GENERAL REMARKS.

This Rancho extends about 20 miles along and fronting on the shore of the Pacific Ocean all along which there are good landing places especially at the mouth of the Canada Siques, Ramirez, and Malibu, where there are small, well protected Bays with very deep and smooth water. The soil of this Rancho is exceedingly rich, and fertile, which with the warm, mild climate, makes it particularly well adapted to the cultivation and production of all the tropical fruits, and it is also admirably adapted to the growth of coffee, tea, sugar-cane and cotton as well as to corn, wheat, barley and so forth.

This Rancho is peculiarly located and protected by the surrounding mountainers, and the ocean, which makes the climate of that particular locality very mild and warm, all the year around, there never having been seen a particle of frost or ice there and the Tomate vine and all such tender plants flourish the whole year, blooming and bearing fruit to perfection as well as in the winter as the summer. The Rancho is well watered, there being 13 canadas traversing different parts of it, which contain running water during the whole year, these canadas also contain large quantities of sycamore, oak, walnut and other kinds of wood, of great value, and in one of them there are good indications of coal besides large beds of Asphaltum and Petroleum.

The whole Rancho is covered with a most lux-

uriant growth of various kinds of grasses, and in the dryest seasons it maintains a great quantity of stock.

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WE DO HEREBY CERTIFY, that we assisted G. H. THOMPSON U. S. Deputy Surveyor in surveying the boundary lines of the Ranche "Topanga Malibu" situated in the County of Los Angeles in the State of California, and finally confirmed to Mathew Keller, and that said Ranche has been in all respects, to the best of our knowledge and belief, well and faithfully surveyed, and the boundary monuments established according to the laws of the United States, and the instructions of the Surveyor-General.
