be approved by Public Works and signed by the Contractor and the County.

B. Assignment and Delegation

1. Contractor shall not assign its rights or delegate its duties under this Contract, or both, whether in whole or in part, without the prior written consent of County, in its discretion, and any attempted assignment or delegation without such consent shall be null and void. For purposes of this paragraph, County consent shall require a written amendment to this Contract, which is formally approved and executed by Contractor and the

Board or if delegated by the Board, the Director, and Contractor. Any payments by County to any approved delegatee or assignee on any claim under this Contract shall be deductible, at County's sole discretion, against the claims which Contractor may have against County.

- 2. Shareholders, partners, members, or other equity holders of Contractor may transfer, sell, exchange, assign, or divest themselves of any interest they may have therein. However, in the event any such sale, transfer, exchange, assignment, or divestment is effected in such a way as to give majority control of Contractor to any person(s), corporation, partnership, or legal entity other than the majority controlling interest therein at the time of execution of this Contract, such disposition is an assignment requiring the prior written consent of County in accordance with applicable provisions of this Contract.
- 3. Any assumption, assignment, delegation, or takeover of any of Contractor's duties, responsibilities, obligations, or performance of same by any person or entity other than Contractor, whether through assignment, Subcontract, delegation, merger, buyout, or any other mechanism, with or without consideration for any reason whatsoever without County's express prior written approval, shall be a material breach of this Contract, which may result in the suspension or termination of this Contract. In the event of such a termination, County shall be entitled to pursue the same remedies against Contractor as it could pursue in the event of default of Contractor.

C. <u>Authorization Warranty</u>

Contractor represents and warrants that the person(s) executing this Contract for Contractor is an authorized agent who has actual authority to bind Contractor to each and every term, condition, and obligation of this Contract and that all requirements of Contractor have been fulfilled to provide such actual authority.

D. Budget Reduction

In the event that the County's Board of Supervisors adopts, in any fiscal year, a County Budget which provides for reductions in the salaries and benefits paid to the majority of County employees and imposes similar reductions with respect to County Contracts, the County reserves the right to reduce its payment obligation under this Contract correspondingly for that fiscal year and any subsequent fiscal year during the term of this Contract (including any extensions), and the services to be provided by the Contractor under this Contract shall also be reduced correspondingly. Except as set forth in the preceding sentence, the Contractor shall continue to provide all of the services set forth in this Contract. The County's notice to the Contractor regarding said reduction in payment obligation shall be provided within 30 calendar days of the Board's approval of such actions.

E. <u>Complaints</u>

Contractor shall develop, maintain, and operate procedures for receiving, investigating, and responding to any complaints by any individual.

- 1. Within 12 business days after this Contract's effective date, Contractor shall provide County with Contractor's policy for receiving, investigating, and responding to any complaints by any individual.
- 2. County will review Contractor's policy and provide Contractor with approval of said plan or with requested changes.
- 3. If County requests changes in Contractor's policy, Contractor shall make such changes and resubmit the plan within five business days for County approval.
- 4. If, at any time, Contractor wishes to change Contractor's policy, Contractor shall submit proposed changes to County for approval before implementation.
- 5. Contractor shall preliminarily investigate all complaints and notify the Contract Manager of the status of the investigation within five business days of receiving the complaint.
- 6. When complaints cannot be resolved informally, a system of follow-through shall be instituted which adheres to formal plans for specific actions and strict time deadlines.
- 7. Copies of all written responses shall be sent to the Contract Manager within three business days of mailing to the complainant.

F. <u>Compliance with Applicable Laws</u>

- 1. In the performance of this Contract, Contractor shall comply with all applicable Federal, State, and local laws, rules, regulations, ordinances, directives, guidelines, policies, procedures, and all provisions required thereby to be included in this Contract are hereby incorporated herein by reference.
- 2. Contractor shall indemnify, defend, and hold harmless County, its officers, employees, and agents from and against any and all claims, demands, damages, liabilities, losses, costs, and expenses including, without

limitation, defense costs and legal, accounting and other expert, or professional fees, arising from, connected with, consultina or related to any failure by Contractor, its officers, employees, agents, or Subcontractors, to comply with any such laws, rules, regulations, ordinances, directives, guidelines, policies, or procedures as determined by County in its sole judgment. Any legal defense pursuant to Contractor's indemnification obligations under this paragraph shall be conducted by Contractor and performed by counsel selected by Contractor and approved by County. Notwithstanding the preceding sentence, County shall have the right to participate in any such defense at its sole cost and expense, except that in the event Contractor fails to provide County with a full and adequate defense, as determined by County in its sole judgment, County shall be entitled to retain its own counsel including, without limitation, County Counsel, and to reimbursement from Contractor for all such costs and expenses incurred by County in doing so. Contractor shall not have the right to enter into any settlement, agree to any injunction or other equitable relief, or make any admission, in each case, on behalf of County without County's prior written approval.

G. <u>Compliance with Civil Rights Laws</u>

Contractor hereby assures that it will comply with Subchapter VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, 42 USC Sections 2000 (e)(1) through 2000 (e)(17), to the end that no person shall, on the grounds of race, creed, color, sex, religion, ancestry, age, condition of physical disability, marital status, political affiliation, or national origin, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination under this Contract or under any project, program, or activity supported by this Contract. Contractor shall comply with its EEO Certification (Form PW-7).

- H. <u>Confidentiality</u>
 - 1. Contractor shall maintain the confidentiality of all records obtained from County under this Contract in accordance with all applicable Federal, State, and local laws, ordinances, regulations, and directives relating to confidentiality.
 - 2. Contractor shall indemnify, defend, and hold harmless County, its officers, employees, and agents from and against any and all claims, demands, damages, liabilities, losses, costs, and expenses including, without limitation, defense costs and legal, accounting and other expert, consulting or professional fees, arising from, connected with, or related to any failure by Contractor, its officers, employees, agents, or Subcontractors, to comply with this paragraph, as determined by County in its sole judgment. Any legal defense pursuant to Contractor's

indemnification obligations under this paragraph shall be conducted by Contractor and performed by counsel selected by Contractor and approved by County. Notwithstanding the preceding sentence, County shall have the right to participate in any such defense at its sole cost and expense, except that in the event Contractor fails to provide County with a full and adequate defense, as determined by County in its sole judgment, County shall be entitled to retain its own counsel including, without limitation, County Counsel, and to reimbursement from Contractor for all such costs and expenses incurred by County in doing so. Contractor shall not have the right to enter into any settlement, agree to any injunction, or make any admission, in each case, on behalf of County without County's prior written approval.

3. Contractor shall inform all of its officers, employees, agents, and Subcontractors providing services hereunder of the confidentiality provisions of this Contract.

I. <u>Conflict of Interest</u>

- 1. No County employee whose position with County enables such employee to influence the award of this Contract or any competing Contract shall be employed in any capacity by Contractor or have any other direct or indirect financial interest in this Contract. No officer or employee of Contractor who may financially benefit from the performance of the work hereunder shall in any way participate in County's approval, or ongoing evaluation, of such work, or in any way attempt to unlawfully influence County's approval or ongoing evaluation of such work.
- 2. Contractor represents and warrants that it is aware of, and its authorized officers have read, the provisions of Los Angeles County Code, Section 2.180.010, "Certain Contracts Prohibited," and that execution of this Agreement will not violate those provisions. Contractor shall comply with all conflict of interest laws, ordinances, and regulations now in effect or hereafter to be enacted during the term of this Contract. Contractor warrants that it is not now aware of any facts that create a conflict of interest. If Contractor hereafter becomes aware of any facts that might reasonably be expected to create a conflict of interest, including those identified in Section 2.180.010, it shall immediately make full written disclosure of such facts to Full written disclosure shall include, but is not limited to, County. identification of all persons so identified and a complete description of all relevant circumstances. Failure to comply with the provisions of this paragraph may be a material breach of this Contract subjecting Contractor to either Contract termination for default or debarment proceedings or both.

J. <u>Consideration of Hiring County Employees Targeted for Layoffs or Former County</u> <u>Employees on Reemployment List</u>

Should Contractor require additional or replacement personnel after the effective date of this Contract to perform the services set forth herein, Contractor shall give first consideration for such employment openings to qualified permanent County employees who are targeted for layoff or qualified, former County employees who are on a reemployment list during the life of this Contract.

K. <u>Consideration of Hiring GAIN and GROW Participants</u>

- 1. Should Contractor require additional or replacement personnel after the effective date of this Contract, Contractor shall give consideration for any such employment openings to participants in County's Department of Public Social Services Greater Avenues for Independence (GAIN) Program and General Relief Opportunity for Work (GROW) Program who meet Contractor's minimum qualifications for the open position. For this purpose, consideration shall mean that Contractor will interview qualified candidates. County will refer GAIN and GROW participants by category to Contractor. Contractors shall report all job openings with job requirements to: GAINGROW@dpss.lacounty.gov and BSERVICES@wdacs.lacounty.gov and DPSS will refer qualified GAIN/GROW job candidates.
- 2. In the event that both laid-off County employees and GAIN and GROW participants are available for hiring, County employees shall be given first priority.

L. <u>Contractor's Acknowledgment of County's Commitment to Child Support</u> <u>Enforcement</u>

Contractor acknowledges that County places a high priority on the enforcement of child support laws and the apprehension of child support evaders. Contractor understands that it is County's policy to encourage all County Contractors to voluntarily post County's L.A.'s Most Wanted: Delinquent Parents poster in a prominent position at Contractor's place of business. County's Child Support Services Department will supply Contractor with the poster to be used.

M. <u>Contractor's Charitable Activities Compliance</u>

The Supervision of Trustees and Fundraisers for Charitable Purposes Act regulates entities receiving or raising charitable contributions. The "Nonprofit Integrity Act of 2004" (SB 1262, Chapter 919) increased Charitable Purposes Act requirements. By requiring Contractors to complete the Charitable Contributions Certification (Form PW-12), County seeks to ensure that all County Contractors which receive or raise charitable contributions comply with

California law in order to protect County and its taxpayers. A Contractor which receives or raises charitable contributions without complying with its obligations under California law commits a material breach subjecting it to either Contract termination for default or debarment proceedings or both. (Los Angeles County Code, Chapter 2.202).

- N. <u>Contractor's Warranty of Adherence to County's Child Support Compliance</u> <u>Program</u>
 - 1. Contractor acknowledges that County has established a goal of ensuring that all individuals who benefit financially from County through Contracts are in compliance with their court-ordered child, family, and spousal support obligations in order to mitigate the economic burden otherwise imposed upon County and its taxpayers.
 - 2. As required by County's Child Support Compliance Program (Los Angeles County Code, Chapter 2.200), and without limiting Contractor's duty under this Contract to comply with all applicable provisions of law. Contractor warrants that it is now in compliance and shall during the term of this Contract maintain compliance with the employment and wage reporting requirements as required by the Federal Social Security Act (42 USC Section 653a) and California Unemployment Insurance Code, Section 1088.5, and shall implement all lawfully served Wage and Earnings Withholding Orders or Child Support Services Department Notices of Wade and Earnings Assignment for Child, Family, or Spousal Support, pursuant to Code of Civil Procedure Section 706.031 and Family Code, Section 5246(b).
- O. <u>County's Quality Assurance Plan</u>

County or its agent will monitor the Contractor's performance under this Contract on not less than an annual basis. Such monitoring will include assessing Contractor's compliance with all this Contract's terms and conditions and performance standards. Contractor deficiencies which County determines are significant or continuing and that may place performance of this Contract in jeopardy, if not corrected, will be reported to the Board. The report will include improvement/corrective action measures taken by County and Contractor. If improvement does not occur consistent with the corrective action measures, County may suspend or terminate this Contract for default or impose other penalties as specified in this Contract.

P. Damage to County Facilities, Buildings, or Grounds

- 1. Contractor shall repair, or cause to be repaired, at its own cost, any and all damage to County facilities, buildings, or grounds caused by Contractor, employees, or agents of Contractor.
- 2. Such repairs shall be made immediately after Contractor has become aware of such damage, but in no event later than 30 days after the occurrence. If Contractor fails to make timely repairs, County may make any necessary repairs. All costs incurred by County, as determined by County, for such repairs shall be repaid by Contractor by cash payment upon demand. County may deduct from any payment otherwise due Contractor for costs incurred by County to make such repairs.

Q. Employment Eligibility Verification

- 1. Contractor warrants that it fully complies with all Federal and State statutes and regulations regarding the employment of aliens and others and that all of its employees performing work under this Contract meet the citizenship or alien status requirements set forth in Federal and State statutes and regulations. Contractor shall obtain, from all covered employees performing services hereunder, all verification and other documentation of employment eligibility status required by Federal and State statutes and regulations including, but not limited to, the Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1986 (P.L. 99-603), or as they currently exist and as they may be hereafter amended. Contractor shall retain all such documentation for all covered employees for the period prescribed by law.
- 2. Contractor shall, defend, and hold harmless the County of Los Angeles, its Special Districts, Elected Officials, Officers, Agents, Employees, and Volunteers from employer sanctions and any other liability which may be assessed against Contractor or County or both in connection with any alleged violation of Federal or State statutes or regulations pertaining to the eligibility for employment of persons performing services under this Contract.

R. Facsimile Representations

At the discretion of County, County may agree to regard facsimile representations of original signatures of Contractor's authorized officers, when appearing in appropriate places on the change notices and amendments prepared pursuant to this Exhibit's Amendments, and received via communications facilities, as legally sufficient evidence that such original signatures have been affixed to change notices and amendments to this Contract, such that the Contractor need not follow up facsimile transmissions of such documents with subsequent (nonfacsimile) transmission of "original" versions of such documents.

S. Fair Labor Standards

Contractor shall comply with all applicable provisions of the Federal Fair Labor Standards Act and shall indemnify, defend, and hold harmless the County of Los Angeles, its Special Districts, Elected Officials, Officers, Agents, Employees, and Volunteers from any and all liability including, but not limited to, wages, overtime pay, liquidated damages, penalties, court costs, and attorneys' fees arising under any wage and hour law including, but not limited to, the Federal Fair Labor Standards Act, for work performed by Contractor's employees for which County may be found jointly or solely liable.

T. Force Majeure

- 1. Neither party shall be liable for such party's failure to perform its obligations under and in accordance with this Contract, if such failure arises out of fires, floods, epidemics, quarantine restrictions, other natural occurrences, strikes, lockouts (other than a lockout by such party or any of such party's Subcontractors), freight embargoes, or other similar events to those described above, but in every such case the failure to perform must be totally beyond the control and without any fault or negligence of such party (such events are referred to in this subparagraph as "force majeure events").
- 2. Notwithstanding the foregoing, a default by a Subcontractor of Contractor shall not constitute a force majeure event, unless such default arises out of causes beyond the control of both Contractor and such Subcontractor, and without any fault or negligence of either of them. In such case, Contractor shall not be liable for failure to perform, unless the goods or services to be furnished by the Subcontractor were obtainable from other sources in sufficient time to permit Contractor to meet the required performance schedule. As used in this subparagraph, the term "Subcontractor" and "Subcontractors" mean Subcontractors at any tier.
- 3. In the event Contractor's failure to perform arises out of a force majeure event, Contractor agrees to use commercially reasonable best efforts to obtain goods or services from other sources, if applicable, and to otherwise mitigate the damages and reduce the delay caused by such force majeure event.

U. <u>Governing Laws, Jurisdiction, and Venue</u>

This Contract shall be governed by, and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of California. To the maximum extent permitted by applicable law, Contractor and County agree and consent to the exclusive jurisdiction of the courts of the State of California for all purposes concerning this Contract and further agree and consent that venue of any action brought in connection with or arising out of this Contract, shall be exclusively in the County of Los Angeles.

V. <u>Most Favored Public Entity</u>

If the Contractor's prices decline, or should the Contractor at any time during the term of this Contract provide the same goods or services under similar quantity and delivery conditions to the State of California or any county, municipality, or district of the State at prices below those set forth in this Contract, then such lower prices shall be immediately extended to the County.

W. Nondiscrimination and Affirmative Action

- 1. Contractor certifies and agrees that all persons employed by it, its affiliates, subsidiaries, or holding companies are and shall be treated equally without regard to or because of race, color, religion, ancestry, national origin, sex, age, physical or mental disability, marital status, or political affiliation, in compliance with all applicable Federal and State antidiscrimination laws and regulations.
- 2. Contractor shall certify to, and comply with, the provisions of Contractor's Equal Employment Opportunity (EEO) Certification (Form PW-7).
- 3. Contractor shall take affirmative action to ensure that applicants are employed, and that employees are treated during employment, without regard to race, color, religion, ancestry, national origin, sex, age, physical or mental disability, marital status, or political affiliation, in compliance with all applicable Federal and State antidiscrimination laws and regulations. Such action shall include, but not be limited to, employment, upgrading, demotion, transfer, recruitment or recruitment advertising, layoff or termination, rates of pay or other forms of compensation, and selection of training, including apprenticeship.
- 4. Contractor certifies and agrees that it will deal with its Subcontractors, bidders, or vendors without regard to or because of race, color, religion, ancestry, national origin, sex, age, physical or mental disability, marital status, or political affiliation.
- 5. Contractor certifies and agrees that it, its affiliates, subsidiaries, or holding companies shall comply with all applicable Federal and State laws and regulations to the end that no person shall, on the grounds of race, color, religion, ancestry, national origin, sex, age, physical or mental disability, marital status, or political affiliation, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination

under this Contract or under any project, program, or activity supported by this Contract.

- 6. Contractor shall allow County representatives access to Contractor's employment records during regular business hours to verify compliance with the provisions of this paragraph when so requested by County.
- 7. If County finds that any of the above provisions have been violated, such violation shall constitute a material breach of this Contract upon which County may terminate for default or suspend this Contract. While County reserves the right to determine independently that the antidiscrimination provisions of this Contract have been violated, in addition, a determination by the California Fair Employment Practices Commission or the Federal Equal Employment Opportunity Commission that Contractor has violated Federal or State antidiscrimination laws or regulations shall constitute a finding by County that Contractor has violated the antidiscrimination provisions of this Contract.
- 8. The parties agree that in the event Contractor violates any of the antidiscrimination provisions of this Contract, County shall, at its sole option, be entitled to a sum of \$500 for each violation pursuant to California Civil Code, Section 1671, as liquidated damages in lieu of terminating or suspending this Contract.
- X. <u>Nonexclusivity</u>

Nothing herein is intended nor shall be construed as creating any exclusive arrangement with Contractor. This Contract shall not restrict County from acquiring similar, equal, or like goods and/or services from other entities or sources.

Y. <u>No Payment for Services Provided Following Expiration/Suspension/Termination of</u> <u>Contract</u>

Contractor shall have no claim against County for payment of any money or reimbursement, of any kind whatsoever, for any service provided by Contractor after the expiration, suspension, or other termination of this Contract. Should Contractor receive any such payment, it shall immediately notify County and shall immediately repay all such funds to County. Payment by County for services rendered after expiration/suspension/termination of this Contract shall not constitute a waiver of County's right to recover such payment from Contractor. This provision shall survive the expiration/suspension/termination of this Contract.

Z. <u>Notice of Delays</u>

Except as otherwise provided under this Contract, when either party has knowledge that any actual or potential situation is delaying or threatens to delay the timely performance of this Contract, that party shall, within one business day, give notice thereof, including all relevant information with respect thereto, to the other party.

AA. <u>Notice of Disputes</u>

Contractor shall bring to the attention of the Contract Manager any dispute between County and Contractor regarding the performance of services as stated in this Contract. If the Contract Manager is not able to resolve the dispute, the Director will resolve it.

BB. Notice to Employees Regarding the Federal Earned Income Credit

Contractor shall notify its employees, and shall require each Subcontractor to notify its employees, that they may be eligible for the Federal Earned Income Credit under the Federal income tax laws. Such notice shall be provided in accordance with the requirements set forth in Internal Revenue Service Notice 1015 (Exhibit C).

CC. <u>Notices</u>

Notices desired or required to be given under these Specifications, Conditions, or Terms herein or any law now or hereafter in effect may, at the option of the party giving the same, be given by enclosing the same in a sealed envelope addressed to the party for whom intended and by depositing such envelope with postage prepaid with the United States Post Office and any such notice and the envelope containing the same shall be addressed to Contractor at its place of business, or such other place as may be hereinafter designated in writing by Contractor. The notices and envelopes containing the same to County shall be addressed to:

Contracting Manager, Business Relations and Contracts Division Los Angeles County Public Works P.O. Box 1460 Alhambra, CA 91802-1460

In the event of suspension or termination of this Contract, notices may also be given upon personal delivery to any person whose actual knowledge of such suspension or termination would be sufficient notice to Contractor. Actual knowledge of such suspension or termination by an individual Contractor or by a copartner, if Contractor is a partnership; or by the president, vice president, secretary, or general manager, if Contractor is a corporation; or by the managing agent regularly in charge of the work on behalf of said Contractor shall in any case be sufficient notice.

DD. <u>Publicity</u>

Contractor shall not disclose any details in connection with this Contract to any person or entity except as may be otherwise provided hereunder or required by law. However, in recognizing Contractor's need to identify its services and related clients to sustain itself, County shall not inhibit Contractor from publicizing its role under this Contract within the following conditions:

- 1. Contractor shall develop all publicity material in a professional manner.
- 2. During the term of this Contract, Contractor shall not, and shall not authorize another to, publish or disseminate commercial advertisements, press releases, feature articles, or other materials using the name of County without the prior written consent of the Contract Manager. County shall not unreasonably withhold such written consent.
- 3. Contractor may, without prior written consent of County, indicate in its proposals and sales materials that it has been awarded this Contract with County, provided that the requirements of this paragraph shall apply.
- EE. <u>Public Records Act</u>
 - 1. Any documents submitted by Contractor; all information obtained in connection with County's right to audit and inspect Contractor's documents. and books. accounting records pursuant to this Exhibit's Record Retention and Inspection/Audit Settlement of this Contract; as well as those documents which were required to be submitted in response to the RFP used in the solicitation process for this Contract, become the exclusive property of County. All such documents become a matter of public record and shall be regarded as public records, except those documents that are marked "Trade Secret," "Confidential," or "Proprietary" and are deemed excluded from disclosure under Government Code 6250 et seq. (Public Records Act). County shall not in any way be liable or responsible for the disclosure of any such records including, with limitation, those so marked, if disclosure is required by law, or by an order issued by a court of competent jurisdiction.
 - 2. In the event County is required to defend an action on a Public Records Act request for any of the aforementioned documents, information, books, records, and/or contents of a proposal marked "Trade Secret," "Confidential," or "Proprietary," Contractor agrees to defend and indemnify County from all costs and expenses, including reasonable attorney's fees,

in connection with any requested action or liability arising under the Public Records Act.

FF. Record Retention and Inspection/Audit Settlement

Contractor shall maintain accurate and complete financial records of its activities and operations relating to this Contract in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles. Contractor shall also maintain accurate and complete employment and other records relating to its performance of this Contract. Contractor agrees that County, or its authorized representatives, shall have access to and the right to examine, audit, excerpt, copy, or transcribe any pertinent transaction, activity, or record relating to this Contract. All such material including, but not limited to, all financial records, bank statements, cancelled checks, or other proof of payment, timecards, sign-in/sign-out sheets, and other time and employment records, and proprietary data and information shall be kept and maintained by Contractor and shall be made available to County during the term of this Contract and for a period of five years thereafter unless County's written permission is given to dispose of any such material prior to such time. All such material shall be maintained by Contractor at a location in County, provided that if any such material is located outside County, then, at County's option, Contractor shall pay County for travel, per diem, and other costs incurred by County to examine, audit, excerpt, copy, or transcribe such material at such other location.

- 1. In the event that an audit of Contractor is conducted specifically regarding this Contract by any Federal or State auditor, or by any auditor or accountant employed by Contractor or otherwise, then Contractor shall file a copy of such audit report with County's Auditor-Controller within 30 days of Contractor's receipt thereof, unless otherwise provided by applicable Federal or State law or under this Contract. Subject to applicable law, County shall make a reasonable effort to maintain the confidentiality of such audit report(s).
- 2. Failure on the part of Contractor to comply with any of the provisions of this paragraph shall constitute a material breach of this Contract upon which County may suspend or terminate for default or suspend this Contract.
- 3. If, at any time during the term of this Contract or within five years after the expiration or termination of this Contract, representatives of County conduct an audit of Contractor regarding the work performed under this Contract, and if such audit finds that County's dollar liability for any such work is less than payments made by County to Contractor, then the difference shall be either: a) repaid by Contractor to County by cash payment upon demand or b) at the sole option of County's Auditor-Controller, deducted from any amounts due to Contractor from County, whether under this Contract or otherwise. If such audit finds that County's dollar liability for such work is

more than the payments made by County to Contractor, then the difference shall be paid to Contractor by County by cash payment, provided that in no event shall County's maximum obligation for this Contract exceed the funds appropriated by County for the purpose of this Contract.

GG. <u>Recycled-Content Paper Products</u>

Consistent with Board policy to reduce the amount of solid waste deposited at County landfills, Contractor agrees to use recycled-content paper to the maximum extent possible under this Contract.

HH. <u>Contractor's Employee Criminal Background Investigation</u>

Each of Contractor's staff performing services under this Contract, who is in a designated sensitive position, as determined by County in County's sole discretion, shall undergo and pass a background investigation to the satisfaction of County as a condition of beginning and continuing to perform services under this Contract. Such background investigation must be obtained through fingerprints submitted to the California Department of Justice to include State, local, and federal-level review, which may include, but shall not be limited to, criminal conviction information. The fees associated with the background investigation shall be at the expense of the Contractor, regardless of whether the member of Contractor's staff passes or fails the background investigation.

If a member of Contractor's staff does not pass the background investigation, County may request that the member of Contractor's staff be removed immediately from performing services under the Contract. Contractor shall comply with County's request at any time during the term of the Contract. County will not provide to Contractor or to Contractor's staff any information obtained through the County's background investigation

County, in its sole discretion, may immediately deny or terminate facility access to any member of Contractor's staff that does not pass such investigation to the satisfaction of the County or whose background or conduct is incompatible with County facility access.

Disqualification of any member of Contractor's staff pursuant to this section shall not relieve Contractor of its obligation to complete all work in accordance with the terms and conditions of this Contract.

II. <u>Subcontracting</u>

The requirements of this Contract may not be Subcontracted by Contractor without the advance written approval of County. Any attempt by Contractor to Subcontract without the prior written consent of County may be deemed a material breach of this Contract and the County may suspend or terminate for this Contract default.

- 1. If Contractor desires to Subcontract, Contractor shall provide the following information promptly at County's request:
 - a. A description of the work to be performed by the Subcontractor.
 - b. A draft copy of the proposed Subcontract.
 - c. Other pertinent information and/or certifications requested by County.
- 2. Contractor shall indemnify, defend, and hold County harmless with respect to the activities of each and every Subcontractor in the same manner and to the same degree as if such Subcontractor(s) were Contractor employees.
- 3. Contractor shall remain fully responsible for all performances required of it under this Contract, including those that the Contractor has determined to Subcontract, notwithstanding County's approval of Contractor's proposed Subcontract.
- 4. County's consent to Subcontract shall not waive County's right to prior and continuing approval of any and all personnel, including Subcontractor employees, providing services under this Contract. Contractor is responsible to notify its Subcontractors of this County right.
- 5. County's Contract Manager is authorized to act for and on behalf of County with respect to approval of any Subcontract and Subcontractor employees.
- 6. Contractor shall be solely liable and responsible for all payments or other compensation to all Subcontractors and their officers, employees, agents, and successors in interest arising through services performed hereunder, notwithstanding County's consent to Subcontract.
- 7. Contractor shall obtain certificates of insurance, which establish that the Subcontractor maintains all the programs of insurance required by County from each approved Subcontractor. Contractor shall ensure delivery of all such documents to Business Relations and Contracts Division, P.O. Box 1460, Alhambra, California 91802-1460, before any Subcontractor employee may perform any work hereunder.
- 8. Employee Leasing is prohibited.
- JJ. <u>Validity</u>

If any provision of this Contract or the application thereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the remainder of this Contract and the application of such provision to other persons or circumstances shall not be affected thereby.

KK. <u>Waiver</u>

No waiver by County of any breach of any provision of this Contract shall constitute a waiver of any other breach of said provision or of any other provision of this Contract. Failure of County to enforce at anytime, or from time to time, any provision of this Contract shall not be construed as a waiver thereof.

LL. Warranty Against Contingent Fees

- 1. Contractor warrants that no person or selling agency has been employed or retained to solicit or secure this Contract upon an agreement or understanding for a commission, percentage, brokerage, or contingent fee, excepting bona fide employees or bona fide established commercial or selling agencies maintained by Contractor for the purpose of securing business.
- 2. For breach of this warranty, County shall have the right, in its sole discretion, to suspend or terminate this Contract for default, deduct from amounts owing to the Contractor, or otherwise recover, the full amount of such commission, percentage, brokerage, or contingent fee.

MM. <u>Time Off for Voting</u>

The Contractor shall notify its employees, and shall require each Subcontractor to notify and provide to its employees, information regarding the time off for voting law (Elections Code, Section 14000). Not less than ten days before every Statewide election, every Contractor and Subcontractors shall keep posted conspicuously at the place of work, if practicable, or elsewhere where it can be seen as employees come or go to their place of work, a notice setting forth the provisions of Section 14000.

NN. Local Small Business Enterprise Utilization

When requested by the County, the Contractor shall provide to the County via methods specified by the County, such as submission of electronic live (or dynamic) data on invoices for the prime and all subcontractors using County-designated third party software system or to a County approved website, or other means of submitting expenditure information on subcontractors, including but not limited to the following information: the name, business address and telephone number/email address of each subcontractor.

In addition, the Contractor shall be required to provide each of the specified subcontractor Local Small Business Enterprise (SBE), Disabled Veteran Business Enterprise (DVBE), and Social Enterprise (SE) status (i.e., whether any of the listed subcontractors are Local SBE's) and the proposed monetary amount of the work

the subcontractor will perform on each Notice to Proceed. At the time of submittal of each invoice, the Contractor shall indicate, via methods specified by the County, the actual dollar amounts paid to each listed subcontractor who performed work on the project. The subcontractor may be requested to confirm receipt of the actual payment to the subcontractor by the prime.

The parties agree that it will be impracticable or extremely difficult to fix the extent of actual damages resulting from the failure to the Contractor to comply with this Section. The parties will agree that under the current circumstances a reasonable estimate of such damages is specified in Exhibit F, Performance Requirements Summary, and that the Contractor shall be liable to the County for said amount.

If in the judgment of the Director, or his/her designee, the Contractor is deemed to be in non-compliance with the terms and obligations, the Director or his/her designee, at his/her option, in addition to, or in lieu of, other remedies provided in Exhibit F, Performance Requirements Summary, may deduct and withhold liquidated damages from County's final payment to the Contractor.

OO. Compliance with County's Zero Tolerance Human Trafficking

Contractor acknowledges that the County has established a Zero Tolerance Human Trafficking Policy prohibiting contractors from engaging in human trafficking.

If a Contractor or member of Contractor's staff is convicted of a human trafficking offense, the County shall require that the Contractor or member of Contractor's staff be removed immediately from performing services under the Contract. County will not be under any obligation to disclose confidential information regarding the offenses other than those required by law.

Disqualification of any member of Contractor's staff pursuant to this paragraph shall not relieve Contractor of its obligation to complete all work in accordance with the terms and conditions of this Contract.

PP. Method of Payment and Required Information

The County may, at its sole discretion, determine the most appropriate, efficient, secure, and timely form of payment for any amounts due for goods and/or services provided under a Contract with the County. Proposers/Contractors further agree that the default form of payment shall be EFT or direct deposit, unless an alternative method of payment is deemed appropriate by the A-C.

Upon Contract award and at the request of the A-C and/or Public Works, the Contractor shall provide the A-C with electronic banking and related information for the Contractor and/or any other payee that the Contractor designates to receive payment pursuant to this Contract. Such electronic banking and related information includes, but is not limited to: bank account number and routing number, legal business name, valid taxpayer identification number or TIN, a working e-mail address capable of receiving remittance advices and other payment related correspondence, and any other information that the A-C determines is reasonably necessary to process the payment and comply with all accounting, recordkeeping, and tax reporting requirements.

Any provision of law, grant, or funding agreement requiring a specific form or method of payment other than EFT or direct deposit shall supersede this requirement with respect to those payments. Upon Contract award or at any time during the duration of the Contract, a Contractor may submit a written request for an exemption to this requirement. Such request must be based on specific legal, business or operational needs and explain why the payment method designated by the A-C is not feasible and an alternative is necessary. The A-C, in consultation with Public Works, shall decide whether to approve exemption requests.

QQ. <u>Compliance with Fair Chance Employment Practices</u>

Contractor shall comply with fair chance employment hiring practices set forth in California Government Code Section 12952, Employment Discrimination: Conviction History. Contractor's violation of this paragraph of the Contract may constitute a material breach of the Contract. In the event of such material breach, County may, in its sole discretion, terminate the Contract.

RR. <u>Compliance with the County Policy of Equity</u>

The Contractor acknowledges that the County takes its commitment to preserving the dignity and professionalism of the workplace very seriously, as set forth in the County Policy of Equity (CPOE) (<u>https://ceop.lacounty.gov/)</u>. The contractor further acknowledges that the County strives to provide a workplace free from discrimination, harassment, retaliation and inappropriate conduct based on a protected characteristic, and which may violate the CPOE. The Contractor, its employees and Subcontractors acknowledge and certify receipt and understanding of the CPOE. Failure of the Contractor, its employees or its Subcontractors to uphold the County's expectations of a workplace free from harassment and discrimination, including inappropriate conduct based on a protected characteristic, may subject the Contractor to termination of contractual agreements as well as civil liability.

SS. <u>Contractor Independence</u>

A Contractor or its subsidiary or Subcontractor (Contractor), is prohibited from submitting a bid or proposal in a County solicitation if the Contractor has provided advice or consultation for the solicitation. A Contractor is also prohibited from submitting a bid or proposal in a County solicitation if the Contractor has developed or prepared any of the solicitation materials on behalf of the County. A violation of this provision shall result in the disqualification of the Contractor from participation in the County solicitation or the termination or cancellation of any resultant County contract. This provision shall survive the expiration, or other termination of this Agreement

TERMINATIONS/SUSPENSIONS

A. <u>Termination/Suspension for Breach of Warranty to Maintain Compliance with</u> <u>County's Child Support Compliance Program</u>

Failure of Contractor to maintain compliance with the requirements set forth in this Exhibit's Contractor's Warranty of Adherence to County's Child Support Compliance Program shall constitute a default under this Contract. Without limiting the rights and remedies available to County under any other provision of this Contract, failure of Contractor to cure such default within 90 calendar days of written notice shall be grounds upon which the County may suspend or terminate this Contract pursuant to this Exhibit's Termination/Suspension for Default, and pursue debarment of Contractor pursuant to Los Angeles County Code, Chapter 2.202.

B. <u>Termination/Suspension for Convenience</u>

- 1. This Contract may be suspended or terminated, in whole or in part, from time to time, when such action is deemed by County, in its sole discretion, to be in its best interest. Suspension or termination of work hereunder shall be effected by notice of suspension or termination to Contractor specifying the extent to which performance of work is suspended or terminated and the date upon which such suspension or termination becomes effective. The date upon which such suspension or termination becomes effective shall be no less than ten days after the notice is sent.
- 2. After receipt of a notice of suspension or termination and except as otherwise directed by County, Contractor shall:
 - a. Stop work under this Contract on the date and to the extent specified in such notice.
 - b. Complete performance of such part of the work as shall not have been suspended or terminated by such notice.
- 3. All material including books, records, documents, or other evidence bearing on the costs and expenses of Contractor under this Contract shall be maintained by Contractor in accordance with this Exhibit's Record Retention and Inspection/Audit Settlement.
- 4. If this Contract is suspended or terminated, Contractor shall complete within the Director's suspension or termination date contain within the notice of suspension or termination, those items of work which are in various stages of completion, which the Director has advised the

Contractor are necessary to bring the work to a timely, logical, and orderly end. Reports, samples, and other materials prepared by Contractor under this Contract shall be delivered to County upon request and shall become the property of County.

- C. <u>Termination/Suspension for Default</u>
 - 1. County may, by written notice to Contractor, suspend or terminate the whole or any part of this Contract, if, in the judgment of the County:
 - a. Contractor has materially breached this Contract; or
 - b. Contractor fails to timely provide and/or satisfactorily perform any task, deliverable, service, or other work required under this Contract; or
 - c. Contractor fails to demonstrate a high probability of timely fulfillment of performance requirements under this Contract, or of any obligations of this Contract and in either case, fails to demonstrate convincing progress toward a cure within five working days (or such longer period as County may authorize in writing) after receipt of written notice from County specifying such failure.
 - 2. In the event County suspends or terminates this Contract in whole or in part pursuant to this paragraph, County may procure, upon such terms and in such manner, as County may deem appropriate, goods and services similar to those so suspended or terminated. Contractor shall be liable to County for any and all excess costs incurred by County, as determined by County, for such similar goods and services. Contractor shall continue the performance of this Contract to the extent not suspended or terminated under the provisions of this paragraph.
 - 3. Except with respect to defaults of any Subcontractor, Contractor shall not be liable for any excess costs of the type identified in subparagraph "2" above, if its failure to perform this Contract arises out of causes beyond the control and without the fault or negligence of Contractor. Such causes may include, but are not limited to, acts of God or of the public enemy, acts of County in either its sovereign or contractual capacity, acts of the Federal or State government in its sovereign capacity, fires, floods, epidemics, quarantine restrictions, strikes, freight embargoes, and unusually severe weather; but in every case, the failure to perform must be beyond the control and without the fault or negligence of Contractor. If the failure to perform is caused by the default of a Subcontractor, and if such default arises out of causes beyond the control of both Contractor and Subcontractor, and without the fault or negligence of either of them, Contractor shall not be liable for any such excess costs

for failure to perform, unless the goods or services to be furnished by the Subcontractor were obtainable from other sources in sufficient time to permit Contractor to meet the required delivery schedule.

- 4. If, after County has given notice of termination or suspension under the provisions of this paragraph, it is determined by County that Contractor was not in default under the provisions of this paragraph or that the default was excusable under the provisions of this paragraph, the rights and obligations of the parties shall be the same as if the notice of termination or suspension had been issued pursuant to this Exhibit's Termination/Suspension for Convenience.
- 5. The rights and remedies of County provided in this paragraph shall not be exclusive and are in addition to any other rights and remedies provided by law or under this Contract.
- 6. As used herein, the terms "Subcontractor" and "Subcontractors" mean Subcontractor at any tier.
- D. <u>Termination/Suspension for Improper Consideration</u>
 - 1. County may, by written notice to Contractor, immediately suspend or terminate the right of Contractor to proceed under this Contract if it is found that consideration, in any form, was offered or given by Contractor, either directly or through an intermediary, to any County officer, employee, or agent with the intent of securing this Contract or securing favorable treatment with respect to the award, amendment, extension of this Contract, or the making of any determinations with respect to Contractor's performance pursuant to this Contract. In the event of such termination or suspension, County shall be entitled to pursue those same remedies against Contractor as it could pursue in the event of default by Contractor.
 - 2. Contractor shall immediately report any attempt by a County officer or employee to solicit such improper consideration. The report shall be made either to County manager charged with the supervision of the employee or to County Auditor-Controller's Employee Fraud Hotline at (800) 544-6861.
 - 3. Among other items, such improper consideration may take the form of cash; discounts; services; the provision of travel, entertainment, or tangible gifts.
- E. <u>Termination/Suspension for Insolvency</u>
 - 1. County may suspend or terminate this Contract forthwith in the event of the occurrence of any of the following:

- a. Insolvency of Contractor. Contractor shall be deemed to be insolvent if it has ceased to pay its debts for at least 60 days in the ordinary course of business or cannot pay its debts as they become due, whether or not a petition has been filed under the Federal Bankruptcy Code, and whether or not Contractor is insolvent within the meaning of the Federal Bankruptcy Code.
- b. The filing of a voluntary or involuntary bankruptcy petition relative to Contractor under the Federal Bankruptcy Code.
- c. The appointment of a bankruptcy Receiver or Trustee for Contractor.
- d. The execution by Contractor of a general assignment for the benefits of creditors.
- 2. The rights and remedies of County provided in this paragraph shall not be exclusive and are in addition to any other rights and remedies provided by law or under this Contract.

F. <u>Termination/Suspension for Nonadherence to County Lobbyists Ordinance</u>

Contractor, and each County lobbyist or County lobbying firm as defined in Los Angeles County Code, Section 2.160.010, retained by Contractor, shall fully comply with County's Lobbyist Ordinance, Los Angeles County Code, Chapter 2.160. Failure on the part of Contractor or any County Lobbyists or County Lobbying firm retained by Contractor to fully comply with County's Lobbyist Ordinance shall constitute a material breach of this Contract, upon which County may in its sole discretion, immediately suspend or terminate for default of this Contract.

G. <u>Termination/Suspension for Nonappropriation of Funds</u>

Notwithstanding any other provision of this Contract, County shall not be obligated for Contractor's performance hereunder or by any provision of this Contract during any of County's future fiscal years unless and until the Board appropriates funds for this Contract in County's budget for each such future fiscal year. In the event that funds are not appropriated for this Contract, then this Contract may be suspended or terminated as of June 30 of the last fiscal year for which funds were appropriated. County will notify Contractor in writing of any such nonallocation of funds at the earliest possible date.

GENERAL CONDITIONS OF CONTRACT WORK

A. <u>Authority of Public Works and Inspection</u>

The Director will have the final authority in all matters affecting the work covered by this Contract's Terms, Requirement, Conditions, and Specifications. On all questions relating to work acceptability or interpretations of these Terms, Requirements, Conditions, and Specifications, the decision of the Director will be final.

B. <u>Cooperation</u>

Contractor shall cooperate with Public Works' forces engaged in any other activities at the jobsite. Contractor shall carry out all work in a diligent manner and according to instructions of the Director.

C. <u>Cooperation and Collateral Work</u>

Contractor shall perform work as directed by the Director. The Director will be supported by other Public Works personnel in assuring satisfactory performance of the work under these Specifications and that satisfactory Contract controls and conditions are maintained.

D. Equipment, Labor, Supervision, and Materials

All equipment, labor, supervision, and materials required to accomplish this Contract, except as might be specifically outlined in other sections, shall be provided by Contractor.

E. <u>Gratuitous Work</u>

Contractor agrees that should work be performed outside the Scope of Work indicated and without Public Works' prior written approval in accordance with this Exhibit's Amendments, such work shall be deemed to be a gratuitous effort by Contractor, and Contractor shall have no claim against County.

F. Jobsite Safety

Contractor shall be solely responsible for ensuring that all work performed under this Contract is performed in strict compliance with all applicable Federal, State, and local occupational safety regulations. Contractor shall provide at its expense all safeguards, safety devices, and protective equipment and shall take any and all actions appropriate to providing a safe jobsite.

G. <u>Labor</u>

No person shall be employed on any work under this Contract who is found to be intemperate, troublesome, disorderly, or is otherwise objectionable to Public Works. Any such person shall be reassigned immediately and not again employed on Public Works' projects or providing services.

H. Labor Law Compliance

Contractor, its agents, and employees shall be bound by and shall comply with all applicable provisions of the Labor Code of the State of California as well as all other applicable Federal, State, and local laws related to labor including compliance with prevailing wage laws. The Contractor is responsible for selecting the classification of workers, which will be required to perform this service in accordance with the Contractor's method of performing the work and when applicable, is required to pay current prevailing wage rates adopted by the Director of the Department of Industrial Relations and will indemnify the County for any claims resulting from their failure to so comply. Contractor shall comply with Labor Code, Section 1777.5, with respect to the employment of apprentices.

I. <u>Overtime</u>

Eight hours labor constitutes a legal day's work. Work in excess thereof, or greater than 40 hours during any one week, shall be permitted only as authorized by and in accordance with Labor Code, Section 1815 et seq.

J. <u>Permits/Licenses</u>

Contractor shall be fully responsible for possessing or obtaining all permits/licenses, except as might be specifically outlined in other sections, from the appropriate Federal, State, or local authorities relating to work to be performed under this Contract.

K. <u>Prohibition Against Use of Child Labor</u>

- 1. Contractor shall:
 - a. Not knowingly sell or supply to County any products, goods, supply, or other personal property manufactured in violation of child labor standards set by the International Labor Organization through its 1973 Convention Concerning Minimum Age for Employment.
 - b. Upon request by County, identify the country/countries of origin of any products, goods, supplies, or other personal property Contractor sells or supplies to County.

- c. Upon request by County, provide to County the manufacturer's certification of compliance with all international child labor conventions.
- d. Should County discover that any products, goods, supplies, or other personal property sold or supplied by Contractor to County are produced in violation of any international child labor conventions, Contractor shall immediately provide an alternative, compliant source of supply.
- 2. Failure by Contractor to comply with provisions of this paragraph will constitute a material breach of this Contract and will be grounds for immediate suspension or termination of this Contract for default.

L. <u>Public Convenience</u>

Contractor shall conduct operations to cause the least possible obstruction and inconvenience to public traffic or disruption to the peace and quiet of the area within which the work is being performed.

M. <u>Public Safety</u>

It shall be Contractor's responsibility to maintain security against public hazards at all times while performing work at contracted work locations. In the event Contractor determines a public hazard exists at a work location, Contractor shall immediately mark the location to prevent public access to the hazard and immediately notify the Contract Manager.

N. Quality of Work

Contractor shall provide the County high and consistent quality work under this Contract and which is at least equivalent to that which Contractor provides to all other clients it serves. All work shall be executed by experienced and well-trained workers. All work shall be under supervision of a well-qualified supervisor. Contractor also agrees that work shall be furnished in a professional manner and according to these Specifications.

O. Quantities of Work

Contractor shall be allowed no claims for anticipated profits or for any damages of any sort because of any difference between the work estimated by Contractor in responding to County's solicitation and actual quantities of work done under this Contract or for work decreased or eliminated by County.

P. <u>Safety Requirements</u>

Contractor shall be responsible for the safety of equipment, material, and personnel under Contractor's jurisdiction during the work.

Q. <u>Storage of Materials and Equipment</u>

Contractor shall not store material or equipment at the jobsite, except as might be specifically authorized by this Contract. County will not be liable or responsible for any damage, by whatever means, or for the theft of Contractor's material or equipment from any jobsite.

R. <u>Transportation</u>

County will not provide transportation to and from the jobsite and will not provide travel around the limits of the jobsite.

S. <u>Work Area Controls</u>

- 1. Contractor shall comply with all applicable laws and regulations. Contractor shall maintain work area in a neat, orderly, clean, and safe manner. Contractor shall avoid spreading out equipment excessively. Location and layout of all equipment and materials at each jobsite will be subject to the Contract Manager's approval.
- 2. Contractor shall be responsible for the security of any and all of Public Works/County facilities in its care. Contractor shall provide protection against vandalism and accidental and malicious damage, both during working and nonworking hours.

T. <u>CARD</u>

The County maintains databases that track/monitor Contractor performance history. Information entered into such databases may be used for a variety of purposes, including determining whether the County will exercise a contract term extension option.

INDEMNIFICATION AND INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS

A. <u>Independent Contractor Status</u>

- 1. This Contract is by and between County and Contractor and is not intended, and shall not be construed to create the relationship of agent, servant, employee, partnership, joint venture, or association as between County and Contractor. The employees and agents of one party shall not be, or be construed to be, the employees or agents of the other party for any purpose whatsoever.
- 2. Contractor shall be solely liable and responsible for providing to, or on behalf of, all persons performing work pursuant to this Contract all compensation and benefits. County shall have no liability or responsibility for the payment of any salaries, wages, unemployment benefits, disability benefits, Federal, State, or local taxes, or other compensation, benefits, or taxes for any personnel provided by or on behalf of Contractor.
- 3. Contractor understands and agrees that all persons performing work pursuant to this Contract are, for purposes of Workers' Compensation liability, solely employees of Contractor and not employees of County. Contractor shall be solely liable and responsible for furnishing any and all Workers' Compensation benefits to any person as a result of any injuries arising from or connected with any work performed by or on behalf of Contractor pursuant to this Contract.
- B. <u>Indemnification</u>

Contractor shall indemnify, defend, and hold harmless the County of Los Angeles, its Special Districts, Elected Officials, Appointed Officers, Agents, Employees, and Volunteers ("County Indemnitiees"), from and against any and all liability including, but not limited to, demands, claims, actions, fees, costs, and expenses of any nature whatsoever (including attorney and expert witness fees), arising from or connected with Contractor's acts and/or omissions arising from and/or relating to this Contract except for loss or damage arising from the sole negligence or willful misconduct of the County Indemnitiees. This indemnification also shall include any and all intellectual property liability, including copyright infringement and similar claims.

C. <u>Workplace Safety Indemnification</u>

In addition to and without limiting the indemnification required by this Exhibit's Section 5.B (above), and to the extent allowed by law, Contractor agrees to defend, indemnify, and hold harmless the County of Los Angeles, its Special

Districts, Elected Officials, Appointed Officers, Agents, Employees, and Volunteers from and against any and all investigations, complaints, citations, liability, expense (including defense costs and legal fees), claims, and/or causes of action for damages of any nature whatsoever including, but not limited to, injury or death to employees of Contractor, its Subcontractors or County, attributable to any alleged act or omission of Contractor and/or its Subcontractors which is in violation of any Cal/OSHA regulation. The obligation to defend, indemnify, and hold harmless County includes all investigations and proceedings associated with purported violations of Section 336.10 of Title 8 of the California Code of Regulations pertaining to multiemployer worksites. Contractor shall not be obligated to indemnify for liability and expenses arising from the active negligence of County. County may deduct from any payment otherwise due Contractor any costs incurred or anticipated to be incurred by County, including legal fees and staff costs, associated with any investigation or enforcement proceeding brought by Cal/OSHA arising out of the work being performed by Contractor under this Contract.

D. <u>General Insurance Requirements</u>

- 1. Without limiting Contractor's indemnification of County, and in the performance of this Contract and until all of its obligations pursuant to this Contract have been met, Contractor shall provide and maintain at its own expense insurance coverage satisfying the requirements specified in this paragraph and paragraph F of this Section. These minimum insurance coverage terms, types, and limits (the "Required Insurance") also are in addition to and separate from any other contractual obligation imposed upon Contractor pursuant to this Contract. The County in no way warrants that the Required Insurance is sufficient to protect the Contractor for liabilities which may arise from or relate to this Contract.
- 2. <u>Evidence of Coverage and Notice to County</u>: A certificate(s) of insurance coverage (Certificate) satisfactory to County, and a copy of an Additional Insured endorsement confirming the County of Los Angeles, its Special Districts, Elected Officials, Officers, Agents, Employees, and Volunteers has been given Insured status under the Contractor's General Liability policy, shall be delivered to County at the address shown below and provided prior to commencing services under this Contract.
 - a. Renewal Certificates shall be provided to County not less than ten days prior to Contractor's policy expiration dates. The County reserves the right to obtain complete, certified copies of any required Contractor and/or Subcontractor insurance policies at any time.
 - b. Certificates shall identify all Required Insurance coverage types and limits specified herein, reference this Contract by name or number, and be signed by an authorized representative of the

insurer(s). The Insured party named on the Certificate shall match the name of the Contractor identified as the contracting party in this Contract. Certificates shall provide the full name of each insurer providing coverage, its NAIC (National Association of Insurance Commissioners) identification number, its financial rating, the amounts of any policy deductibles or self-insured retentions exceeding \$50,000, and list any County-required endorsement forms.

- c. Neither the County's failure to obtain, nor the County's receipt of, or failure to object to a noncomplying insurance certificate or endorsement, or any other insurance documentation or information provided by the Contractor, its insurance broker(s) and/or insurer(s), shall be construed as a waiver of any of the Required Insurance provisions.
- d. Certificates and copies of any required endorsements shall be sent to:

Los Angeles County Public Works Business Relations and Contracts Division P.O. Box 1460 Alhambra, California 91802-1460 Attention: Contract Analyst (noted in the RFP Notice)

- e. Contractor also shall promptly report to County any injury or property damage accident or incident, including any injury to a Contractor employee occurring on County property, and any loss, disappearance, destruction, misuse, or theft of County property, monies or securities entrusted to Contractor. Contractor also shall promptly notify County of any third-party claim or suit filed against Contractor or any of its Subcontractors which arises from or relates to this Contract, and could result in the filing of a claim or lawsuit against Contractor and/or County.
- 3. <u>Additional Insured Status and Scope of Coverage</u> The County of Los Angeles, its Special Districts, Elected Officials, Officers, Agents, Employees, and Volunteers shall be provided additional insured status under Contractor's General Liability policy with respect to liability arising out of Contractor's ongoing and completed operations performed on behalf of the County. The County of Los Angeles, its Special Districts, Elected Officials, Officers, Agents, Employees, and Volunteers additional insured status shall apply with respect to liability and defense of suits arising out of the Contractor's acts or omissions, whether such liability is attributable to the Contractor or to the County. The full policy limits and scope of protection also shall apply to the County of Los Angeles, its Special

Districts, Elected Officials, Officers, Agents, Employees, and Volunteers as an additional insured, even if they exceed the County's minimum Required Insurance specifications herein. Use of an automatic additional insured endorsement form is acceptable providing it satisfies the Required Insurance provisions herein.

- 4. <u>Cancellation of or Changes in Insurance</u>: Contractor shall provide County with, or Contractor's insurance policies shall contain a provision that County shall receive, written notice of cancellation or any change in Required Insurance, including insurer, limits of coverage, term of coverage or policy period. The written notice shall be provided to County at least ten days in advance of cancellation for nonpayment of premium and 30 days in advance for any other cancellation or policy change. Failure to provide written notice of cancellation or any change in Required Insurance may constitute a material breach of the Contract, in the sole discretion of the County, upon which the County may suspend or terminate this Contract.
- 5. <u>Failure to Maintain Insurance</u>: Contractor's failure to maintain or to provide acceptable evidence that it maintains the Required Insurance shall constitute a material breach of the Contract, upon which County immediately may withhold payments due to Contractor, and/or suspend or terminate this Contract. County, at its sole discretion, may obtain damages from Contractor resulting from said breach. Alternatively, the County may purchase the Required Insurance, and without further notice to Contractor, deduct the premium cost from sums due to Contractor or pursue Contractor reimbursement.
- 6. <u>Insurer Financial Ratings</u>: Coverage shall be placed with insurers acceptable to the County with A.M. Best ratings of not less than A:VII unless otherwise approved by County.
- 7. <u>Contractor's Insurance Shall Be Primary</u>: Contractor's insurance policies, with respect to any claims related to this Contract, shall be primary with respect to all other sources of coverage available to Contractor. Any County-maintained insurance or self-insurance coverage shall be in excess of and not contribute to any Contractor coverage.
- 8. <u>Waivers of Subrogation</u>: To the fullest extent permitted by law, the Contractor hereby waives its rights and its insurer(s)' rights of recovery against County under all the Required Insurance for any loss arising from or relating to this Contract. The Contractor shall require its insurers to execute any waiver of subrogation endorsements which may be necessary to effect such waiver.

- 9. <u>Subcontractor Insurance Coverage Requirements</u>: Contractor shall include all Subcontractors as insureds under Contractor's own policies, or shall provide County with each Subcontractor's separate evidence of insurance coverage. Contractor shall be responsible for verifying each Subcontractor complies with the Required Insurance provisions herein, and shall require that each Subcontractor name the County of Los Angeles, its Special Districts, Elected Officials, Officers, Agents, Employees, Volunteers, and Contractor as additional insureds on the Subcontractor's General Liability policy. Contractor shall obtain County's prior review and approval of any Subcontractor request for modification of the Required Insurance.
- 10. <u>Deductibles and Self-Insured Retentions (SIRs)</u>: Contractor's policies shall not obligate the County to pay any portion of any Contractor deductible or SIR. The County retains the right to require Contractor to reduce or eliminate policy deductibles and SIRs as respects the County, or to provide a bond guaranteeing Contractor's payment of all deductibles and SIRs, including all related claims investigation, administration, and defense expenses. Such bond shall be executed by a corporate surety licensed to transact business in the State of California.
- 11. <u>Claims Made Coverage:</u> If any part of the Required Insurance is written on a claims made basis, any policy retroactive date shall precede the effective date of this Contract. Contractor understands and agrees it shall maintain such coverage for a period of not less than three years following Contract expiration, termination, or cancellation.
- 12. <u>Application of Excess Liability Coverage</u>: Contractors may use a combination of primary, and excess insurance policies which provide coverage as broad as ("follow form" over) the underlying primary policies, to satisfy the Required Insurance provisions.
- 13. <u>Separation of Insureds</u>: All liability policies shall provide cross-liability coverage as would be afforded by the standard Insurance Services Office, Inc. (ISO) separation of insureds provision with no insured versus insured exclusions or limitations.
- 14. <u>Alternative Risk Financing Programs</u>: The County reserves the right to review, and then approve, Contractor use of self-insurance, risk retention groups, risk purchasing groups, pooling arrangements, and captive insurance to satisfy the Required Insurance provisions. The County of Los Angeles, its Special Districts, Elected Officials, Officers, Agents, Employees, and Volunteers shall be designated as an Additional Covered Party under any approved program.

15. <u>County Review and Approval of Insurance Requirements</u>: The County reserves the right to review and adjust the Required Insurance provisions, conditioned upon County's determination of changes in risk exposures.

E. <u>Compensation for County Costs</u>

In the event that the Contractor fails to comply with any of the indemnification or insurance requirements of this Contract, and such failure to comply results in any costs to the County, the Contractor shall pay full compensation for all costs incurred by the County.

F. Insurance Coverage Requirements

1. <u>Commercial General Liability</u> insurance (providing scope of coverage equivalent to ISO policy form CG 00 01), naming The County of Los Angeles, its Special Districts, Elected Officials, Officers, Agents, Employees, and Volunteers as an additional insured, with limits of not less than:

General Aggregate:	\$2 million
Products/Completed Operations Aggregate:	\$1 million
Personal and Advertising Injury:	\$1 million
Each Occurrence:	\$1 million

- 2. <u>Automobile Liability</u> insurance (providing scope of coverage equivalent to ISO policy form CA 00 01) with limits of not less than \$1 million for bodily injury and property damage, in combined or equivalent split limits, for each single accident. Insurance shall cover liability arising out of Contractor's use of autos pursuant to this Contract, including owned, leased, hired, and/or nonowned autos, as each may be applicable.
- 3. Workers Compensation and Employers' Liability insurance or gualified self-insurance satisfying statutory requirements, which includes Employers' Liability coverage with limits of not less than \$1 million per accident. If Contractor is a temporary staffing firm or a Professional Employer Organization (PEO), coverage also shall include an Alternate Employer Endorsement (providing scope of coverage equivalent to ISO policy form WC 00 03 01 A) naming the County as the Alternate Employer. and the endorsement form shall be modified to provide that County will receive not less than 30 days advance written notice of cancellation of this coverage provision. If applicable to Contractor's operations, coverage also shall be arranged to satisfy the requirements of any Federal workers or workmen's compensation law or any Federal occupational disease law.
- 4. <u>Sexual Misconduct Liability</u> insurance covering actual or alleged claims for sexual misconduct and/or molestation with limits of not less than

\$2 million per claim and \$2 million aggregate, and claims for negligent employment, investigation, supervision, training or retention of, or failure to report to proper authorities, a person(s) who committed any act of abuse, molestation, harassment, mistreatment or maltreatment of a sexual nature.

- 5. <u>Professional Liability/Errors and Omissions</u>: insurance covering Contractor's liability arising from or related to this Contract, with limits of not less than \$1 million per claim and \$3 million aggregate. Further, Contractor understands and agrees it shall maintain such coverage for a period of not less than two years following this Agreement's expiration, termination, or cancellation.
- 6. <u>Intellectual Property</u>: Insurance covering any actual or alleged infringement of any copyright, patent or other rights of third-party, and any actual or alleged trade secret disclosure or misappropriation. Insurance coverage limit will be at least \$1,000,000 per occurrence. If this insurance is written on a claims made form, Contractor shall either: (i) maintain such insurance through the period ending two years following the expiration or termination of this Agreement or (ii) obtain an endorsement on such insurance that provides an extended reporting period of not less than two years following the termination or expiration of this Agreement or insurance policy, whichever is longer, or (iii) replace such claims made insurance coverage with equivalent coverage of the per occurrence form that covers the entire term of the Agreement.

CONTRACTOR RESPONSIBILITY AND DEBARMENT

A. <u>Responsible Contractor</u>

A responsible Contractor is a Contractor who has demonstrated the attribute of trustworthiness as well as quality, fitness, capacity, and experience to satisfactorily perform the contract. It is County's policy to conduct business only with responsible Contractors.

B. <u>Chapter 2.202 of the County Code</u>

Contractor is hereby notified that, in accordance with Chapter 2.202 of County Code, if County acquires information concerning the performance of Contractor on this or other Contracts which indicates that Contractor is not responsible, County may, in addition to other remedies provided in this Contract, debar Contractor from bidding or proposing on, being awarded, and/or performing work on County Contracts for a specified period of time, which generally will not exceed five years but may exceed five years or be permanent if warranted by the circumstances, and suspend or terminate any or all existing Contracts Contractor may have with County.

C. Nonresponsible Contractor

County may debar a Contractor if the Board finds, in its discretion, that Contractor has done any of the following: (1) violated any term of a Contract with County or a nonprofit corporation created by County; (2) committed an act or omission which negatively reflects on Contractor's quality, fitness, or capacity to perform a contract with County, any other public entity, or a nonprofit corporation created by County, or engaged in a pattern or practice which negatively reflects on same; (3) committed an act or offense which indicates a lack of business integrity or business honesty; or (4) made or submitted a false claim against County or any other public entity.

D. <u>Contractor Hearing Board</u>

- 1. If there is evidence that Contractor may be subject to debarment, Public Works will notify Contractor in writing of the evidence which is the basis for the proposed debarment and will advise Contractor of the scheduled date for a debarment hearing before Contractor Hearing Board.
- 2. Contractor Hearing Board will conduct a hearing where evidence on the proposed debarment is presented. Contractor and/or Contractor's representative shall be given an opportunity to submit evidence at that hearing. After the hearing, Contractor Hearing Board will prepare a tentative proposed decision, which shall contain a recommendation

regarding whether Contractor should be debarred, and, if so, the appropriate length of time of the debarment. Contractor and Public Works shall be provided an opportunity to object to the tentative proposed decision prior to its presentation to the Board.

- 3. After consideration of any objections, or if no objections are submitted, a record of the hearing, the proposed decision, and any other recommendation of Contractor Hearing Board shall be presented to the Board. The Board shall have the right to modify, deny, or adopt the proposed decision and recommendation of Contractor Hearing Board.
- 4. If a Contractor has been debarred for a period longer than five years, that Contractor may, after the debarment has been in effect for at least five years, submit a written request for review of the debarment determination to reduce the period of debarment or terminate the debarment. County may, in its discretion, reduce the period of debarment or terminate the debarment if it finds that Contractor has adequately demonstrated one or more of the following: (1) elimination of the grounds for which the debarment was imposed; (2) a bona fide change in ownership or management; (3) material evidence discovered after debarment was imposed; or (4) any other reason that is in the best interests of County.
- 5. Contractor Hearing Board will consider a request for review of a debarment determination only where (1) Contractor has been debarred for a period longer than five years; (2) the debarment has been in effect for at least five years; and (3) the request is in writing, states one or more of the grounds for reduction of the debarment period or termination of the debarment, and includes supporting documentation. Upon receiving an appropriate request, Contractor Hearing Board will provide notice of the hearing on the request. At the hearing, Contractor Hearing Board shall conduct a hearing where evidence on the proposed reduction of debarment period or termination of debarment is presented. This hearing shall be conducted and the request for review decided by Contractor Hearing Board pursuant to the same procedure as for a debarment hearing.
- 6. Contractor Hearing Board's proposed decision shall contain a recommendation on the request to reduce the period of debarment or terminate the debarment. Contractor Hearing Board shall present its proposed decision and recommendation to the Board. The Board shall have the right to modify, deny, or adopt the proposed decision and recommendation of Contractor Hearing Board.

E. <u>Subcontractors of Contractor</u>

These terms shall also apply to Subcontractors of County contractors.

F. <u>Prohibition of Contract with Suspended, Debarred, Ineligible or Excluded Contractor</u> by Federal or State Government

Contractor hereby acknowledges that County is prohibited from contracting with parties that are suspended, debarred, ineligible or excluded from securing Statefunded or Federally-funded contracts. By executing this Contract, Contractor certifies that neither it nor any of its owners, officers, partners, directors, or other principals is currently suspended, debarred, ineligible or excluded from securing State-funded or Federally-funded Contracts. Further by executing this Contract, Contractor certifies that, to its knowledge, none of its subcontractors, at any tier, or any owner, officer, partner, director, or other principal of any subcontractor is currently suspended, debarred, ineligible or excluded from securing State-funded or Federally-funded contracts. During the term of this Contract. Contractor shall immediately notify County's Compliance Manager in writing should it or any of its subcontractors or any principals of either be suspended, debarred, ineligible or excluded from securing State-funded or Federally-funded contracts. Failure of Contractor to comply with this provision shall constitute a material breach of this Contract upon which County may immediately terminate or suspend this Contract.

COMPLIANCE WITH COUNTY'S JURY SERVICE PROGRAM

A. Jury Service Program

This Contract is subject to the provisions of County's ordinance entitled Contractor Employee Jury Service (Jury Service Program) as codified in Sections 2.203.010 through 2.203.090 of the Los Angeles County Code.

B. <u>Written Employee Jury Service Policy</u>

- 1. Unless Contractor has demonstrated to County's satisfaction either that Contractor "Contractor" is not а as defined under the Jury Service Program (Section 2.203.020 of County Code) or that Contractor qualifies for an exception to the Jury Service Program (Section 2.203.070 of County Code), Contractor shall have and adhere to a written policy that provides that its Employees shall receive from Contractor, on an annual basis, no less than five days of regular pay for actual jury service. The policy may provide that Employee deposit any fees received for such jury service with Contractor or that Contractor deduct from the Employee's regular pay the fees received for jury service.
- 2. For purposes of this Section, "Contractor" means a person, partnership, corporation, or other entity which has a Contract with County or a Subcontract with a County Contractor and has received or will receive an aggregate sum of \$50,000 or more in any 12-month period under one or more County Contracts or Subcontracts. "Employee" means any California resident who is a full-time employee of Contractor. "Full-time" means 40 hours or more worked per week, or a lesser number of hours if: 1) the lesser number is a recognized industry standard as determined by County, or 2) Contractor has a long-standing practice that defines the lesser number of hours as full-time. Full-time employees providing short-term, temporary services of 90 days or less within a 12-month period are not considered full-time for purposes of the Jury Service Program. If Contractor uses any Subcontractor to perform services for County under this Contract, the Subcontractor shall also be subject to the provisions of this Section. The provisions of this Section shall be inserted into any such Subcontract agreement and a copy of the Jury Service Program shall be attached to the agreement.
- 3. If Contractor is not required to comply with the Jury Service Program when this Contract commences, Contractor shall have a continuing obligation to review the applicability of its "exception status" from the Jury Service Program, and Contractor shall immediately notify County if Contractor at any time either comes within the Jury Service Program's definition of

"Contractor" or if Contractor no longer qualifies for an exception to the Jury Service Program. In either event, Contractor shall immediately implement a written policy consistent with the Jury Service Program. County may also require, at any time during this Contract and at its sole discretion, that Contractor demonstrate to County's satisfaction that Contractor either continues to remain outside of the Jury Service Program's definition of "Contractor" and/or that Contractor continues to qualify for an exception to the Jury Service Program.

4. Contractor's violation of this Section of this Contract may constitute a material breach of this Contract. In the event of such material breach, County may, in its sole discretion, suspend or terminate this Contract and/or bar Contractor from the award of future County contracts for a period of time consistent with the seriousness of the breach.

SAFELY SURRENDERED BABY LAW PROGRAM

A. <u>Contractor's Acknowledgment of County's Commitment to the Safely Surrendered</u> <u>Baby Law</u>

Contractor acknowledges that County places a high priority on the implementation of the Safely Surrendered Baby Law. Contractor understands that it is County's policy to encourage all County Contractors to voluntarily post County's "Safely Surrendered Baby Law" poster in a prominent position at Contractor's place of business. Contractor will also encourage its Subcontractors, if any, to post this poster in a prominent position in the Subcontractor's place of business. The Contractor, and its Subcontractor(s), can access posters and other campaign material at <u>www.babysafela.org.</u>

B. Notice to Employees Regarding the Safely Surrendered Baby Law

Contractor shall notify and provide to its employees, and shall require each Subcontractor to notify and provide to its employees, a fact sheet regarding the Safely Surrendered Baby Law, its implementation in County, and where and how to safely surrender a baby. The fact sheet is set forth in Exhibit D of this Contract and is also available on the Internet at <u>www.babysafela.org</u> for printing purposes.

SOCIAL ENTERPRISE PREFERENCE PROGRAM

This Contract is subject to the provisions of the County's ordinance entitled SE Preference Program, as codified in Chapter 2.205 of the Los Angeles County Code.

Contractor shall not knowingly and with the intent to defraud, fraudulently obtain, retain, attempt to obtain or retain, or aid another in fraudulently obtaining or retaining or attempting to obtain or retain certification as a SE.

Contractor shall not willfully and knowingly make a false statement with the intent to defraud, whether by affidavit, report, or other representation, to a County official or employee for the purpose of influencing the certification or denial of certification of any entity as a SE.

If Contractor has obtained County certification as a SE by reason of having furnished incorrect supporting information or by reason of having withheld information, and which knew, or should have known, the information furnished was incorrect or the information withheld was relevant to its request for certification, and which by reason of such certification has been awarded this contract to which it would not otherwise have been entitled, Contractor shall:

- 1. Pay to the County any difference between the Contract amount and what the County's costs would have been if the Contract had been properly awarded.
- 2. In addition to the amount described in subdivision (1), be assessed a penalty in the amount of not more than 10 percent of the amount of this Contract.
- 3. Be subject to the provisions of Chapter 2.202 of the Los Angeles County Code (Determinations of Contractor Nonresponsibility and Contractor Debarment).

The above penalties shall also apply to any entity that has previously obtained proper certification, however, as a result of a change in their status would no longer be eligible for certification, and fails to notify the Department of Consumer and Business Affairs of this information prior to responding to a solicitation or accepting a contract award.

LOCAL SMALL BUSINESS ENTERPRISE PREFERENCE PROGRAM

- A. This Contract is subject to the provisions of County's ordinance entitled Local Small Business Enterprise Preference Program, as codified in Chapter 2.204 of the Los Angeles County Code.
- B. Contractor shall not knowingly and with the intent to defraud, fraudulently obtain, retain, attempt to obtain or retain, or aid another in fraudulently obtaining or retaining or attempting to obtain or retain certification as a Local Small Business Enterprise.
- C. Contractor shall not willfully and knowingly make a false statement with the intent to defraud, whether by affidavit, report, or other representation, to a County official or employee for the purpose of influencing the certification or denial of certification of any entity as a Local Small Business Enterprise.
- D. If Contractor has obtained County certification as a Local Small Business Enterprise by reason of having furnished incorrect supporting information or by reason of having withheld information, and which knew, or should have known, the information furnished was incorrect or the information withheld was relevant to its request for certification, and which by reason of such certification has been awarded this Contract to which it would not otherwise have been entitled, shall:
 - 1. Pay to County any difference between this Contract amount and what County's costs would have been if this Contract had been properly awarded.
 - 2. In addition to the amount described in subdivision (1), be assessed a penalty in an amount of not more than 10 percent of the amount of this Contract.
 - 3. Be subject to the provisions of Chapter 2.202 of the Los Angeles County Code (Determinations of Contractor Nonresponsibility and Contractor Debarment).
- E. The above penalties shall also apply to any business that has previously obtained proper certification, however, as a result of a change in their status would no longer be eligible for certification, and fails to notify the State and the Department of Consumer and Business Affairs of this information prior to responding to a solicitation or accepting a contract award.

SECTION 11

DISABLED VETERAN BUSINESS ENTERPRISE PREFERENCE PROGRAM

- A. This Contract is subject to the provisions of the County's ordinance entitled Disabled Veteran Business Enterprise (DVBE) Preference Program, as codified in Chapter 2.211 of the Los Angeles County Code.
- B. Contractor shall not knowingly and with the intent to defraud, fraudulently obtain, retain, attempt to obtain or retain, or aid another in fraudulently obtaining or retaining or attempting to obtain or retain certification as a DVBE.
- C. Contractor shall not willfully and knowingly make a false statement with the intent to defraud, whether by affidavit, report, or other representation, to a County official or employee for the purpose of influencing the certification or denial of certification of any entity as a DVBE.
- D. If Contractor has obtained certification as a DVBE by reason of having furnished incorrect supporting information or by reason of having withheld information, and which knew, or should have known, the information furnished was incorrect or the information withheld was relevant to its request for certification, and which by reason of such certification has been awarded this contract to which it would not otherwise have been entitled, shall:
 - a. Pay to the County any difference between the Contract amount and what the County's costs would have been if the Contract had been properly awarded.
 - b. In addition to the amount described in subdivision (1), be assessed a penalty in an amount of not more than 10 percent of the amount of the Contract.
 - c. Be subject to the provisions of Chapter 2.202 of the Los Angeles County Code (Determinations of Contractor Nonresponsibility and Contractor Debarment).
- E. Notwithstanding any other remedies in this contract, the above penalties shall also apply to any business that has previously obtained proper certification, however, as a result of a change in their status would no longer be eligible for certification, and fails to notify the State and the Department of Consumer and Business Affairs of this information prior to responding to a solicitation or accepting a contract award.

SECTION 12

COMPLIANCE WITH COUNTY'S DEFAULTED PROPERTY TAX REDUCTION PROGRAM

A. <u>Defaulted Property Tax Reduction Program</u>

This Contract is subject to the provisions of County's ordinance entitled Defaulted Property Tax Reduction Program ("Defaulted Tax Program") as codified in Sections 2.206 of the Los Angeles County Code (Exhibit E).

B. <u>Contractor's Warranty of Compliance with County's Defaulted Property Tax</u> <u>Reduction Program</u>

Contractor acknowledges that County has established a goal of ensuring that all individuals and businesses that benefit financially from the County through any Contract are current in paying their property tax obligations (secured and unsecured roll) in order to mitigate the economic burden otherwise imposed upon the County and its taxpayers.

Unless Contractor qualifies for an exemption or exclusion, Contractor warrants and certifies that to the best of its knowledge it is now in compliance, and during the term of this Contract will maintain compliance, with Los Angeles County Code, Chapter 2.206.

C. <u>Termination for Breach of Warranty of Compliance with County's Defaulted</u> <u>Property Tax Reduction Program</u>

Failure of Contractor to maintain compliance with the requirements set forth in paragraph B, above, shall constitute default under this Contract. Without limiting the rights and remedies available to County under any other provision of this Contract, failure of Contractor to cure such default within ten days of notice shall be grounds upon which County may terminate this Contract and/or pursue debarment of Contractor, pursuant to County Code, Chapter 2.206.

SECTION 13

PROPRIETARY CONSIDERATIONS

A. <u>Ownership of County Materials</u>

Contractor and County agree that all materials including, but not limited to, designs, specifications, techniques, plans, reports, deliverables, data, photographs, diagrams. maps, images, graphics, text. advertising, videos. software. source codes, website plans and designs, interactive media, drafts, working papers, outlines, sketches, summaries, edited and/or unedited versions of deliverables, and any other materials or information developed under this Contract and any and all Intellectual Property rights to these materials, including any copyrights, trademarks, service marks, trade secrets, trade names, unpatented inventions, patent applications, patents, design rights, domain rights, know-how, and any other proprietary rights and derivatives thereof, is and shall be the sole property of County (hereafter collectively, "County Materials"). Contractor hereby assigns and transfers to County all Contractor's rights, titles, and interest in and to all such County Materials developed under this Contract.

Notwithstanding such County ownership in the County Materials, Contractor may retain possession of working papers and materials prepared by Contractor under this Contract. During and for a minimum of five years subsequent to the term of this Contract, County shall have the right to inspect any and all such working papers and materials, make copies thereof and use the working papers and materials and the information contained therein.

B. <u>Transfer to County</u>

Contractor shall execute all documents requested by County and shall perform all other acts requested by County to assign and transfer to, and vest in County, all Contractor's rights, titles, and interest in and to the County Materials including, but not limited to, any and all copyrights, trademarks, service marks, trade names, unpatented inventions, patent applications, patents, design rights, domain name rights, know-how, and any other proprietary rights and derivatives thereof resulting from this Contract. County shall have the right to register all applicable copyrights, trademarks, and patents in the name of the County of Los Angeles. Further, County shall have the right to assign, license, or otherwise transfer any and all County's rights, titles, and interest including, but not limited to, copyrights, trademarks, and patents, in and to the County Materials.

C. Indemnity

Contractor represents and warrants that the County Materials prepared herein under this Contract, is the original work of Contractor and does not infringe upon any Intellectual Property or proprietary rights of third-parties. For those portions of the County Materials that are not the original work of Contractor, Contractor represents and warrants that it has secured all appropriate licenses, rights, and/or permission from appropriate third-parties to include such materials in the County Materials.

Contractor shall defend, indemnify, and hold County harmless against any claims by third-parties based on infringement of copyright, patent, trade secret, trademark, or any other claimed Intellectual Property or proprietary right, arising from County's use of County Materials created and/or prepared by Contractor. Contractor will also indemnify and defend at its sole expense, any action brought against County based on a claim that County Materials furnished hereunder by Contractor and used within the scope of this Contract infringe any copyright, patent, trade secret, trademark, or any other claimed intellectual property or proprietary right of third-parties, and Contractor shall pay any costs, damages and attorney's fees incurred by County. County will notify Contractor promptly and in writing of any such action or claim and will permit Contractor to fully participate in the defense thereof.

D. <u>Copyright Notices</u>

Contractor shall affix the following notice to all County Materials: "@ Copyright 2007 (or such other appropriate date of first publication), County of Los Angeles. All Rights Reserved." Contractor shall affix such notice on the title page of all images, photographs, documents and writings; and otherwise as County may direct.

E. <u>Acknowledgement/Attribution</u>

County shall also have the sole right to control the preparation, modification and revisions to, all acknowledgment and/or attribution language for all County Materials resulting from this Contract. County will, however, exercise reasonable efforts to honor requests by Contractor seeking removal of all acknowledgment and/or attribution language relating to the Contractor, should Contractor no longer wish to receive attribution for its work on the County Materials.

Have You Told Your Employees About the Earned Income Credit (EIC)?

What Is the EIC?

The EIC is a refundable tax credit for certain workers.

Which Employees Must I Notify About the EIC?

You must notify each employee who worked for you at any time during the year and from whose wages you did not withhold income tax. However, you do not have to notify any employee who claimed exemption from withholding on Form W-4, Employee's Withholding Allowance Certificate.

Note: You are encouraged to notify each employee whose wages for 2019 are less than \$55,952 that he or she may be eligible for the EIC.

How and When Must I Notify My Employees?

You must give the employee one of the following.

• The IRS Form W-2, Wage and Tax Statement, which has the required information about the EIC on the back of Copy B.

• A substitute Form W-2 with the same EIC information on the back of the employee's copy that is on Copy B of the IRS Form W-2.

Notice 797, Possible Federal Tax Refund Due to the Earned Income Credit (EIC).

• Your written statement with the same wording as Notice 797.

If you give an employee a Form W-2 on time, no further notice is necessary if the Form W-2 has the required information about the EIC on the back of the employee's copy. If you give an employee a substitute Form W-2, but it does not have the required information, you must notify the employee within 1 week of the date the substitute Form W-2 is given. If Form W-2 is required but is not given on time, you must give the employee Notice 797 or your written statement by the date Form W-2 is required to be given. If Form W-2 is not required, you must notify the employee by February 7, 2020.

You must hand the notice directly to the employee or send it by first-class mail to the employee's last known address. You will not meet the notification requirements by posting Notice 797 on an employee bulletin board or sending it through office mail. However, you may want to post the notice to help inform all employees of the EIC. You can download copies of the notice at <u>www.irs.gov/FormsPubs</u>. Or you can go to <u>www.irs.gov/OrderForms</u> to order it.

How Will My Employees Know if They Can Claim the EIC?

The basic requirements are covered in Notice 797. For more detailed information, the employee needs to see Pub. 596, Earned Income Credit (EIC), or the Instructions for Forms 1040 and 1040-SR.

How Do My Employees Claim the EIC?

An eligible employee claims the EIC on his or her 2019 tax return. Even an employee who has no tax withheld from wages and owes no tax may claim the EIC and ask for a refund, but he or she must file a tax return to do so. For example, if an employee has no tax withheld in 2019 and owes no tax but is eligible for a credit of \$800, he or she must file a 2019 tax return to get the \$800 refund.

Safely Surrendered Baby Law

What is the Safely

Surrendered Baby Law? California's Safely Surrendered Baby Law allows parents or other persons, with lawful custody, which means anyone to whom the parent has given permission to confidentially surrender a baby. As long as the baby is three days (72 hours) of age or younger and has not been abused or neglected, the baby may be surrendered without fear of arrest or prosecution.

Every baby deserves a chance for a healthy life. If someone you know is considering abandoning a baby, let her know there are other options. For three days (72 hours) after birth, a baby can be surrendered to staff at any hospital or fire station in Los Angeles County.

How does it work?

A distressed parent who is unable or unwilling to care for a baby can legally, confidentially, and safely surrender a baby within three days (72 hours) of birth. The baby must be handed to an employee at a hospital or fire station in Los Angeles County. As long as the baby shows no sign of abuse or neglect, no name or other information is required. In case the parent changes his or her mind at a later date and wants the baby back, staff will use bracelets to help connect them to each other. One bracelet will be placed on the baby, and a matching bracelet will be given to the parent or other surrendering adult.

What if a parent wants the baby back?

Parents who change their minds can begin the process of reclaiming their baby within 14 days. These parents should call the Los Angeles County Department of Children and Family Services at 1-800-540-4000.

Can only a parent bring in the baby?

No. While in most cases a parent will bring in the baby, the Law allows other people to bring in the baby if they have lawful custody.

Does the parent or surrendering adult have to call before bringing in the baby?

No. A parent or surrendering adult can bring in a baby anytime, 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, as long as the parent or surrendering adult surrenders the baby to someone who works at the hospital or fire station.

Does the parent or surrendering adult have to tell anything to the people taking the baby?

No. However, hospital or fire station personnel will ask the surrendering party to fill out a questionnaire designed to gather important medical history information, which is very useful in caring for the baby. The questionnaire includes a stamped return envelope and can be sent in at a later time.

What happens to the baby?

The baby will be examined and given medical treatment. Upon release from the hospital, social workers immediately place the baby in a safe and loving home and begin the adoption process.

What happens to the parent or surrendering adult?

Once the parent or surrendering adult surrenders the baby to hospital or fire station personnel, they may have at any time.

Why is California doing this?

The purpose of the Safely Surrendered Baby Law is to protect babies from being abandoned, hurt or killed by their parents. You may have heard tragic stories of babies left in dumpsters or public bathrooms. Their parents may have been under severe emotional distress. The mothers may have hidden their pregnancies, fearful of what would happen if their families found out. Because they were afraid and had no one or nowhere to turn for help, they abandoned their babies. Abandoning a baby is illegal and places the baby in extreme danger. Too often, it results in the baby's death. The Safely Surrendered Baby Law prevents this tragedy from ever happening again in California.

A baby's story

Early in the morning on April 9, 2005, a healthy baby boy was safely surrendered to nurses at Harbor-UCLA Medical Center. The woman who brought the baby to the hospital identified herself as the baby's aunt and stated the baby's mother had asked her to bring the baby to the hospital on her behalf. The aunt was given a bracelet with a number matching the anklet placed on the baby; this would provide some identification in the event the mother changed her mind about surrendering the baby and wished to reclaim the baby in the 14-day period allowed by the Law. The aunt was also provided with a medical questionnaire and said she would have the mother complete and mail back in the stamped return envelope provided. The baby was examined by medical staff and pronounced healthy and full-term. He was placed with a loving family that had been approved to adopt him by the Department of Children and Family Services.

Ley de Entrega de Bebés Sin Peligro

¿Qué es la Ley de Entrega de Bebés sin Peligro?

La Ley de Entrega de Bebés sin Peligro de California permite la entrega confidencial de un recién nacido por parte de sus padres u otras personas con custodia legal, es decir cualquier persona a quien los padres le hayan dado permiso. Siempre que el bebé tenga tres días (72 horas) de vida o menos, y no haya sufrido abuso ni negligencia, pueden entregar al recién nacido sin temor de ser arrestados o procesados.

Cada recién nacido se merece la oportunidad de tener una vida saludable. Si alguien que usted conoce está pensando en abandonar a un recién nacido, infórmele que tiene otras opciones. Hasta tres días (72 horas) después del nacimiento, se puede entregar un recién nacido al personal de cualquier hospital o cuartel de bomberos del condado de Los Angeles.

Historia de un bebé

A la mañana temprano del día 9 de abril de 2005, se entregó un recién nacido saludable a las enfermeras del Harbor-UCLA Medical Center. La mujer que llevó el recién nacido al hospital se dio a conocer como la tía del bebé, y dijo que la madre le había pedido que llevara al bebé al hospital en su nombre. Le entregaron a la tía un brazalete con un número que coincidía con la pulsera del bebé; esto serviría como identificación en caso de que la madre cambiara de opinión con respecto a la entrega del bebé y decidiera recuperarlo dentro del período de 14 días que permite esta ley. También le dieron a la tía un cuestionario médico, y ella dijo que la madre lo llenaría y lo enviaría de vuelta dentro del sobre con franqueo pagado que le habían dado. El personal médico examinó al bebé y se determinó que estaba saludable y a término. El bebé fue ubicado con una buena familia que ya había sido aprobada para adoptarlo por el Departamento de Servicios para Niños y Familias.

¿Cómo funciona?

El padre/madre con dificultades que no pueda o no quiera cuidar de su recién nacido puede entregarlo en forma legal. confidencial y segura dentro de los tres días (72 horas) del nacimiento. El bebé debe ser entregado a un empleado de cualquier hospital o cuartel de bomberos del Condado de Los Ángeles. Siempre que el bebé nopresente signos de abuso o negligencia, no será necesario suministrar nombres ni información alguna. Si el padre/madre cambia de opinión posteriormente y desea recuperar a su bebé, los trabajadores utilizarán brazaletes para poder vinculados. El bebé llevará un brazalete y el padre/madre o el adulto que lo entregue recibirá un brazalete igual.

¿Qué pasa si el padre/madre desea recuperar a su bebé?

Los padres que cambien de opinión pueden comenzar el proceso de reclamar a su recién nacido dentro de los 14 días. Estos padres deberán llamar al Departamento de Servicios para Niños y Familias (Department of Children and Family Services) del Condado de Los Ángeles al 1-800-540-4000.

¿Sólo los padres podrán llevar al recién nacido?

No. Si bien en la mayoría de los casos son los padres los que llevan al bebé, la ley permite que otras personas lo hagan sí tienen custodia legal.

¿Los padres o el adulto que entrega al bebé deben llamar antes de llevar al bebé?

No. El padre/madre o adulto puede llevar al bebé en cualquier momento, las 24 horas del día, los 7 días de la semana, siempre y cuando entreguen a su bebé a un empleado del hospítal o cuartel de bomberos.

¿Es necesario que el padre/ madre o adulto diga algo a las personas que reciben al bebé?

No. Sin embargo, el personal del hospital o cuartel de bomberos le pedirá a la persona que entregue al bebé que llene un cuestionario con la finalidad de recabar antecedentes médicos importantes, que resultan de gran utilidad para cuidar bien del bebé. El cuestionario incluye un sobre con el sello postal pagado para enviarlo en otro momento.

¿Qué pasará con el bebé?

El bebé será examinado y le brindarán atención médica. Cuando le den el alta del hospital, los trabajadores sociales inmediatamente ubicarán al bebé en un hogar seguro donde estará bien atendido, y se comenzará el proceso de adopción.

¿Qué pasará con el padre/madre o adulto que entregue al bebé?

Una vez que los padres o adulto hayan entregado al bebé al personal del hospital o cuartel de bomberos, pueden irse en cualquier momento.

¿Por qué se está haciendo esto en California? ?

La finalidad de la Ley de Entrega de Bebés sin Peligro es proteger a los bebés para que no sean abandonados, lastimados o muertos por sus padres. Usted probablemente hava escuchado historias trágicas sobre bebés ahandonados en basureros o en baños públicos. Los padres de esos bebés probablemente hayan estado pasando por dificultades emocionales graves. Las madres pueden haber ocultado su embarazo, por temor a lo que pasaría si sus famílias se enteraran. Abandonaron a sus bebés porque tenían miedo y no tenían nadie a quien pedir ayuda. El abandono de un recién nacido es ilegal y pone al bebé en una situación de peligro extremo. Muy a menudo el abandono provoca la muerte del bebé. La Ley de Entrega de Bebés sin Peligro impide que vuelva a suceder esta tragedia en California.

2.206.010 Findings and declarations.

The Board of Supervisors finds that significant revenues are lost each year as a result of taxpayers who fail to pay their tax obligations on time. The delinquencies impose an economic burden upon the County and its taxpayers. Therefore, the Board of Supervisors establishes the goal of ensuring that individuals and businesses that benefit financially from Contracts with the County fulfill their property tax obligation. (Ord. No. 2009-0026 § 1 (part), 2009.)

2.206.020 Definitions.

The following definitions shall be applicable to this chapter:

- A. "Contractor" shall mean any person, firm, corporation, partnership, or combination thereof, which submits a bid or proposal or enters into a Contract or agreement with the County.
- B. "County" shall mean the County of Los Angeles or any public entities for which the Board of Supervisors is the governing body.
- C. "County Property Taxes" shall mean any property tax obligation on the County's secured or unsecured roll; except for tax obligations on the secured roll with respect to property held by a Contractor in a trust or fiduciary capacity or otherwise not beneficially owned by the Contractor.
- D. "Department" shall mean the County department, entity, or organization responsible for the solicitation and/or administration of the Contract.
- E. "Default" shall mean any property tax obligation on the secured roll that has been deemed defaulted by operation of law pursuant to California Revenue and Taxation Code section 3436; or any property tax obligation on the unsecured roll that remains unpaid on the applicable delinquency date pursuant to California Revenue and Taxation Code section 2922; except for any property tax obligation dispute pending before the Assessment Appeals Board.

- F. "Solicitation" shall mean the County's process to obtain bids or proposals for goods and services.
- G. "Treasurer-Tax Collector" shall mean the Treasurer and Tax Collector of the County of Los Angeles. (Ord. No. 2009-0026 § 1 (part), 2009.)

2.206.030 Applicability.

This chapter shall apply to all solicitations issued 60 days after the effective date of the ordinance codified in this chapter. This chapter shall also apply to all new, renewed, extended, and/or amended Contracts entered into 60 days after the effective date of the ordinance codified in this chapter. (Ord. No. 2009-0026 § 1 (part), 2009.)

2.206.040 Required solicitation and Contract language.

All solicitations and all new, renewed, extended, and/or amended Contracts shall contain language, which:

- A. Requires any Contractor to keep County Property Taxes out of Default status at all times during the term of an awarded Contract;
- B. Provides that the failure of the Contractor to comply with the provisions in this chapter may prevent the Contractor from being awarded a new Contract; and
- C. Provides that the failure of the Contractor to comply with the provisions in this chapter may constitute a material breach of an existing Contract, and failure to cure the breach within ten days of notice by the County by paying the outstanding County Property Tax or making payments in a manner agreed to and approved by the Treasurer-Tax Collector, may subject the Contract to suspension and/or termination. (Ord. No. 2009-0026 § 1 (part), 2009.)

2.206.050 Administration and compliance certification.

- A. The Treasurer-Tax Collector shall be responsible for the administration of this chapter. The Treasurer-Tax Collector shall, with the assistance of the Chief Executive Officer, Director of Internal Services, and County Counsel issue written instructions on the implementation and ongoing administration of this chapter. Such instructions may provide for the delegation of functions to other departments.
- B. Contractor shall be required to certify, at the time of submitting any bid or proposal to the County, or entering into any new Contract, or renewal, extension or amendment of an existing Contract with the County, that it is in compliance with this chapter is not in Default on any County Property Taxes or is current in

payments due under any approved payment arrangement (Ord. No. 2009-0026 § 1 (part), 2009.)

2.206.060 Exclusions/Exemptions.

- A. This chapter shall not apply to the following Contracts:
 - 1. Chief Executive Office delegated authority agreements under \$50,000;
 - 2. A Contract where Federal or State law or a condition of a Federal or State program mandates the use of a particular Contractor;
 - 3. A purchase made through a State or Federal Contract;
 - 4. A Contract where State or Federal monies are used to fund service-related programs including, but not limited to, voucher programs, foster care, or other social programs that provide immediate direct assistance;
 - 5. Purchase orders under a master agreement, where the Contractor was certified at the time the master agreement was entered into and at any subsequent renewal, extension and/or amendment to the master agreement;
 - 6. Purchase orders issued by Internal Services Department under \$100,000 that is not the result of a competitive bidding process;
 - 7. Program agreements that utilize Board of Supervisors' discretionary funds;
 - 8. National Contracts established for the purchase of equipment and supplies for and by the National Association of Counties, U.S. Communities Government Purchasing Alliance, or any similar related group purchasing organization;
 - 9. A monopoly purchase that is exclusive and proprietary to a specific manufacturer, distributor, reseller, and must match and intermember with existing supplies, equipment, or systems maintained by the County pursuant to the Los Angeles Purchasing Policy and Procedures Manual, Section P-3700 or a successor provision;
 - 10. A revolving fund (petty cash) purchase pursuant to the Los Angeles County Fiscal Manual, Section 4.6.0 or a successor provision;
 - 11. A purchase card purchase pursuant to the Los Angeles County Purchasing Policy and Procedures Manual, Section P-2810 or a successor provision;

- 12. A nonagreement purchase worth a value of less than \$5,000 pursuant to the Los Angeles County Purchasing Policy and Procedures Manual, Section A-0300 or a successor provision; or
- 13. A bona fide emergency purchase pursuant to the Los Angeles County Purchasing Policy and Procedures Manual Section P-0900 or a successor provision;
- 14. Other Contracts for mission critical goods and/or services where the Board of Supervisors determines that an exemption is justified.
- B. Other laws. This chapter shall not be interpreted or applied to any Contractor in a manner inconsistent with the laws of the United States or California. (Ord. No. 2009-0026 § 1 (part), 2009.)

2.206.070 Enforcement and remedies.

- A. The information furnished by each Contractor certifying that it is in compliance with this chapter shall be under penalty of perjury.
- B. No Contractor shall willfully and knowingly make a false statement certifying compliance with this chapter for the purpose of obtaining or retaining a County Contract.
- C. For Contractor's violation of any provision of this chapter, the County department head responsible for administering the Contract may do one or more of the following:
 - 1. Recommend to the Board of Supervisors the termination of the Contract; and/or,
 - 2. Pursuant to Chapter 2.202, seek the debarment of the Contractor; and/or,
 - 3. Recommend to the Board of Supervisors that an exemption is justified pursuant to Section 2.206.060.A.14 of this chapter or payment deferral as provided pursuant to the California Revenue and Taxation Code. (Ord. No. 2009-0026 § 1 (part), 2009.)

2.206.080 Severability.

If any provision of this chapter is found invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, the remaining provisions shall remain in full force and effect. (Ord. No. 2009-0026 § 1 (part), 2009.)

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




