ASSEMBLY BILL 1207 (INTRODUCED ON FEBRUARY 23, 2007) USURPING LOCAL CONTROL ON LAND APPLICATION OF BIOSOLIDS

The Los Angeles County Solid Waste Management Committee/Integrated Waste Management Task Force (Task Force) **opposes** Assembly Bill 1207 (AB 1207), which would override local land use authority and ordinances on the management of biosolids via yet unwritten State standards.

Pursuant to Chapter 3.67 of the Los Angeles County Code and the California Integrated Waste Management Act of 1989 (AB 939, as amended), the Task Force is responsible for coordinating the development of all major solid waste planning documents prepared for the County of Los Angeles and its 88 cities in Los Angeles County with a combined population in excess of 10 million. Consistent with these responsibilities, and to ensure a coordinated and cost-effective and environmentally-sound solid waste management system in Los Angeles County, the Task Force also addresses issues impacting the system on a Countywide basis. The Task Force membership includes representatives of the League of California Cities-Los Angeles County Division, the County of Los Angeles Board of Supervisors, the City of Los Angeles, the waste management industry, environmental groups, the public, and a number of other governmental agencies.

AB 1207 would require the California Integrated Waste Management Board (Waste Board) to adopt regulations for the land application of biosolids. The bill would void any existing local ordinances or regulations regarding the land application of biosolids, and prohibit local jurisdictions from enacting future ordinances or regulations that are contrary or inconsistent with the Waste Board's regulations on land application of biosolids. This would effectively undermine local governments' land use authority

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regarding facilities within its own boundaries. For example, a host jurisdiction would be prohibited from imposing regulations on a facility's hours of operation, zoning regulation, quantity of biosolids received on a daily basis, and the distance a facility can be from residences, schools, and hospitals. In fact, a host jurisdiction would not be able to prevent the development of a biosolids land application or composting operation, so long as the operation met the minimum regulations as developed by the Waste Board.

Therefore, the Task Force **opposes** AB 1207 unless it is amended to avoid and prohibit any encroachment by state agencies into the local governments' land use authority. If you have any questions, please contact Mr. Mike Mohajer of the Task Force at (909) 592-1147.
