ASSEMBLY BILL 997 (INTRODUCED FEBRUARY 22, 2013) COMPOSTING: ANAEROBIC DIGESTION - SUPPORT

The Los Angeles County Solid Waste Management Committee/Integrated Waste Management Task Force (Task Force) **supports** Assembly Bill 997 (AB 997). The bill would define "anaerobic digestion" as a process using the bacterial breakdown of compostable organic material in a controlled environment and would include the process in the definition of "composting."

Pursuant to Chapter 3.67 of the Los Angeles County Code and the California Integrated Waste Management Act of 1989 (Assembly Bill 939 [AB 939], as amended), the Task Force is responsible for coordinating the development of all major solid waste planning documents prepared for the County of Los Angeles and the 88 cities in Los Angeles County with a combined population in excess of ten million. Consistent with these responsibilities and to ensure a coordinated, cost-effective, and environmentally sound solid waste management system in Los Angeles County, the Task Force also addresses issues impacting the system on a countywide basis. The Task Force membership includes representatives of the League of California Cities-Los Angeles County Division, County of Los Angeles Board of Supervisors, City of Los Angeles, waste management industry, environmental groups, the public, and a number of other governmental agencies.

The Task Force has historically supported measures that would provide local jurisdictions increased flexibility in regards to solid waste management options including, but not limited to, compostable organic waste. Accordingly, the Task Force has been a strong supporter of an array of conversion technologies including, but not limited to, anaerobic digestion, which can convert post recycled residual solid waste into clean fuels and energy in an environmentally friendly manner. As proposed, the inclusion of anaerobic digestion to the definition of composting would partially facilitate the development of needed anaerobic digestion facilities and would help jurisdictions' efforts to achieve compliance with AB 939 mandates as well as the waste reduction goals set forth in AB 341 (2011).

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Anaerobic digestion has already been proven worldwide as an effective means to manage organic waste in an efficient and environmentally friendly manner. Moreover the process produces valuable renewable fuel that can be utilized in a variety of ways. The technology is already regulated by the Department of Resources Recycling and Recovery (CalRecycle) as a composting process. AB 997 would simply codify those regulations.
