OPPOSE - ASSEMBLY BILL 2257 (AMENDED MARCH 15, 2012)
NUISANCE: LANDFILL ACTIVITIES

The Los Angeles County Solid Waste Management Committee/Integrated Waste Management Task Force (Task Force) is **opposed** to Assembly Bill 2257 (AB 2257 - Achadjian). If enacted, this bill would undermine local regulatory authority and would potentially endanger public health and safety.

Pursuant to Chapter 3.67 of the Los Angeles County Code and the California Integrated Waste Management Act of 1989 (Assembly Bill 939, as amended), the Task Force is responsible for coordinating the development of all major solid waste planning documents prepared for the County of Los Angeles and the 88 cities in Los Angeles County with a combined population in excess of ten million. Consistent with these responsibilities and to ensure a coordinated, cost-effective, and environmentally sound solid waste management system in Los Angeles County, the Task Force also addresses issues impacting the system on a countywide basis. The Task Force membership includes representatives of the League of California Cities-Los Angeles County Division, County of Los Angeles Board of Supervisors, City of Los Angeles, waste management industry, environmental groups, the public, and a number of other governmental agencies.

This bill would declare that no landfill operation that has been in operation for more than three years, and that has complied with all applicable laws and regulations can be declared a nuisance as a result of any development changes in the surrounding locality if it was not a nuisance at the time the landfill began operation. This would undermine existing regulations that were put in place with the objective of protecting public health, safety, and well being. It would also deprive the public and enforcement agencies the ability to take civil action or abatement orders should any problems occur after the three year window. Problems could easily occur due to a change in landfill ownership, operational changes, or many other factors.

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Assembly Member Achadjian proposed similar language in Assembly Bill 1016 in 2011. Due to strong opposition from various stakeholders, the Bill was amended to the point that it no longer contained any changes to the right of residents and other affected entities to bring action against landfills that become nuisances. The Task Force hopes the same action occurs for AB 2257.
