SENATE BILL 966 (AMENDED APRIL 30, 2007) PROPER DISPOSAL OF PHARMACEUTICAL DRUGS

The Los Angeles County Solid Waste Management Committee/Integrated Waste Management Task Force (Task Force) **supports** Senate Bill 966 (SB 966), which would require that drug retailers provide their customers with convenient locations to accept pharmaceutical drugs for proper disposal by July 1, 2008.

Pursuant to Chapter 3.67 of the Los Angeles County Code and the California Integrated Waste Management Act of 1989 (AB 939, as amended), the Task Force is responsible for coordinating the development of all major solid waste planning documents prepared for the County of Los Angeles and its 88 cities in Los Angeles County with a combined population in excess of 10 million. Consistent with these responsibilities, and to ensure a coordinated and cost-effective and environmentally-sound solid waste management system in Los Angeles County, the Task Force also addresses issues impacting the system on a County wide basis. The Task Force membership includes representatives of the League of California Cities-Los Angeles County Division, the County of Los Angeles Board of Supervisors, the City of Los Angeles, the waste management industry, environmental groups, the public, and a number of other governmental agencies.

Often pharmaceutical drugs end up disposed of in the toilet or thrown in the trash. Unused medications that are flushed down the toilet can damage the proper operation of sewage treatment facilities, or when placed in drains can eventually enter our

streams, lakes, and rivers. According to a United States Geological Survey in 2002, 80 percent of streams sampled contained measurable concentrations of prescription and nonprescription drugs, steroids, and reproductive hormones. Exposure even at low levels has been shown to have negative effects on fish and aquatic species. Unlike other types of hazardous waste or medical waste, currently there is no law to regulate effectively the proper disposal of drugs by residents. SB 966, if enacted, would remediate this problem by providing a safe and environmentally sound method for the disposal of unused prescription drugs.
